



He said that to remove a water pipe line bottleneck into the present city reservoir to permit a 2.000,000 gallon daily capacity and to repair the reservoir would cost \$225,000 according to engineering estimates which would require a city bond issue to finance.

Beyond that we'd have to pay additional costs for the development of new wells and leases if water can be found," he declared The city now has a water debt of around \$400,000 on its present water field operations.

Mayor Shytles told Rotarians that "it is doubtful if we can hold our own as a city if we don't get White River water.





There really is no choice at all

It is difficult to sum up in five years of work, worry, planning, and cooperation on the part of the community leaders of four neighboring towns in one editorial.

We feel inadequate to the task.

But this is our assignment as we write the final editorial on the White River project before the all-important city water contract elections this Saturday.

All the arguments, as we can find them, are on the side of voting the water contracts, paying more for water than present rates, and accepting a new water district tax to make up the difference between water revenues and bond obligations until we can contract oil companies. the Postex Mills, or others for additional water sales

The choice is between the White River dam and a guaranteed 40-year future in our water supply, or searching desperately for some substitute which cannot be found today after years of looking.

Post's water field is failing rapidly. Field water soon will cost more than White River water, if field water can be had at any price. City officials figure Post will be lucky to pump adequate field water to the day that White River water will be available in over the two years. time it will take to build the dam, lay the pipelines, and get water into the lake.

There is no other source in sight for surface water either

The choice then is the White River dam, or the grave risk of a dried-up, dying town. That overwhelmingly supported the White River prois no choice at all. . . .

For those who would argue costs, what else have they to offer but in the end oblivion. So such arguments are not sound.

For those who would compare costs of White River water with recently publicized costs to proposed Canadian River project water to other South Plains towns and cities, they must first understand that the Canadian River water prices are for untreated water, whereas White River water will be delivered treated. The towns and cities buying Canadian water must set up their own treatment plans. This will make costs of White River water and Canadian River water very comparable

What's more the Canadian River project probably will take several more years to become reality than the White River dam, and time is of the essence. And again, it is doubtful if Post or the other White River towns today could get into the Canadian River project on any basis even if they so desired, not anyway on the ground floor basis with a guaranteed supply.

For those who complain that proposed White River water rates here are a lot higher than necessary with the White River delivering treated city water to our city limits at 30 cents per thousand gallons, let them take into account the \$400,000 water debt the city still owes and will have to pay on its present water field and the cost of operation of our water department.

Let them take into account not the anmunced interviews of our city council to yeads

just White River water rates just as soon as enough experience is obtained to do so. This means downward adjustments if and as soon as they can be made.

For some who may decry the tax rate of the water district, let them take into account the fact that the publicized tax rates are the maximum possible

Actually when additional water is sold, such as to oil companies for water flooding, the tax rates can be proportionately reduced. It is very possible that the tax rate will exist no longer than a very few years. History of all West Texas water projects indicates this to be the probability, not just the possibility.

This will not be a city tax rate, which can be diverted to other city uses when the need for water tax income is reduced or done away with. This will be a White River district tax needed only to pay off bonded indebtedness until such time as additional water revenues can be obtained to pay all the bonded indebetedness.

When the White River dam becomes actuality, the district will be in a position to contract for water sales to oil companies and there are companies definitely interested enough in this water to sign letters of intent to use it when it is obtainable.

The White River district directors have fought at every turn to keep the cost to a mini-Underground water is no substitute. Write it mum. The White River district tax is an unusual tax-in that its end is in sight before it is even levied.

Saturday we have the opportunity to solve this water problem for years to come by voting for the Water Contract Election—the final vote that stands between us and the White River Dam becoming a reality.

What would happen if we should turn it down? Where would we turn a few years from now if the underground water does play out as all the experts say it will? What would we do when there was no water, and there was no way of getting it? THE PROPOSED WHITE RIVER RESERVOIR

POINTS FOR YOU TO KEEP IN MIND

I. Although the White River Project would mean a substantial increase in your water bill for a few years, in the long run it would probably cost you less than an underground supply. Underground water is going to cost more and more as the years go by, while surface water costs will decrease.

2. White River Dam would give you a guaranteed source of good water for the foreseeable future, while you have no assurance at all from an underground supply. A very little checking will show you how rapidly the water level is going down in this area.

3. You will be required to pay an ad valorem tax to begin with. But everyone associated with this project believes the tax can be lowered and finally eliminated within a very few years. This has been the experience of every water district in West Texas.

4. If White River Dam is built the four member cities of the District will be the only cities in the entire South Plains with an adequate surface water supply. Only other major water project being considered in this area will take years to complete even after approval. Think what this can mean to the future economy of Crosbyton, Ralls, Spur and Post. We will be ahead of all the rest when industry starts looking for locations on the South Plains.

IT MAY BE NOW OR NEVER!

Three years ago when you voted the bond issue we told you that "It Might Be Now or Never" as far as the White River Project was concerned. Today this statement has more foundation than ever. At least two areas, one above and one below the proposed White River Dam Site, have realized their need for adequate water supplies and are looking with envy at the White River Project.

If you should turn it down, both these areas would be in position to file for water rights that we now hold. We have these rights only until March 31, 1961, and must make progress toward building the dam if we are to hold them. If we should turn down the proposition now, it would be up to us to show the State Water Board that we still intended to do something if we expected to hold the water rights.

Can we take the chance?

It's the Law in Texas

CLEVER ADS

Like some newspaper columns. newspaper advertising can be co pyrighted.

In 1903 Justice Oliver W Holmes declared that advertisements could be owned and copy righted even without having any special literary or artistic merit. An author, business, or agency that puts work and skill into an ad can protect it as a rule with a "general notice of copyright."

One publisher made special road maps for an advertiser, and got them copyrighted; the court held that the advertiser couldn't sell these maps to a rival publisher.

In another case a clever picture ran in one ad. The court told a competitor he couldn't use the same picture for his ad.

You cannot copyright som things such as a list of names publicly available or an ad so common it lacks uniqueness.

Most ads are "owned" by the advertiser, not the newspaper or magazine.

Ads which are run to get husi ness may also create property right in a "trade name" of great value to a business even without a copyright.

Besides, a business or product name itself may often be copyrighted. Now and then, unfortuna tely, a company name may be come so well known that without proper protection it can lapse in to the comon language and lose its character as property.

Trying to gain from someone else's ads may well get you in trouble

It can be a crime for anyone to violate a copyright on purpose, and he may have to pay money damages covering all his profits And then some

False or misleading ads can cause loss or suspension of certain business licenses; the post office sometimes gets rough if someone uses the mail to advertise fraudulently.

Of course ads aim to brag about one's product-a fact well known to the public. Therefore, within limits, some "puffing" is allowed But the Federal Trade Commission often stops advertisements if they are false or misleading, especialas to factual claims. ly:






> Cooper says that fish obtained from sources other than hatch eries usually contain undestrable species such as shad, carp, suckers. gar, mud-cat, etc. These undesirable species will compete with the game fish for food, they will eat young game species, some will muddy the pond water, and all will be a general nuisance to the fisherman.

> Another erroneous practice is to add grown fish to a freshly stock ed pend, Cooper continues. This 18 usually done so that the owner can "catch some big fish while the small ones are growing up. The owner must remember that

the grown fish have to eat, and in all probability they will eat the hatchery fingerlings. With this situation, it wouldn't be very long before the farmer had no fish. large or small, in his pond. Pond owners are usually wor-

The water contract, which voters are asked to approve Saturday, calls for the purchase of a minimum of about 242,000,000 galtons of water annually for 40 years (life of the White River District Post, Tahoka and Wilson will be bonds) at a cost of 30 cents per thousand galions for treated water delivered to the city limits.

Post's proposed White River warates would be a minimum of \$4.20 for the first 3,000 gallons, 73 cents per thousand for the next 7,000 gallons monthly and 65 cents per thousand for all used each month above 10,000 gallons.

The city council has announced it will revise these rates as soon as it has enough experience under White River operation to do so.

The water district tax, as pro-posed, would be 50 cents per \$100 on 80 per cent of real value of the property. Thus a \$10,000 home would be taxable on \$8,000 of value at 50 cents per \$100 cr \$40 per year

Has the "pain" label dissuaded anyone from taking the shots when they should have? There is no way of knowing. But Dr. Rich says he can readily imagine how could happen. From this point of view, the inaccurate label is dangerous since rables is endemic over most of Texas - particularly among wildlife, primarily foxes and skunks. A total of 567 positive

cases were reported last year, and for the first six months of this year 357 positive cases have been diagnosed

Rables vaccination carries slight risk of reaction, so should never be given thoughtlessly. It should always be given in cases of exposure to an apprehended animal known to be rabid, or an un-

apprehended animal in regions where rabies is known to exist.






