

Inquest verdict in two poisoning deaths awaits results of autopsy

Coroner's inquest verdict in the case of Clarice Milo, one of two women found dead or dying early Wednesday morning, will be held Wednesday afternoon in an autopsy report from Austin, Texas, of the Peace D. C. Coroner's office.

Clarice Milo, one of two women found dead or dying early Wednesday morning, was taken to the hospital, the body of the Milo woman was found in her bed in another room of the Frazier house. L. C. Frazier, owner of the house where the two women lived, is a woman, but uses the initials "L.C." as her first name. Sheriff Carl Rains explained.

The sheriff said the Frazier woman told him, the other two women had eaten some home made chili shortly before going to bed late Tuesday night. Samples of the chili eaten by the women were sent to Austin yesterday morning by the sheriff for analysis in the state laboratory there.

The autopsy on the body of the Milo woman was requested by her father, according to Justice of the Peace Roberts. Sheriff Rains said late Wednesday that the results of the food analysis and the autopsy are expected to be known "in a day or two."

The sheriff said the Frazier woman told him that another woman living in her home had eaten some of the chili and had been made ill by it. "That hasn't been verified, however," the sheriff said. Deputy Sheriff Red Floyd and Deputy City Marshal Buford Finchum went to the Frazier home about 1:30 o'clock after being summoned by the owner.

I Give You Texas . . .

Fort Worth, when I moved there in 1931, had a population of around 150,000. As a reporter on the Star-Telegram, I was often assigned to the police station and there was a period of a year or so when I attended the luncheon of some service club five noons a week—so that I knew all the detectives, half the patrolmen and nearly all the members of the downtown Lions, Kiwanis and Rotary clubs. Now the city has grown to such an extent that I can walk two blocks and not see a single face I know.

Automobile traffic was not a third of what it is today. There were no parking meters. The traffic signals were connected with bells which rang when the signal changed.

This was during the depression and national prohibition. Millions chuckled at Will Rogers' remarks in the daily paper. There was no air-conditioning; no TV and even radio was not yet so stabilized but one man operated a station without a license until federal officers walked in, in the middle of a program, and jerked the wires loose.

TEXANS CONSIDERED

People were talking about a successor to "the great engineer in the White House" and a Texan and two former Texans were coming in for consideration—Speaker of the House John N. Garner of Uvalde, Gov. "Alfalfa Bill" Murray of Oklahoma, who had lived in Parker County, and Melvin Traylor of Chicago, who began his banking career in Malone, in Hill County.

Travelers visiting Fort Worth for the first time inquired the way to the Seibold Cafe, famed for its huge steaks; and gourmets said the specialty at the Virginia Ham Kitchen was better than the ham served in Virginia.

A certain hooded organization had faded, like a spectre, from the scene only a few years before, after having briefly exercised political power in Fort Worth and over the State. There was a rumor it was going to be revived so I was assigned by the city editor to report the meeting. The place of assembly was a hill-top overlooking the Fort Worth-Dallas pike, a quarter of a mile east of the car-barns. This hill was said

to have been the meeting place during the heyday of the organization. Several hundred men were there, none in robes and masks, and a few speeches were made but the old-time ardor was absent and the ghost returned to its tomb.

One weekend the Missouri Pacific railroad ran an excursion to San Antonio. I went. The round-trip fare was \$3. (Years ago, the Missouri Pacific gave up passenger service between Fort Worth and San Antonio.) Ten thousand was a good crowd for a T.C.U. football game. The Stock Show was held in the North Side Coliseum. Bowen Air Lines advertised that the fastest passenger planes in the world were in operation between Fort Worth and San Antonio.

Magazine sees higher prices in housing picture this year

Higher prices and high interest rates are the prospect for home buyers this year, according to *Changing Times*, the Kiplinger Magazine. The number of new homes built will be fewer than in the past, and the shortage of new homes in the current issue of the magazine states that this year will see something like 1.2 million new houses built, as against 1.3 million in 1959. This total will make 1960 the fifth best year in the past 20 years, following 1950, 1954, 1955 and 1959. The number of new homes top the price forecast is about 33 percent higher than last year, and nearly every cost component will rise. In a single day the article notes, 4 percent price hikes were announced for cement siding, mineral wool insulation and glass fiber insulation in the cost of acquiring vacant land and developing

it. Service jobs expected to increase during the next decade include repairmen, beauticians, practical nurses, hospital attendants, barbers, cooks, waiters, truck drivers, dry cleaners and laundry workers.

With these developments in the job market, the editors foresee an ever-increasing need for education. More than ever, they state, the college degree will be worthy many times its cost, and the three out of ten workers without a high school education will find it most difficult to profit from the new opportunities in just about every field.

DENTON — James Kerwin Baxter, Post High School science teacher, has been awarded a grant for study in a summer institute for high school science and mathematics teachers at North Texas State College.

The institute will be conducted under a grant of \$47,200 from the National Science Foundation from June 6 to July 14.

AUSTIN — A great number of voters are not aware of the fact that the Legislature, at its 1959 session, moved the primary and off elections forward several months.

Candidates are not in sufficient abundance this year to impress the voters. Now with a short period remaining, many of them are surprised to find that not one out of a hundred voters knows when the elections are to be held.

Those who are campaigning have failed to stress the earlier vote dates. First primary will be on Saturday, May 7. The runoff, if any should be necessary, is scheduled for June 4.

If you are going to be out of town during the first primary election, May 7, you have from now on May 3 to vote absentee for election.

After May 3 you must go to the polls if you want to vote.

If you live in a county seat where those living in a county seat by the simplest procedure is to go to the county clerk's office, you do not live in the county you can write the county clerk for the necessary forms.

Participation in the Democratic primary is essential to participation in Democratic party activities next year. No one will be allowed to take part in a Democratic primary unless he has a stamped

"Democratic." Poll tax holders must vote in the primary, absentee or at the polls, to get their poll taxes stamped.

This new section of the election law was designed to keep out the so-called "one-day Democrats" who participate in Democratic primaries and conventions and Republican conventions, too. People who go to the GOP precinct conventions will have their poll taxes stamped "Republican." This shuts the door on their having any part in Democratic Party affairs until they get a new poll tax.

An intensive campaign has been under way for several weeks to educate voters to the new procedures and dates and the importance of their voting and coming to precinct conventions.

DOOR KNOB COSTS CUT
Amid a statewide hullabaloo over the cost of hardware came a quiet explanation that the door knobs in the State Office Building really cost only \$3.65, not \$36 apiece.

H. R. Nieman, executive director of the State Building Commission, said the cost of all the hardware for the building — including automatic closers, locks, keys, hinges and doorstops for 1,000 doors—came to \$36,000.

Nieman, who was not with the building commission at the time the State Office Building was constructed, called the hardware cost

Nieman's statement punctured a story that had been the subject of almost as many jokes as Pappy O'Daniel's flour barrel. It got started when a House committee on tax saving investigated the building which had cracks in the lobby's terrazzo floor.

TROUBLES EVERYWHERE
If sunny weather and disappearance of the flu has you feeling secure and content, the State Department of Health has bad news.

Health officials warn of three separate menaces:

1. Rabies is on the increase—up 33 per cent from this time last year. During the first three months of the year 219 positive cases were diagnosed.

2. It's the measles season with Travis County (Austin) leading the state with 250 cases reported. Nueces County (Corpus Christi) reported 205 and Galveston 172.

3. Stinging caterpillars are about and will be around feeding on trees and shrubs until fall. Health Department officials particularly urge parents to warn their children not to pick up the fuzzy, fascinating moth larvae. Stings should be treated as bee or wasp stings—by cleaning with alcohol and covering with calamine or other soothing lotion.

OIL SLUMPS FURTHER
Texas oil allowable has been further reduced to a permissible flow of 2,574,894 barrels a day for May.

An eight-day producing pattern, as low as at any recent time, was set by the Railroad Commission.

A number of independent producers ask for an even sharper cut to seven days. They said the industry was going into a lower-demand season with too much oil on hand.

Recent crude oil price cuts have intensified the general gloom of the Texas oil industry. It raises, too, the probability that state tax revenue from oil will fall substantially below expectations.

CRIMINAL CODE CHANGES
Directors of the State Bar of

Texas approved recommendations for extensive changes in the Texas Criminal Code.

But they took a "make haste slowly" view about taking the proposals to the Legislature. If enacted, the revisions would bring about considerable change in the way criminal court trials are conducted.

Bar directors suggested the proposals might be voted upon by lawyers and studied in seminars over the state before presentation to the Legislature in 1963.

Recommended changes would allow 11 jurors to return a verdict if one juror had to drop out and would leave the locking up of juries in criminal cases to the discretion of the judge.

LOAN SHARK INJUNCTION
Texas Supreme Court upheld state action against several loan companies accused of charging excessive interest.

It was the first test in the state's highest court in a field where the state has filed 365 suits against loan companies for charging more than the legal maximum interest. In other action, the Supreme Court ordered the participants in a fight over grazing rights in the Davis Mountain State Park to start all over with a new trial in district court.

At odds over the matter are the State Parks Board, which leased

the land for park use, and owners of grazing rights on the land. Owners of grazing rights locked the gates to keep the public from using the park for horseback riding. Parks Board declared this impaired its use as a public park.

Supreme Court said there was error on both sides and ordered a fresh start.

SURPLUSES AND SUBSIDIES

Sometimes we become extremely provoked when we see some of the one-sided writeups about farm surpluses. Thanks to Orin Stark of the First National Bank, Quitaque, Texas, for this article material.

From the tone of some metropolitan editorials you'd think that the only subsidy the government does out goes to agriculture. Just think for a minute and see how many times you can remember articles that belabor the help that the government gives to airlines, the petroleum industry, housing, or shipping to mention a few. During the past fifty years, for every \$1,000 this country has spent for subsidies, the American farmer has received only \$5.

You can pick up almost any newspaper or magazine and read countless articles on how much the United States spends per day on grain storage, and how much for wheat, cotton, butter, and wool, and other agriculture commodities. After reading all of this you get the impression that we must have enough stored away to last a lifetime. We have yet to see an article showing the net cost after the government settles these commodities, and for that matter very few articles even point out that we receive a big portion of the price support back after the commodity is sold.
