

Do-It-Yourself Movement

Some educational experts are urging cities and towns to spend less on buildings, librarles, and equipment and devote more of the total allotment to teachers' salaries. This may be good politics, but it is not in the students' interest, I favor building better schools with better libraries and equipment, but having fewer teachers. Then pay better salaries to these fewer teachers.

The most vital field for a "Do It-Yourself" campaign is that of education. A parent can buy a set of encyclopedias for \$100 which contain more information than is contained in the heads of all the teachers in your community. Moreover, the training and discipline of self-education is even more valuable than all the facts that can be learned. Hence, I forecast that the next great movement in education for those above 13 years of age will be teaching students to learn without teachers f wish that some city would put the managers of its self-service supermarkets on their school

I have in mind a family of four grown-up builtiers all of whom attended the same schools and had the same teachers. Yet three of the men are foday useful in their communities and hold good positions. One of the boys was a "delinquent" and is now a ne'er-do-well supported by the first three. The question the mother asks is: Did the schools have any eftest on the character or "life" of these boys?

Traveling To The Moon

The books most popular with the youth of today are books on "space travel"-that is, going to other planets. It is said that Washington is having more inquiries about the earth "satellites" which are to be released than about any other subject. Why is it that young people are so much more interested in other worlds than in learning about their own world and how to live in it? Something is wrong somewhere. Education should teach how to live. It should help parents mold character.

Teachers should be spiritually minded in order to be efficient. Although they should be paid better salaries, yet this salary should not be based upon the degrees which they have received. Looking back over my school life, it was the teachers with the biggest hearts who won my interest and awakened a desire for knowledge and service.

To get back to my main appeal: One sure way to increase the efficiency and reduce the cost of our schools and truly help our children is to teach children where to find their own answers to questions and awaken in them a desire for more knowledge. We need teachers born with a love for children and trained as helpful librarians,



Buying Habits Of Housewife Have Profound Effect On Farm Economy

By JOHN C. WHITE **Commissioner** of Agriculture

What is the deciding factor supermarket produce counteronomy or quality? The Texas Department of Agri-

culture is conducting a series of surveys to find out. For after all, the housewife's buying habits have a profound effect on the farm economy in the state. Is she a thrify shopper? Does

product. ly labeling each one according to grade and quality. The U.S. No. 1 grade potatoes were marked at 10 cents per pound, U. S. No. 2's at 8 cents per pound, and the unclassified potatoes at 6 cents per pound.

Actually, for the purpose of the test, all potatoes were of good quality, according to grade. The main difference between the first two groups was in size; the No. I's being medium and fairly uniform in shape, and the No. 2's slightly larger and irregularly shaped. The unclassified hin contained both No. 1 and No. 2 quality potatoes as well as culls.

The bargain buy was in the unclassified bin. After each purchase for any bin, the customer was questioned as to her choice of potatoes.

Surprisingly, a total of 81 per cent of the housewives bought U. S. No. 1 grade sweet potatoes. The reasons varied, but the predominant attitude was "I want to be certain of getting the best for my money

Another 15 per cent chose the U. S. No. 2 potatoes. The twocent price difference appealed to them, but they were wary of the still cheaper potatoes in the unclassified bin.

Only 4 per cent of the buyers thriftily picked their choices from the unclassified potatoes. Of these, most of the shoppers indicated they were familiar with the factors that made up a good sweet potato without having them graded beforehand.

Definite conclusions cannot be drawn from this one test, but one fact was clear-the housewife is influenced a great deal by the grade of a product. Most of them stated that they preferred that produce be pre-graded so she could be certain of what she was getting. And in a relaively inexpensive commodity like sweet potatoes, she wants the best
