#### THE ENGAGEMENT RING

At the time of their engagement, John gave Judy an expensive diamond ring. He also gave her a wrist watch for her birthday the following summer.

One evening, to John's surprise, Judy told him that she was breaking their engagement. Later John asked Judy to return his engagement ring and the wrist watch. She refused, claiming that they were given with no strings attached. John maintained that the ring and wrist watch were given to Judy after their engagement, and that he would not have given them. to her if they had not been engaged.

Is John correct? Does he have a legal right to have the engagement ring and the wrist watch returned?

Yes, John is right, at least a far as the engagement is concerned. In similar cases the courts have said that an engagement ring is a symbol or pledge of the coming marriage, and signifies that the one who wears it is e ngaged to marry the man who gave it to her. If the engagement is broken off, the ring should be returned since it is a conditional gift.

It would be unusual for a man, In giving a woman an engagement ring, to tell her that she must give it back if they do not get married. However, even though no such express condition is imposed, the law will imply one because of the symbolic significance of the ring.


The giving of the wrist watch is an entirely different proposition. True, it was given after the parties became engaged. The watch though, has no symbolic meaning and is only a token of the love and affection which John bore for Judy. Under the law there is no consideration required for a gift. It is absolute once made, unless a condition is imposed. There was no condition here, and the law will not imply one as in the case of the engagement ring since the wrist watch has no symbolic meaning attached to it.

### Let's practice what is preached

Garza countians are urged to join in a statewide effort to "awaken the conscience of every driver" in behalf of safe and legal driving. This effort will be undertaken on "Safety Sunday," Dec. 10, through the cooperation of church congregations with the Governor's Highway Safety Commission and citizen traffic safety support

The Governor has asked pastors of all Texas churches to "remind their members of their personal and moral responsibility to drive carefully, to obey the traffic laws and to protect the sanctity of human life in our State."

Governor Daniel also said in his "Safety Sunday" proclamation, "experience . . . indicates that the solution to the traffic problem lies in the hands of the individual driver . . . and that useless infliction of human injury is an abuse of God's most precious gift, life itself."

As in past years, "Safety Sunday" will signal the opening of the annual Christmas-New Year's holiday traffic safety campaign. Principal objectives of the annual year-end traffic safety program will be to hold the actual death toll below the estimate of the Texas Department of Public Safety and to slow year-end fatalities in an effort to keep the total below that of 1960, which was 2,254.

Many Post churchgoers will, no doubt, hear their pastors stress "Safety Sunday" at services here this coming Sabbath. To help make the effort worthwhile, they are urged not to fail to practice what is preached.-CD

## 20 years ago today–Pearl Harbor

Twenty years ago today-before thousands of young men now serving in the nation's armed services were born-the Japanese pulled their sneak attack on Pearl Harbor, plunging the United States into World War II, which even then had been under way for more than two years in Europe.

"A day that will live in infamy" is the way the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt described the Dec. 7 attack on Pearl Harbor, and an infamous attack it was, with many of the scars still remaining.

The world had never known a war such as the world-wide conflict that followed Pearl Harbor, but the disquieting consensus of today is that a World War III would make World War II seem tame by comparison. The attack on Pearl

Harbor, as devastating as it was, would seem insignificant when measured against a nuclear war attack on the same scale.

Nuclear bombs and other weapons, whose force stagger the imagination, have been developed since World War II, in which they got their start. To a thinking man or woman, the development of such weapons is, in itself, sufficient argument against the outbreak of a nuclear war. But thinking isn't always the long suit of warlords.
