

Measures .31 Here Monday night's rainfall was

spotted over Garza County. measuring from a trace in some sections to slightly more than an inch in others.

The fall in Post was measured at .31 of an inch on the rain gauge from which records are kept by County Agent Lewis C. Herron.

Slightly more than an inch of rain is reported to have fallen in the north part of the county, although there was only a sprinkle northwest of town.

About half an inch was reported in the Graham community. No reports of the rainfall had been received from the south and east parts of the county.

While temporarily easing the heat wave, the rain was of little benefit to dryland crops, the county agent said. It was enough, however, to serve as an aid to irrigation farmers in watering their crops. The .31 of an inch measured here brought Post's total 1954 total through Aug. 2 to 8.52



As was the case around 1450, the power of the established Churches today has distinctly weakened. The rulers of the Western Nationa have today because timid, while the Ruasians are trying to theorb other mitternrepeating the pattern of 500 years ago.

H-Bomhs Varuus Movahie Type

History shows similar conditions existed when printing became powerful in 1450. This, like the H-Bomb, became a furgat to the entrenched rich political Kingdoms. The Church and Kings fought by legislation, perscention and wars; but the rise of the masses could not he stopped. The printed word became more powerful than the sword. Reformations. revolutions, and beheadings followed. The discovery of the H-Bomb is unsettling civilization today as did the birth of printing in 1450.

What About Capitalism?

Naturally we do not want to see entrenched capitalism collapse as did entrenched monarchism. We now use legislation, submit to high taxes, and endure small wars to protect our

'Signs Of Life' **Traffic Safety Program Is On**

"Know your signs of life-and stay alive!"

Col. E. B. Tilley of Houston, president of the Texas Safety Association, and services advisor osis?" for the Gulf Oil Corporation. gave this advice today to the people of Texas in referring to the "Signs of Life" traffic safety program which his group is conducting this month in cooperation with the Texas Department of Public Safety and the National Safety Council.

"Signs of life are the traffic signs, signals and pavement markings which remind motorists and pedestrians of the law and warn them of potential dangers on the road ahead," he said

"The name 'signs of life' is appropriate," he explained, "because countless lives would be saved if all drivers and walkers learned to recognize these signs | day morning. and tried to follow their directions with courtesy

"Special emphasis in the August program is being placed on publicizing the five basic shapes." Col. Tilley said.

"If drivers would learn these five shapes." he said. "they would know immediately what to expect when they saw one of these signs, for each shape carries a distinctive type of message.

He listed the basic sign shapes as follows

1. EIGHT SIDED, yellow and black or red and white. This sign means STOP-one message, one requirement - never any inings else.

2. DIAMOND, also yellow and black. This sign indicates danger ahead, carries such messages as School, Narrow Bridge, Men Working, or the directional symbols describing curves, intersections, side roads, etc. They mean: slow down, stay alert.

black or colored lettering. These tell of speed limits, mark no passing zones, give other regulatory information such as parking rules. Obey their messages.

ROUND, yellow and black signs warn of a highway-rallroad intersection 300 to 500 feet ahead. These signs call for reduced speed and extra caution. so the driver can make sure no train is coming before he drives

across the tracks. 5. RAILROAD CROSSBUCK marks the intersection of highway and railway. Cross only when the way is clear.
