#### Election results leave job to be done

When Precinct 3 voted wet Saturday, the results joited the town. Many folks were utterly dismayed. Other thinking people said it will end a sham which needs ending.

It will be to the community's best interests now for everyone to remember that the Saturday vote was American democracy at work. A decision for legal liquor has been made by a majority of the voters in the precinct, whether you agree with that decision or not.

While the legality of legal liquor in a Garza County precinct is yet to be determined, according to our best information, it appears that liquor's sale across the counter will be allowed until a state supreme court decision finally settles it.

Now is the time to work for effective law enforcement of legal liquor. This will require the wholehearted support of everyone, no matter which side of the fence he or she was on during the recent wet-dry campaign.

It is time to explore the possibilities of legal liquor and see how much control of liquor sales the community actually can exert for its own welfare and the welfare particularly of its youth,

Law enforcement will need to be "beefed up" at both county and city levels. The people will need to fully support a crackdown on all types of both liquor and traffic violators.

Now is the time to "restudy" the problem of local law enforcement and to come to some real-

State liquor control agents have promised to give Post's new legal liquor problem full attention. But that won't be enough. Night-time officer patrols and a round-the-clock sheriff-police department radio operation are essentials.

This is not a time for bitterness and factional dispute. Rather it is the time for determination and purpose -JC.

Now that the wet-dry election is over with a 50-50 split in the outcome, the law enforcement problem is certain to spotlight lots of attention on the sheriff's race . . . and those two county. commissioner races should be humdingers.

That's why, now that you're beginning to accumulate a pocketful of campaign cards, you shouldn't look down your nose at the candidates and complain about too much politics this spring.

Look them over. Don't just nod and say hello. Ask them where they stand on things. You're going to be picking some men to help run your county through some trying times. You want the best. You want those with ideas, experience, and a point of view which matches your own.

When another Town Hall session is called. be there. Hear them answer panel questions. Be an informed voter with a knowledge of the can-

Nor should we overlook the fact that the state primary elections will come along in May too. We all complain about what is and what isn't done down at the state capital at Austin.

But most of us can't brag about the fact that we're doing our share as citizens and voters. We don't know the candidates-or the issues, gen-

Running for a state office isn't easy. It's hard to cover Texas, to get your name before the folks, and to get your views before them.

Meanwhile, Publisher Jim Cornish had phoned in the results from the Verbena box, and Ruby and I had something to go with instead of having to tell the callers that we didn't know any more than they did about how the elections had

BUT, TO GET back to some of the comments. One reaction jotted down by Ruby was, "Well, that makes our town stink real good!" Then, when I told someone of the results in Precinct 3, there was a brief pause, then just two words "Hot dog!"

Honestly, some people who didn't seem pleased with the election results acted as if we were responsible for it-when all we were doing was answering their ques tions about how the elections turned out. "Doggone, I hate that," said one of Ruby's callers.

Items of fixed cost may not be educed greatly, the specialist pointed out. These are such things as rent, taxes, interest and depreciation on buildings and equipment. Variable costs such as feed, seed, labor, fertilizer and pesticides may offer some savings if managed carefully. These inputs must be varied under different circumstances so that the total cost per unit will be reduced. AIM AT MAXIMUM

A safe guide is to aim at the maximum production from a given 'package' of resources-the land, tabor, facilities and equipment controlled by the operator. For examwould be uneconomical for a 100 acre cotton-grain farm; and the operator's labor would never be fully employed on this size unit. Thus, some investment costs may

inputs (feed, fertilizer, etc.) so long more than the added cost. For example, with corn selling at \$1 per bushel, and 50 pound units of nitrogen fertilizer costing \$5, the producer should add nitrogen only to the point where at least 5 extra added unit of fertilizer

One common procedure for cutting variable costs, said Bates, is substitute machine work for hand work, or pull two or more implements in tandem.

WASTEFUL PRACTICE Many livestock producers tend to keep their breeding dams in too high finish during gestation. Such practice may result in feed waste and poor development of the unborn animals because of lack of exercise of the mother, he emphasized. The livestock producer should also use feeders properly de-
