Callahan County ASCS Office Says To Certify Crop Acreage Early

BAIRD — Certify Crop Acreage Early - The final date to certify peanut, cotton, feed grain and diverted acreage is August 1, 1970. When you have made the final adjustment of your crop acreage and are sure of the correct acreage, then certify at once.

By earlier certification you can expect program payments to be received at an earlier date.

If you are not sure of the correct crop acreage, then have it measured before certifying. The cost of measuring a crop is \$5.00 per plot plus \$3.00 for each additional plot, but not less than \$10.00 per farm.

Remember you can not adjust certified acreage but you can adjust measured acreage prior to certification. Request to measure crops must be filed by not supposed.
