

BANKRUPTCY PROCEEDINGS EXPLAINED

There are always a certain number of families in the United States with serious financial troubles. At this time, the number is relatively few. To those few and to their creditors, this column should be of particular interest.

The principal reported causes which throw families into finan-Mr. and Mrs. Ross Clark, of cial difficulties are: Inflation and high taxes, inability to resist "impulse" buying, combined with easy credit, illness or other emergencies, or just plain bad judgment and mismanagement

Some people in financial difficulty, when threatened with legal proceedings to collect outstanding debts, seek the relief offered them by federal bankruptcy laws.

The purpose of bankruptcy laws is to permit an honest but unfortunate or weak debtor to surrender or account for all his property for the benefit of his ceditors and in exchange be discharged of his debts.

Any adult who is insolvent may become a voluntary bankrupt by having his attorney prere for him a bankruptcy petition, together with schedules of his assets and liabilities, and then file the same in the proper United States district court

After the debtor is adjudicated a bankrupt he is required to appear for examination as to his assets in the bankruptcy court, and if he fully accounts for his assets and has not violated any of the bankruptcy laws he will thereafter receive a discharge of his debts.

During the test, gas surfaced in one and a half minutes and oil flowed in 12. Oil was flowed to tanks and gauged at the 60barrel per hour rate. Operator plans to core ahead and test.

The operation is an east offset to Hedrick No. 1 Williams, Moran discovery which had a daily potential of 65 barrels of oil, pumping from perforations at 2,237-2,241 feet. It is about three miles southeast of Herr-King Field, which produces from the Moran and other sands.

SAFETY, a crop to be harvested on every farm and in every home, is receiving special attention from more than one-half million 4-H Club members taking part in the 1955 National 4-H Safety Program.

As a part of their 4-H Club work, members in all 48 states are correcting hazards such as those seen in the above drawing. They are attempting to reduce the Nation's annual farm toll of 14,500 lives, 1,250,000 injuries, and an economic loss of about a billion dollars.

4-H'ers, working as individuals or

4-H'ers, working as individuals or in groups through their local clubs, conduct surveys to locate hazards, then correct the unsafe conditions. They give demonstrations on hundreds of topics pertaining to farm, home and highway safety. Members present talks before group meetings and over radio and television; put displays in store windows; and build booths at fairs.

To assist the Cooperative Extension Service in conducting the 4-H Safety Program, General Motors has just published a new "4-H Safety Handbook for Local Leaders," which provides how-to-do-it ideas for carry-ing out successful safety programs. Copies of the manual will be distrib-uted to volunteer 4-H leaders through

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




