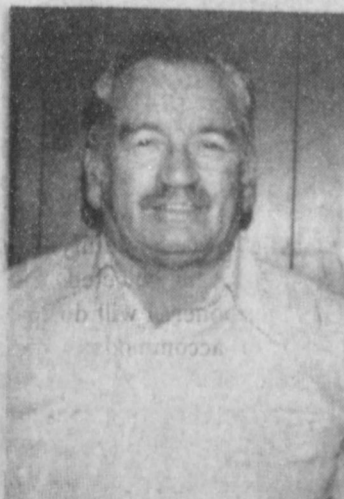

County Gross Sales Down, Reporting Outlets Up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock reported Monday that gross sales in Texas for the third quarter of 1981 -- July, August and September -- totaled more than \$80 billion.

Third quarter sales this year passed 1980 third quarter sales by \$14.3 billion, Bullock said.

Bullock's report details gross sales -- all sales made by Texas businesses -- as well as those subject to sales and use tax.

The Comptroller said the sales tax analysis for July, August and September of this year shows 267,647

reporting outlets compared to 246,262 reporting outlets in the third quarter of last year.

First, second and third quarter sales in Texas for 1981 now total \$228.1 billion.

When compared to 1980 third quarter figures, Bailey County shows over \$3 million decrease in gross sales. While the county has increased in reporting outlets from 169 to 172, gross sales revealed \$22,336,804 for the third quarter in 1981, as compared to \$25,760,961 for the third quarter in 1980.

Cochran County's gross sales reached \$7,040,308 for the third quarter of 1981, with 63 reporting outlets. With total reporting outlet number continuing on a downward trend since 1979, Cochran county

outlets are down from the 68 outlets reporting in 1980. Gross sales, however are up from the third Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

WIFE Works On Vital Farm Issues

The Muleshoe Chapter of Women Involved in Farm Economics (W.I.F.E.) met Thursday, January 21, 1982, at 6 p.m. in the Muleshoe State Bank Community Room. Debra Redwine, president, conducted the meeting of 6 members and 10 guests.

Discussion was opened on the report that the USDA is setting up a committee to study the Staple and Micronaire of cotton in the United States. An area WIFE member has been nominated for a position on the committee which will be selected by Secretary of Agriculture John Block. This committee would be of vital importance to the cotton growers of this area who, in the past, have had to settle for lower cotton prices than other areas,

due to the 'mike' of the cotton.

It was then announced that there would be an AAM meeting held Tuesday, January 26 at 7:00 p.m. in the High School cafeteria. The meeting will have speakers V. B. Morris from Gruver, Wayne Critts from Mexico, Missouri and Ted Godfrey from Spearman. The meeting will be about marketing our own crops instead of having to go through government channels.

Naomi Austin, state WIFE Secretary and Shug Killough, representative, will be attending the State Steering Committee meeting at Tulia on January 26.

President Redwine then read the accomplishments of WIFE, on the National level, which were:

1) 5 new states were added to the WIFE roll.

2) Members across the country testified before the U. S. Senate and House of Representatives on Farm legislation.

3) Members attended the Farm Women's Conference in Washington.

4) A member was appointed to the Task Force on Small Business Administration.

National Chairman Urges PAC Support

In an American Agriculture Movement meeting in Muleshoe Tuesday night, playing to a packed house of 450-500, a Missouri farmer urged local farmers to "stand up on their hind legs and fight for what is theirs."

Wayne Critts, national vice president of AAM, who hails from Puxico, Missouri, told of the havoc that high production costs, interest rates and low farm prices have wreaked in the bootheel of Missouri. Critts said that one would be "hard-pressed to find twenty 20-year old farmers in that area. And, it's not getting better, here or elsewhere because the United States Department of Agriculture is losing farmers at the rate of 2,000 per day."

Critts stated that a fair price for the farmers' products could turn this country around. "The government is passing us by because we haven't made ourselves a reckoning force," Critts said.

Another speaker, Marvin Meeks, who is the national AAM president, spoke to the crowd on the proposed political action committee or PAC. "One of the things we farmers have learned," said Meeks, "is that there is no free market. As long as the government decides

who may buy our farm products, we do not have any semblance of a free market."

In other comments, Meeks said that they (AAM) had learned that the elected leaders respond to pressure from special interest groups -- with political influence that is backed by money. Thus, was born the idea of AAM's political action committee in January, 1982.

Ted Godfrey of Spearman is working on a marketing plan by which American farmers can receive 85 percent parity for their products. "All plans are on the drawing board at this time, and we should have something definite to go on soon. It's going to take money to float this ship, and the farmers' moral and financial support is imperative," he said.

"Our plan is sound enough that 17 congressmen have agreed to contribute to our PAC fund. What we need now, is the direction we should take. Money makes Washington tick, and the AAM is fixing to grease a few palms," Meeks said.

Meeks has an appointment with President Reagan in the next two weeks and hopes to have some answers by then.

In an interview with Meeks following the AAM meeting, *The Journal* inquired as to what action was being taken to activate the Economic Emergency loans that are in the farm bill. Meeks said that the Cont. Page 6, Col. 7

Incumbent district clerk, Nelda Merriott has filed for re-election on the Democratic ticket, also unchallenged. This office commands \$14,308.68 for the yearly salary.

Dorothy Turner, recently appointed county treasurer has filed for election to an unexpired term, on the Democratic party ticket. Turner is challenged by Republican hopeful, Jean

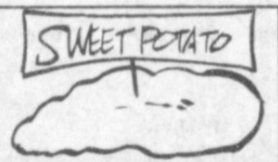

A new word is making the rounds in wheat country. "Lo-Till" is descriptive of a program which may mean lower fuel costs, better soil and water conservation. The package of options, being put together by Oklahoma State University researchers, aims at reducing the number of tilling operations, meaning lower production costs. Ideally, "Lo-Till" wheat production would require only one tillage operation in late summer or early fall with the application of anhydrous ammonia. Prior to June harvest, a single application of a weed killer would eliminate conventional tillage operations during summer fallow. Unturned crop stubble would decrease soil erosion and increase soil moisture intake. Although not a cure-all, OSU scientists are optimistic about possibilities, even where soil and climatic conditions "don't permit the total program to be used."

4-H Club Leaders People Who Care

4-H, the youth program of the Cooperative Extension Service in Texas and across the nation, owes much of its success to a dedicated legion of volunteer leaders. They devote their time, energy and resources to support the nation's largest youth organization and its motto -- "To make the best better."

Texas boasts some 22,000 volunteer leaders who work closely with county Extension agents in helping about 140,000 youth engage in some 60 different project opportunities and in organizing clubs in virtually every community in the state.

"The evidence of 4-H volunteer leaders is probably greatest this time of the year as they work with youth who will be exhibiting animals at the various livestock shows across Texas," points out Dr. Warren Mauk, 4-H and youth specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. "These leaders take time away from their jobs to make sure the youth and their animals get to the various shows and help them get their animals ready for the

show ring."

Of course, this is but one of the many activities that volunteers engage in, adds the specialist. They help lead various project groups teach youth certain subject matter, and provide facilities, equipment, supplies, recognition and awards. "4-H volunteer leaders spend an average of 15 to 25 days a year supporting various educational programs and activities geared to youth aged 9 to 19. They each contribute an average of \$1,000 a year in time and resources because they care about the future of young people," points out Mauk.

Nationally, 4-H volunteers contribute some \$200 million a year in time and resources, more than double the current annual investment of public and private sector funds.

"While 4-H was born in the early 1900s to teach the latest principles of agriculture to club members, it now provides learning opportunities for youth in all walks of life, giving them a chance to grow and develop to their full potential," says Mauk.

He adds that how much they learn and how well

they become prepared to deal with the complexities of life that lay ahead depends a great deal on the dedicated band of volunteer leaders who care about the youth of this country.

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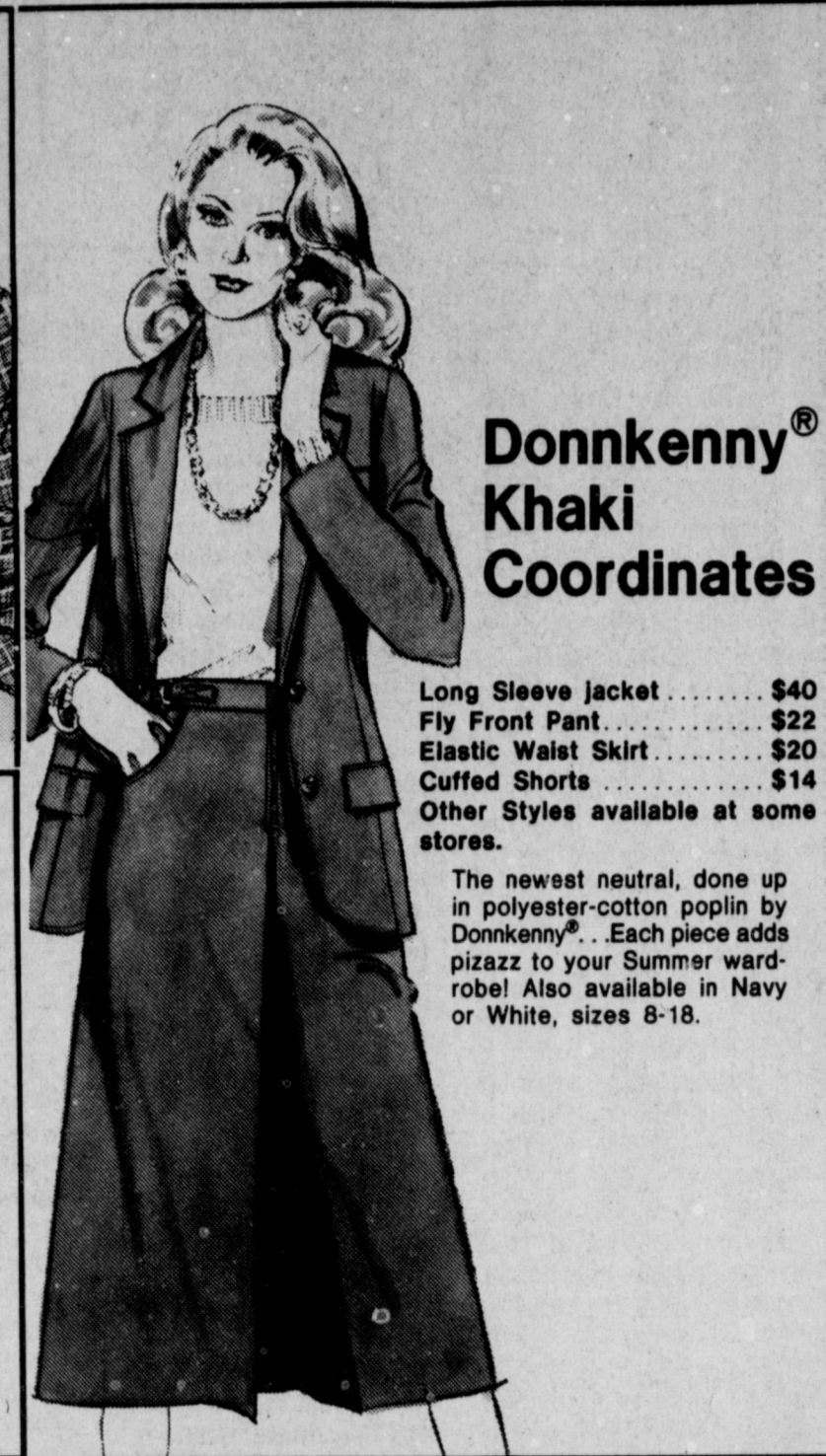
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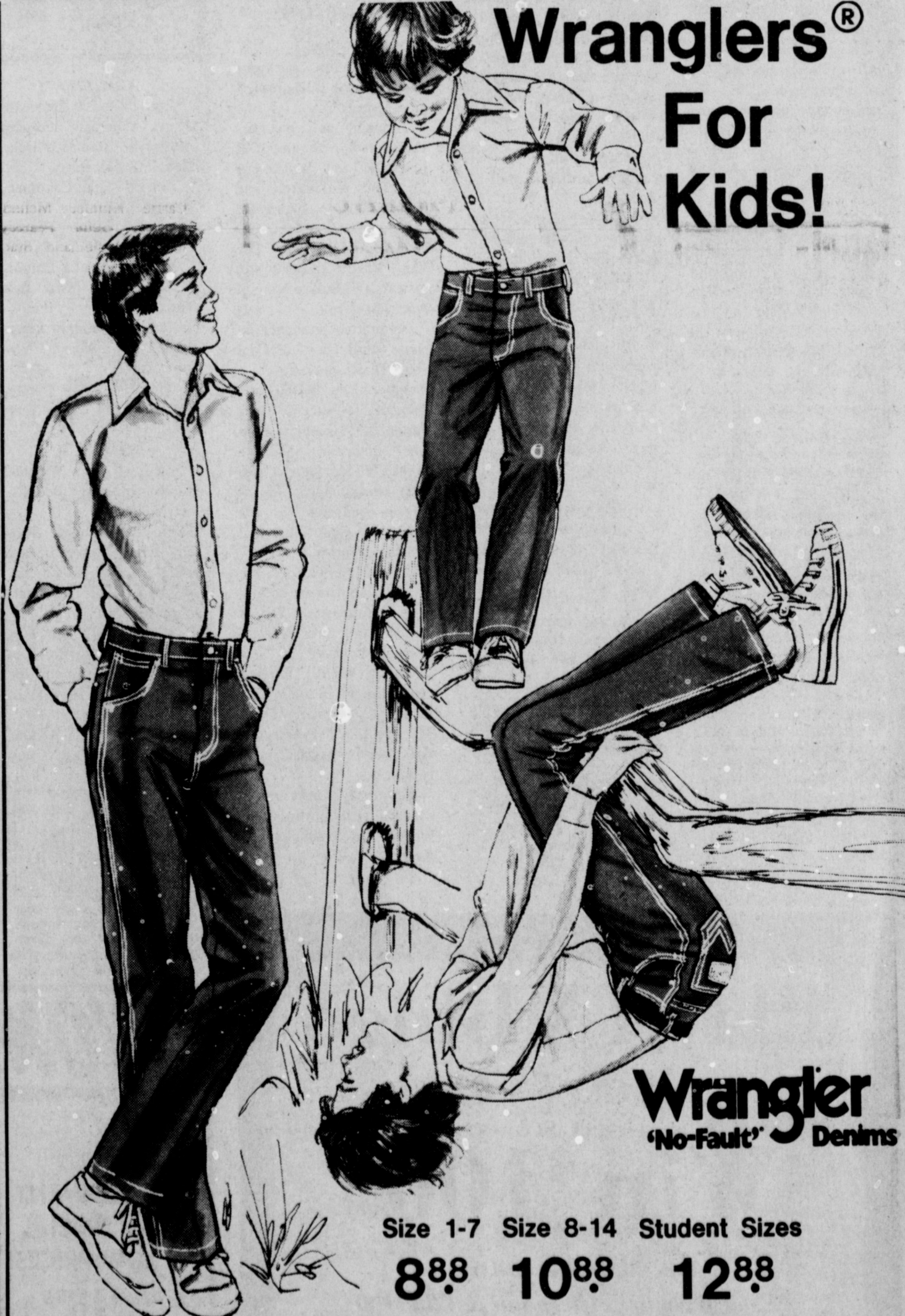

money was definitely available, there is just the problem of it being knocked loose and much effort is being made to have these funds released to farmers facing foreclosure due to lack of funds.

Meeks told *The Journal* that farm lobbyists were promoting a moratorium act to set aside present debts for a three year period. How successful this will be remains to be seen.

Meeks urged all present to attend an AAM area meeting in Plainview on February 4 at the Hale County Ag Barn. There will be a dutch treat supper beginning at 6:30 p.m. followed by the meeting at 7:30 p.m. Up-to-date information should be available at that time on PAC and the new marketing plan.

The AAM will rely heavily on the guidance of the number one public affairs firm in Washington, D.C., the Martin Haley Company. This company organized the political action committee in the early 70's that got a parity bill for dairymen.

A Political Action Committee is a fund collected from people with a common political goal to be spent to support legislation and issues to help the members of the Committee. Usually this support is expressed through donations to political candidates although the funds may be used for educational and other efforts. The PAC supports the goals of the AAM, but is not, under the law, a part of AAM. The PAC chairman is Marvin Meek, chairman of AAM. He will appoint a committee to manage the fund, and they will draw up by-laws, which will be furnished to all PAC members. The PAC committee will hold periodic meetings to determine how the PAC money should be spent. Reports on PAC activity will be furnished to PAC members.

The maximum contribution to this PAC is \$1,000 per individual this year, and the funds must be personal -- not corporate -- funds. Husbands and wives may donate \$1,000 each, as can other family members. Up to \$1,000 per individual may be pledged at this time for later payment. Each AAM member should attempt to contribute at least a dollar an

acre up to the \$1,000 limit. Checks or pledges for future contributions should be made to the American Agriculture Movement Political Action Committee (AAM/PAC) at 190 Maryland Ave., S. E., Suite 500 A, Washington, D.C. 20003.

AAM federal affairs consultant, the Martin Haley Companies, will maintain the books and records for the Political Action Committee, and file all the necessary reports. This is a difficult and complex job which our consultant performs for several other client PACs. Contributions and other expenditures will be made from the PAC only when authorized by AAM, and the AAM/PAC treasurer's signature will be on every check paid out.

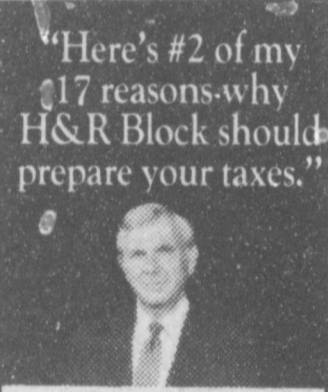

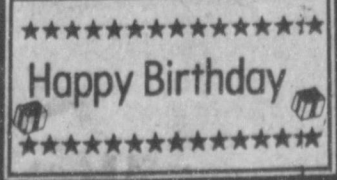

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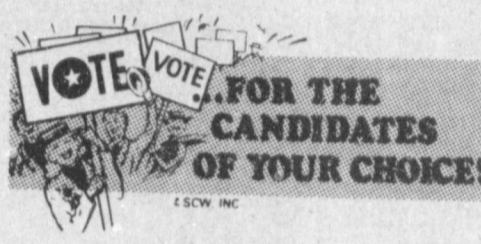
