 In the interest of all health and business owners of Post, Garza Farm Store feels that concerned should be aware their responsibilities under Ordinance concerning garbage containers, specifications and penalties. Following is a print of that ordinance:

**SECTION 1**  
 Sec. 5, Ordinance No. 1, City of Post, July 6, 1959.

Said lids shall be removed while containers and receptacles are being filled or emptied. The case may be."

(Continued from page 1) West Germany or put in contact with relatives in West Germany. They then are flown to West Germany.

What do the people of West Berlin think of the current crisis and of their future? Patton says they think Khrushchev will back down if the U. S. stands up to him. They think, Patton said, the future holds a lot for them and they have faith that America will back them up.

Patton was one of 70 who flew to Europe June 30 from New York City by chartered airliner as a member of one of three YMCA and YWCA-sponsored European tours.

He visited London, Paris, Oslo, Stockholm, Copenhagen, Berlin, and Paris.

Purpose of the tour was to meet and talk to people of the countries visited, find out their views of this country, correct some of the misimpressions, and learn something for themselves of the situations and problems of the people in the countries visited.

The group was given a state department briefing before its departure overseas.

Patton said the people in all the countries he visited fear Communism—even in socialistic Norway. There, he said, the government is run by and works for the people. In Oslo, he added, the people took a great deal of pride in and expressed their appreciation for U. S. foreign aid and how it has helped them.

(Continued from page 1) sioners' court is in the process of having the land appraised. This appraisal will be used, he said, as a basis for the coming bond election which will be called as soon as possible to obtain money for the purchase of this right of way.

The engineer also reported that "we have completed plans for the widening and resurfacing of FM-651 from Post to the Crosby County line." He said this job will also include base stabilization and the easing of some of the steeper hills and sharper curves. Smith said this project will cost somewhere in the neighborhood of \$350,000. Construction probably will begin somewhere around the first of the year.

Another new highway development Smith reported was that of Farm Road 211 from US-84 across to Farm Road 122, a distance of about eight miles with a railroad overpass at Buenos Switch.

This project will cost approximately \$250,000. Smith said the plans have been ready for some time and "we hope to start construction as soon as the county is able to obtain the right of way."

SMITH TOLD Rotarians: "We of the department, are proud to be a part of an honest and efficient organization. Our primary purpose is to provide the best possible highways for the least amount of money and with the least amount of inconvenience to the traveling public. We appreciate the cooperation and support given us by the people of this community and we hope to continue this relationship in the years to come."

In opening his talk, the engineer pointed up some of the problems of the Texas highway department.

"Time has proven that a highway system is no better than the maintenance which it is given," Smith said. "One of our biggest problems today stems from the lack of funds for this work."

"The Colson-Briscoe Act added thousands of miles of farm to market roads to our system and provided no money for their maintenance. We have hundreds of miles of four-lane, divided highways built with the assistance of the federal government which are being maintained on the same budget which was set up for two lane roads. Our maintenance crews are managing to do a fairly efficient job but common sense will tell you that this is a spreading of things a little thin."

## Our project is among 'em

"If Texans can not change the weather, they can at least, through sound, far-sighted planning, conserve and develop water resources to supply their needs."

The above statement was included in a 200-page report presented Governor Daniel Friday on the state-wide water development plan proposing the construction of 45 new reservoirs to cover Texas' water needs by 1980.

Included among these 45 new reservoirs is our own White River project.

"This is one of the great things in the life of our state," the Governor said in accepting the report from the State Board of Water Engineers.

Copies of the report also went to all mem-

bers of the Legislature for their guidance. The report was ordered by the 57th Legislature.

The report pointed out that "through proper development, Texas will have adequate water to meet its municipal industrial needs in 1980 and sustain agriculture and other uses."

The citizens of Post, Crosbyton, Ralls and Spur—member cities of the White River Municipal Water District—should feel proud that their project for an adequate water supply is included in the projects covered in the state board's comprehensive report. Had we been less energetic and less farsighted where our water needs are concerned we could just as easily have been left standing at the switch.—CD.

## Watch those power mowers!

With grass lush from heavy rains, the whir of the power lawn mower fills the air from early morning until late in the evening. It is rare that you hear a my more the clackety-clack of the old-type hand mower pushed and pulled in jerks whose length is determined by the fishiness of the grass and the strength and energy of the one who is doing the pushing.

The power mower has revolutionized lawn work. It does a better job than the old hand mower and, of course, is much easier to operate. But it is also more dangerous. Like many other devices that are powered by gasoline, it can get out of hand when being operated by the inefficient, the careless or the reckless operator.

The accident rate among yard workers has risen alarmingly since the power mower came into wide use, and where toes and fingers fig-

ured in most of the hand mower accidents, more serious mishaps are being chalked up against the motor-driven mowers and their operators.

One of the more common types of accidents where power mowers are concerned involves flying objects struck by the blades of the mower and propelled in the general direction of operator. Power mower operators have been struck, and many seriously injured, by everything from iron bars to coat hangers. In the name of safety, it would be a good idea for the mower operator to make a thorough check of the area to be mowed to make sure that there are no loose objects lying around. And, of course, the first rule of safety for any power mower operator to remember is to shut the thing off, waiting until it comes to a dead stop, before approaching the "business end" to check for mechanical difficulties.—CD.

## It's a sign of the times

The absence of sheriff's posses and riding clubs in the Junior Rodeo parade here Wednesday of last week was regrettable, but is a "sign of the times" more than anything else.

Not a single out-of-town riding group put in an appearance here, although Junior Rodeo officers informed us that more than forty had been invited.

The handwriting on the wall as far as parade-participating riding groups are concerned has been more and more evident each successive year. The plain, unvarnished fact is that there just aren't as many of them now as there were a few years ago—back when the Junior Rodeo parade drew as many as 10 or 12 bands of riders from out of town.

A case in point can be found right here. Not too many years ago, Post had its own Stampede Riders, who throughout the rodeo season made one or more parades nearly every week—and the trophies they won are still around to show for it.

Some sheriff's posses and riding clubs even now exist in name only, and many of the more than forty invited to attend last week's parade here no doubt are in that category. On reason is that too many of the riders have too many other things to do, especially at this time of the year.

Not only the Post Juniors, but most other rodeos are going to have to depend less and less on organized riding groups as parade attractions unless the trend changes.—CD.

## Big mistake led to it all

But it will have to share honors with Mitchell, Ind., now that Grissom has rocketed to fame. Also, Lt.-Col. John H. Glenn of the U. S. Marines, third of the top three American astronauts, is from another small town, New Concord, Ohio (1,800).

"Let's see, your first name is Irene, isn't it?" the clerk asked. "No, honey," replied the customer. "My first name is Iva." So, instead of me having to make an apology, I stood by and listened to someone else make one. After the customer had left, I told the clerk that I'd also just called a woman Irene when her name was something else. ## Proposed missile bases add up to big 'maybe'

Put those rumors to rest. No missile bases are likely to be built this year or next in Garza County as part of the "missile silo ring" around Lubbock.

Cong. George Mahon said in Washington yesterday that a missile silo base for Lubbock looks "virtually impossible before 1962". The chairman of the house military affairs committee said the Air Force isn't expected to ask for either authorization or funds for such a project before 1962 at the earliest.

What has stirred up the rumors and the newspaper stories over

this area is the fact that the Air Force apparently has asked for and is getting an area survey for feasibility and planning purposes.

The Dispatch learned yesterday that at least three sites in Garza County—one across from the Post municipal airport only four miles from the city limits on the Ralls road—have been surveyed.

A second reported site is on the C. B. York land in the Canyon Valley community and the third is about halfway between those two.

Included in the area survey on the project probably will be seismograph tests to determine the earth's

structure. The missile silos will each be 80 feet deep into the ground and must be on a firm underground structure as possible.

It is understood that farmers through the area having sites under consideration have been approached for approval for such tests and necessary land easements.

What it appears to total up to is a big "maybe" as far as missile bases in this area are concerned.

A Dispatch reporter checked the site across the highway from the airport here yesterday on the Ralls road and found fence markings, but nothing staked out in the pasture as had been reported.

## Wildcats figure in oil activity

Gulf Oil Corp. will drill the No. 1 Frances Turbeville as an 8,200-foot Ellinger wildcat four and one-half miles south of Justiceburg.

It is one and three-quarters miles northwest of the Fluvanna (Strawn, Ellinger) pool area and two miles southeast of the South Rocker "A" (multipay) field.

Location is 1,340 feet from east and 1,192 feet from north lines of Section 685, Block 97, H&TC survey. It is one-half mile north of an 8,210-foot duster and seven-eighths of a mile west-northwest of an 8,360-foot dry hole, both barren in the Ellinger.

It will be necessary for the proposal to carry in both districts because the two are consolidated.

During the last few years, the two-teacher Close City school has offered instruction only through the 7th grade.

## Wildcat try is set for county

Garza County has drawn a new wildcat location near Post, and a wildcat has been completed near Justiceburg as a San Andres discovery to highlight oil activities here.

J. Paul Karcher of Midland will drill the No. 1 Post-Montgomery about three miles north of Post as a 3,900-foot Glorieta test.

It is 330 feet from north and 1,693 feet from west lines of Section 12-18 TTRR Survey, three-quarters of a mile northeast of the Garza field.

Four miles southeast of Justiceburg, J. E. Blakey Jr. of Justiceburg completed his wildcat No. 1 A. D. Justice as a San Andres discovery.

Potential was pumping for \$3.82 barrels of 35.8 gravity oil plus 20 per cent water. Gas-oil ratio was too small to measure.

Bottomed at 2,012 feet with 5 1/2-inch casing set at 2,003 feet, completion was from open hole section, 2,003-102 feet, after acidizing with 1,000 gallons and fracturing with 20,000 gallons.

It spots at 2,310 feet from north and 330 feet from east lines of Section 3, Block 6, H&GN Survey, one-half mile north and west of the Dorward field, on an 80-acre lease.

## Divided Berlin 'city of contrasts'

Joseph Patton, a design engineer for the Texas Highway Department here, flew home last week from the world's hottest trouble spot, Berlin, surprised to find such a grim contrast between the eastern and western halves of that divided city.

To Patton, Berlin was just another European city until he went into the eastern sector and saw the complete contrast with West Berlin.

In West Berlin, he found a busy streets, bustling with activity, and

with many new buildings. East Berlin, in contrast, was still in World War II ruins except for a "show window boulevard" with new buildings and shops.

"It was just a front, but as a result people in East Berlin think West Berlin is just a 'front' too for the western world."

In a Berlin refugee camp, he attended a briefing for the camp commander who said that refugees fleeing from the East have no idea of what life is really like in the

Resident engineer tells Rotarians

## Garza highway expenditures since 1957 top \$3 million

The Texas State Highway Department has spent \$3,102,153.27 in Garza County, since moving its resident office here in 1957, Julian Smith, senior resident engineer in charge of the office, told Rotarians at their Tuesday luncheon.

This figure does not include the cost of land and buildings which have been built on the south edge of town, he added.

During this time, Smith said, the only financial outlay which was required of the county was the acquiring of the right of way for Farm Road 669.

Taking a look at Garza's current highway picture, Smith reported that the contract, which is nearing completion on US-84 south of Post is the final phase of a first class, four-lane, divided highway from Post to the Curry County line.

"THIS SECTION OF US-84 is a part of an ultimate ten year plan, begun in 1957, the goal of which is a four-lane, divided highway from Roscoe on Interstate 20 to Farwell on the New Mexico state line, including the bypassing of Snyder, Slaton, Lubbock, Shallowater, and Littlefield."

Smith told Rotarians that a Post bypass is not included in this program "but will be scheduled should the City of Post ask for it, or when traffic conditions become intolerable as they have in Slaton."

The engineer said the resident office in Post has been assigned the

Lynn County section and the Slaton bypass on US-84. "We have completed the location around Slaton and right-of-way is now being purchased," he said. "We are well along with the basic planning of the system."

Smith also reported that "we

have completed the location for construction of a four-lane, divided highway from "the top of the cap" to Southland on US-84 north.

THE DEEDS for this land are now in the hands of the county judge, Smith said. The commission (See HIGHWAY, page 8)

## Five youths hurt in Saturday night fray

Nine youths, two of Post and the others of Slaton and El Paso, have paid fines and costs in Justice of the Peace D. C. Roberts' court for a Saturday night gang fight that sent five of the youths to the hospital here.

Another Post youth was charged in county court for his part in the fight. He, too, received treatment at the hospital.

Sheriff L. F. (Fay) Claborn Jr. said today he is still conducting an investigation into the free-for-all, which took place on an isolated road about a mile north of the old drive-in theatre here after having started at the rodeo grounds.

The two Post youths paying fines and costs of \$24.70 each in justice of the peace court were Richard Ray and Jerry Ligon, both about 18. The other Post youth, Gary Robinson, was charged in

county court. Robinson, the most seriously injured of the three, was slashed on the neck. He was treated and released at the hospital.

Ray received a gash on his head and Ligon a face laceration. Both received hospital treatment.

The sheriff said the type of weapon or weapons used on the Post youths was not known, but that at least one pocket knife was believed to have been used in the fight.

The other injured youths were Herman Luther Talley and Jerry Franklin Nelms, said by officers to be from El Paso. Talley received a gash on the left side of his face and Nelms was cut on the back of the head.

Talley and Nelms paid fines and costs of \$24.70 each in justice of the peace court, along with Kelly (See GANG FIGHT, page 8)
