

#### ONLY A SMALL LINK . . .

The four-lane route to be provided from here to the top of the caprock with completion of construction work on U. S. Highway 84 will be only a small link in what may some day be a pattern of four-lane routes through-

Construction work is well under way on the project, and it won't be long before similar construction will begin on the highway from Post south to the Scurry County line. After that probably will come plans for fourlane widening of U. S. Highway 380, which traverses the county from east to west.

Lubbock County recently voted \$1.8 million in bonds to be used for the purchase of right of way which will result in the fourlane widening of all U.S. highways in the county, plus a 25-mile loop around the city. With few exceptions, other South Plains counties either are under way with or planning four-lane widening of U.S. highways.

No telling how long it will take to complete the over-all project, but once it is finished, it will provide motorists with super-highways that will make for much better and safer travel. The commissioners' court and the citizens of Garza County are to be commended for seeing to it that their county is not left out of this important road improvement pat-

The best argument in favor of such service is that it definitely would be a mark of progress. ## Uranium Uses For Many Years To Be Confined To Military Purposes; Has Its Competitors

BABSON PARK, Mass.-Readers are still being pestered by Canadian brokers to buy uranium stocks, News items about building re-actors on college campuses keep up the interest. From studies, I believe that your money, if put in savings banks, can be both safer and more profitable than if put into a speculative clay bank.

#### Uranium Is Valuable

Uranium will have its uses, but for many years these will be confined to military purposes, especially in connection with ammunition, shipping, guided missiles, and movable electrical plants, Uranium, however, is subject to many competitors, including water power, oil, natural gas, and cheap coal. These other natural resources will hold down the price of uranium, especially in view of its great quantity all over the world. The main thing for the oil and gas people to fear is legsalative persecution such as the electric utilities suffered under Roosevelt. The recent action of the U. S. Senate, however, in connection with the natural gas bill, shows that there is no reason to fear such destructive legislation at present.

Probably the first competitor that all these natural power resources will face is the uned power from the sun. I had be harnessed. er from the sun. As there are millions of different alloys which have not been tested, it is probable that a partial insulator of gravity will be dis-

As you read this column, do you realize that you are moving at the rate of 1,000 miles. per hour? (The world is approximately 24,000 miles in circumference and the day consists of 24 hours.) This revolution offers the greatest opportunity for free power. Furthermore, it will not need a differential in order to be harnessed. The most hopeful thing is that most physicists, astronomers, and other scientists agree that they do not know what makes the world revolve! They do not accept seriously the standard theory that-like a baseballour globe was sent twirling when it was thrown off from the sun or some other planet and has been twirling for billions of years

In view of experiments with toy meters, where the revolving armature has no electrical connection with the magnetic field, another theory is possible. This is, that the interior of our Globe consists of some new metals or alloys making it the rotor of a great meter. The field of this meter is the electrical waves coming from the sun and other planets or generated by the clouds, Thomas Edison told me that more static electricity is used in one thundershower than is produced each day by all the power companies in the U. S. People might not worry so much about what others thought of them if they would realize how seldom they did.

HISTORY IS ALWAYS interestng-and sometimes it makes sad reading.

Take, for instance, the history of the individual income tax. In 1929, the tax on a \$2,000 income was \$2-and for a married perwith two children and a \$10,-000 income it was a mere \$40.

Now the tax begins at 20 per cent, on the lowest taxable income levels. From there it goes swiftly up the ladder, reaching 91 per cent at the top.

It's no wonder that people still talk, wistfully and nostalgically, of the good old days. Who dares to predict what taxes will be 25 years hence, with government functions being expanded like the proverbial green bay tree.

A speech should be so short that when it's over you can still remember the beginning.

I'M GLAD TO see by the attractive sign on the front of the new Chamber of Commerce offices that the organization has returned to its old slogan. "Gateway to the Plains." In my opinion that's a much better slogan than the new one the C. of C. adopted a few years ago, Since 1926, "Gateway to the

Great South Plains" has appeared on the masthead of The Post Dispatch. It was first used on the masthead of the Post City Post, which was established here in 1917 by my father E. A. Warren. The Post City Post continued in existence for a short time after I established The Dispatch. but when it ceased publication I continued the slogan on the masthead of my newspaper.

A few years ago shortly after radio station KPET at Lamesa hit the airwaves, they started using the slogan, "Gateway to the Great South Plains," but obligingly gave it up after being informed that it had been the slogan of the Post Chamber of Commerce and the town in general for years and years.

Thornton is a strong believer fertilizer cost for each bushel that the formulation of any system of agricultural planning or any systematic developments of agriculture rests in the soil. He has worked during past years with other extension specialists, research workers, county agents and many others interested in educational meetings and demonstrations which point the way to greater farm prosperity and a higher level of rural living through the use of fertilizers and sound soil improvement practices.

During the past year Thornton participated in statewide and regional conferences for fertilizer makers and dealers. He visited 39 different counties to hold conferences or to participate in group meetings. He also participated in 52 meetings, 17 were district in scope, and contacted 147 county agents in furthering work in agricultural chemistry demonstrations. Total attend-ance at these 52 meetings was

Thornton spends much of his time supervising the soil testing laboratory which is operated by the Extension Service at College Station. On the basis of soil samples submitted to the laboratory the soil type and lo cation in the State, the special ist makes recommendations to farmers and ranchmen on fertilizer usage and cropping practices. Last year the laboratory tested 10,111 soil samples .

On the basis of present and past results, he says, the laboratory has proved its value to agricultural progress in Texas. He cites three examples of the value of soil testing. A pasture demonstrator had been using 400 pounds each of ammonium sulfate and superphosphate an acre. A soil test showed the 400 pounds of sulfate would meet the fertilizer requirements. The result, an increase of 150 pounds of forage an acre; an increase of \$7.80 cents an acre in net profit and a drop in fertilizer cost for ton of forage increase from \$3.40 to \$1.90.





## **Post Citizens Warned Fly Density** Will Reach Peak Within Six Weeks

Fly densities in Post and other Texas communities will reach their peak within six weeks. state health authorities cautioned today

Temperature and moisture will be ideal for fly growth and propagation by May, and coinciding with the increase in the num ber of flies will be a marked rise in the number of cases of dysentery diseases. State Health commissioner Henry A. Holle predicted.

More than 1.100 deaths were attributed to dysentery diseases last year. Most of the victims were babies.

Senior Engineer Frank von Zuben of the State Health Department's environmental sanitation staff pointed to general Beef, Pork On April's community sanitation as the most vital aspect of fly control.

"If I had one choice of what I would like to impress on the mind of every man and woman in Texas, it would be neighborhood cleanliness," von Zuben said. "Neighborhoods are clean only when everybody living in them takes care to keep their own places free of litter and fly breeding media.'

It is a known principle of disease transmission that flies "seed" disease organisms among some humans. Thereafter the sick persons spread the illness to their "contacts," even after

Another "peak" will come in the fall, after hot weather has peanut butter round out the passed and fall rains come.

With ideal conditions of tem perature and moisture, flies may breed and lay eggs in a harm less looking pile of grass clip-pings. They won't pick up disease organisms in the grass clippings, but when the eggs hatch the flies will find an at tractant-a privy, an animal shelter, or an open garbage dump where disease organisms are prevalent.

Therein lies the importance of community wide sanitation,

Included among the major flyborne diseases are tuberculosis. typhoid fever, bacillary dysentery, infant diarrhea, and the eggs of tapeworms and round





## **Certified Planting** Seed Is Seen As prayberry, Post, surg- Sound Investment

Guaranteed purity, higher germination and top crop yields are all on the credit side of certified planting seed. While germination and final yields are dependent upon available -moisture, Ben Spears, extension agronomist, says farmers can't afford to gamble with planting seed of questionable quality.

Certified seed usually are the best seed of a particular variety available. Seed with a "blue tag" comes from fields that were inspected during the growing season, properly handled at harvest time, cleaned and tested for purity and germination.

Certified seed may cost slightly more, but the added cost is good insurance, says Spears, He advises farmers to buy now the seed needed for planting this year's crops. Seed supplies are generally adequate but last minute shoppers find local stocks

If the planting seed has not been chemically treated for seedborne and seedling diseases Spears recommends treatment He points out that farmers have found this practice profitable wining Tulsa, Okla. and insurance against poor stands and plant losses during

early growth.

Local county agents can supply additional information on seed treating and also on adapted varieties, says Spears.
