Be sure that the moisture gets to the under side of the leaves, where the spider likes to hide away. Most persons are not aware of the presence of the tiny but terribly destructive creature, because it is unnoticeable unless one takes special pains to seek him out.

But if they find that leaves on their plants are turning sellow and fallers.

plants are turning yellow and falling off, they will have good reason to sus-pect that the red spider is at the bottom of the trouble.

One of the envelopes contained a \$1 bill, which was meant, according to the letter, to defray the cost of a ticket for the girl to Dallas. The letters were filled with language of love.

Not a Violation.

The Texas attorney general's department holds that it is not a violation of the anti-nepotism law for the wife of Superintendent Wynne of the Confederate home to hold the position of matron, which position the lady has been holding for some time. It is held that Mrs. Wynne was not appointed by her husband but by board of managers, and that thus the law was not violated.
