Any immediate tornado threat to Post and its surrounding area will be signaled this spring by the explosion in quick succession of four arge aerial bombs.

The new tornado signal was an-nounced today by John F. Lott, chairman of the Garza County Disaster organization which was formed last summer.

Lott said the tornado signal will consist of four 15-inch aerial flash salute bombs which will be fired by mortars high over the city and exploded at one-second intervals.

Everybody should be able to hear this signal, even when asleep," Lott declared, "The first bomb should wake a sleeping per son and the other three will follow to signal the need to seek cover.

Vandals damaged equipment in the arterufts room, poured ink in the hallways and rifled desk drawers after breaking into the Post Junior High School building Sunday night.


The heating elements in the kiln in the arterafts room were burned out after the vandals turned up the flame under the kiln.

#### More Sensible To Pay For Safety

County Judge Pat Walker pointed up a real Texas highway safety problem last week at the citizens meeting to hear Governor Daniel call for a statewide safety crusade.

Judge Walker hit at the getting-worse problem of patrol personnel in the Texas Highway Patrol.

The last legislature authorized a 50 per cent increase in patrol strength. Recruitment drives were launched along with stepped-up training.

But today the patrol has fewer men than it did when the campaign for expansion began. Why?

Simply because the patrol can't compete at the economic level with others for the top caliber men it enlists and trains,

Salaries aren't high enough and hours are too long. It's a problem again of money-the same problem Texans have been hearing in many other phases of state government.

The fact remains that the Texas Highway Patrol, a top quality organization of law enforcement on our highways, is spread too thin. To attract and hold more men, it must be able to compete at the economic level for such recruits.

The two highway patrolmen who serve Post have 16 West Texas counties in their district. The

judge points out that they are paid about \$300 a month and work up to 14 hours a day in an effort to get their jobs done.

Texas' highway slaughter will require stern measures if it is to be halted. Governor Daniel has a well-planned, sensible crusade program which can get the results-providing he has the personnel to accomplish it.

A stiff crackdown on speeders, drunken drivers, and other traffic violators is a "must" 3 this program. That will require all the trained, compétent manpower in state highway patrol uni-

forms we can muster. This is the price we must pay for safety. But really it is a cheap price. If the death and injured toll can be reduced, if the heavy property damage figures can be turned downward,

much more will be saved than will be spent. Automobile insurance rates are due to jump 30 per cent before the end of the summer because insurance companies now are losing money on automobile insurance-due to the high cost of

This is just part of the price we must pay for the present highway slaughter.

Isn't it more sensible to pay for safety-than for death, injury and damage?-JC

### Highway Approach Offers Better View

The U. S. Highway 84 approach to Post from the southeast is rapidly taking on a "new look," with present plans calling for that "look" to improve within the next few years.

The new divided four-lane highway brings motorists coming in from the direction of Snyder past many improvements which were not there a few years ago and a few which were not there even a few months ago.

Adding to the view is the new State Highway Department warehouse on the left as you come into Post. And, before you get to it, there is the Little League and Pony League basebail park, which can be seen from the highway.

On the right, as you come on in, is the new Garza County 4-H Club building now under construction-on the south side of the city-county park property. Then, a few hundred feet on in toward town, you can see to the right the park improvements already made and the municipal

The 10-year park development plan of the city and county assures more park improvements, including paving of the swimming pool parking area, and these improvements will add to the eye-catching view.

Then, there's South Lake, smack-dab in the middle of the park, and a body of water that size always looks good out in this part of the

Backtracking for a few miles down U. S. 84, it won't be long until there is as attractive and convenient roadside park at Green Tank. Then, coming on into town after you pass the city-county park, a number of thriving business places line the highway right on up to the Main and Broadway intersection in the center of town. #### Safety Council Is United Effort

What is a safety council? We've had that question asked the paper and

we know it has been asked of many others. What can citizens do for highway safety?

Those are logical questions. And there are

The organization of the Garza County Safety Council, now in its formative stage, will bring which can do many things in many fields.

First of all it gives the average citizen a place to voice his opinions and suggestions on safety-and be heard. It thereby arouses a great deal of interest at the public level in safety problems and possible safety solutions.

Second, by representing the general community its recommendations to governmental bodies for improvements will bear considerable weight.

If it stands for a crackdown on traffic violations, it can be accepted as the public's voice. If it suggests and works out a safety project and urges the county, city, or schools to adopt it, the council would be the organized voice of the community speaking on safety matters.

Third, it can do many things in the educational field. It can take the problems to the pub--not the national traffic problems-but specific local ones. It can ask for cooperation as one citizen to another. It can do the same thing with the young people by carrying its local safety education into the schools.

Every community has need for a safety conscience - some more than others. If citizens want to work for safety at home they will be surprised at the results, they can accomplish via the united effort of a safety council.-JC

#### Our Tornado Protection Improves

A better communications system and more each and every storm cellar was built with the storm cellars gives us added protection this tornado season, but the fact remains that no 100 per cent defense has yet been developed against the tornado scourge, and that much remains to be

County Sheriff Carl Rains points out that the new two-way radio system affords a better means of communications . . . that two and perhaps three mobile units will be available for warning purposes, in addition to the base station at the courthouse.

The sheriff also said that he had made arrangements with the local radio station for warning broadcasts in case of a tornado threat. All this and the fact that the volunteer fire department also has worked out a warning signal adds up to more protection and less chance of disaster in case of a tornado swooping down on the community.

Not quite up to the communications system, however, is our means of protection against the tornado itself. There probably are enough storm cellars within the city limits to afford protection to everyone, but no system has yet been devised for their general use. Without exception, perhaps, protection of the family building it in mind, but there probably isn't a storm cellar owner who wouldn't be glad to share this protection with his neighbors who do not have storm cellars. Location of storm cellars and the number of

people each will accommodate in case of a tornado needs to be known if full protection is to be afforded. The Dispatch invites owners of the cellars to list that information with us. If we can compile the information within the next few weeks, we'll be glad to print it as a public service.

So, if you're willing to share your storm cellar, drop us a post card listing its location (street and number) and the number of people it will accommodate. Or telephone the information to 111, or just drop by the office and let us know.

As the county sheriff points out, this information also is important from the standpoint of safety in case of a cave-in or other disaster to one or more cellars during a tornado, "We hope, of course, that we'll never have such a thing happen," said the sheriff, "but if it did happen and we had to do rescue work, we'd need to know

Prior to 1950, each service celebrated its own "day". Army Day planting comes when the soil temfell on April 6 each year, Navy Day on Oct. 27, Air Force on Sept. 18, and the Marine Corps Anniversary on Nov. 10.

In April 1949, the Secretary of Defense, with the President's approval, announced that the four separate events would be combined into a single annual observance of Armed Forces Day. This was in line with unification of the services and creation of the Department of Defense by act of Congress.

In this respect, AFD was intended to symbolize unification, demonstrate the close relationship of all active and reserve components, and give the public an annual report on the nation's defense system.

From the first, the Armed Forces Day observance has emphasized the basic concept that our national security and our free way of life depend upon the power which comes from American teamwork and national unity. The 1953 slogan represented the Armed Forces as constituting "Power for Peace" and has been used ever since as it is so appropriate to our national policy.

In some overseas areas, the slogan and theme have been varied to emphasize the fact that we and our allies are "Partners for Peace"

## **Dates On Plains** Are May 5 To 20

LUBBOCK — Optimum cotton planting dates on the Texas High Plains are May 5-20, Don L. Jones, former superintendent of the Lubbock Experiment Station, has reminded Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

"Later planting usually results in lower quality cotton and if planting must be done after June 1, select an early maturing variety,'

As to prior planting, Jones exat the Experiment Station has shown that the best results for perature averages 60 degrees for 10 days at an 8-inch depth from the top of the bed.

Daily radio and newspaper reports are now being broadcast and published which gives the average daily temperatures. This information is part of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Educational Program to try and help High Plains cotton farmers produce a higher quality cotton in 1958.

In other planting tips Jones urged farmers to use delinted, treated seed if possible, and warned them to check the seed germination percent and to alter planting rates accordingly.

A uniform stanw of approximately four stalks per foot in 40-inch rows is recommended. Plant 20 to 30 pounds of seed per acre, adjusting the rate according to germination tests and the use of a seed press wheel and shallow furrows will help plant emergence to be rapid.

The method of harvest to be used should help determine the variety to plant when practical since stormresistant cottons maintain quality rels of crude oil in 1957; 41.4 per longer in the field and strip better than open-boll types, Jones con-



The answer depends on the point authorities. The key word in that public health menace. sentence is "reported." Venereal disease is like an iceberg-a little bit is visible above the surface, but the vast bulk of it is submerged. Probably no more than 2-10 per cent ever comes to light.

Texas has had this experience; Every single area where case reports have increased has a wideawake program of case finding. Examples are Houston and, more recently, Dallas and Fort Worth.

The exact reverse is also true. Areas claiming to have no VD problem are without energetic case-finding activities. It all boils down to this: The dog won't come unless you call it.

The number of cases of infectious syphilis reported for the entire state in 1956 totaled 541. Of that number, 282 cases were diagnosed by public health clinics, and 259 by private physicians.

Now compare those figures with the record for 1957: A total of 545 cases reported, 368 from public health clinics, and 177 from private physicians.

It is the decline in case reports from physicians that causes concern. It is known that more than 50 per cent of all VD patients are treated by private physicians. Unless public health interview-investigators have access to those patients, we cannot find out who their contacts were, and consequently cannot get them under treatment

Texas has a harder time trying to control VD than most states have. The reasons are obvious: tremendous distances, more than 900 miles of international boundary, and 53 military installations peopled by thousands of young men most of them away from whole some home influences for the first time in their lives.





Now that National Mental Health Week is upon us, we should again take stock of the needs of the mentally ill in Texas. Over 16,000 hospitals.

The substance of these remarks to do less? was confirmed last year by Dr. William C. Menninger of Topeka, Kans., when he addressed a joint session of the Texas Legislature. Dr. Menninger is a national authority on mental health, and in his address to the lawmakers he drove home some revealing facts. He pointed out that the minimum funds necessary to take care of basic treatment needs for our mentally ill would be \$5 per patient day, instead of the \$2.53 per patient day which the State of Texas is now spending. "This is simply not enough to do the job", stated Dr.

I ask you, why should I, a civil engineer by profession, bother to urge the readers of your good paper to use their influence with our legislators to help these 16,000 mentally ill? Simply because it is their God-given right to have a fair chance to get well and to again live a normal life among their friends and loved ones.

But I have an even greater urge to come to their aid. I too, suffered a "nervous breakdown" about five years ago, and spent three months to no avail languishing in one of our state hospitals' "bull pens" under the guise of "domiciliary care". Seeing that this was not helping me, I voluntarily returned home and shortly thereafter, being a veteran, secured admission to the U.S. Public Health Service Hospital in Fort Worth. From here, after 12 months of wonderfully effective treatment and loving care, I was restored and



However, fishing for red snapper is more work than sport. The first a good day you'll get more than half-dozen give you a thrill. Thereafter it becomes a chore, especially if you are on a good boat over a hot spot. It is nothing unusual to catch a hundred pounds or more of red snapper, if your strength to send you folders and the names holds out that long.

Red snapper fishing is one the favorites of the party boat. These boats operate out of most of the coastal cities of Texas. They take excursions out to the snapper banks in the Gulf. Most of the banks are at least 35 miles out. Some are more than one hundred miles into the Gulf.

Just One Secret Actually, there is but one secret in getting all the snapper fishing you want, and that is getting with a good party boat operator. If he has good equipment, which is more than just having a good boat, you are pretty sure to get all the fish you want, providing the weather is right. And a good operator won't take you out unless the weather is right.

A good party boat has to be one large enough to withstand about the roughest water that can be thrown at you in the Gulf of Mexico. Generally one of these boats won't get caught in bad weather, but sometimes they do.
