The statistical category was a close score with Anson coming out on top. Anson had 219 total yards while Baird has 152. Anson had 13 downs to 10 for the Bears.

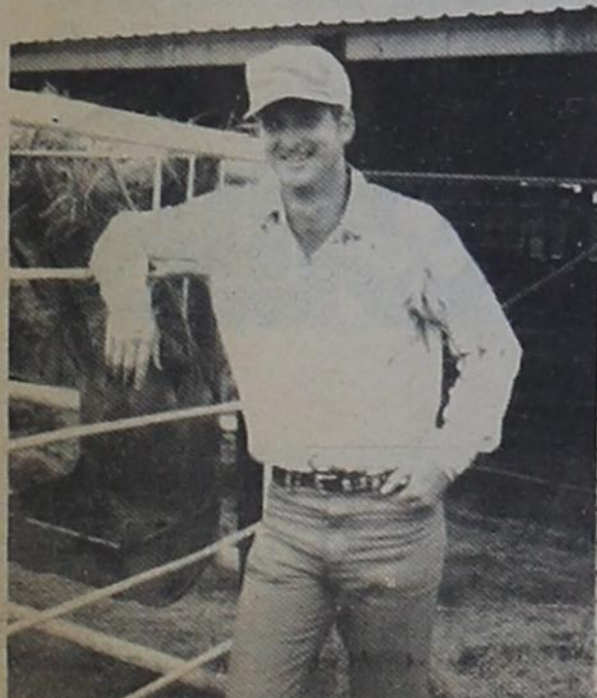
First half scores came on a blocked punt by Anson which was recovered in the endzone for a touchdown. The Baird touchdown came with a fumbled punt

Staggered Registration to Begin In 1978 for Efficiency

Your 1977 vehicle registration will expire midnight April 1, as usual, and must be renewed by that deadline.

Beginning January 1, 1978, a new law requires that vehicle registrations be converted to a new system with registrations expiring on a staggered basis in different months throughout the year.

To convert to the new system next year, registration periods for passenger cars and light trucks (such as pickups) will be staggered. All other registrations (including personalized plates) will remain the same.

On or about January 1, 1978, you should receive in the mail a renewal notice for each of your vehicles. The passenger car and light truck renewals will be staggered for various periods and

license fees will be prorated accordingly. (Renewal periods will be assigned according to the license plate numbers)

After your vehicles are registered under the new staggered system, all future registrations will be for periods of 12 months.

You will be issued a month and a year sticker for your license plates and that month and year will be permanently yours for 12 months.

The new system should permit more efficient service by having an equal number of registrations expire each month throughout the year; and in subsequent years, after 1978, it should eliminate those traditional long lines that form each March at the county tax assessor-collector's office.

Seven Amendments to be Voted on November 8

Registered voters of Callahan County will go to the polls on Tuesday, November the 8th from 7:00-7:00 in the Constitutional Amendment Election.

Pricint 1 will vote at the Baird Community Center; Pricint 2, Lion's Club Building in Clyde; Pricint 3, Cross Plains City Hall; Pricint 4, Wagley Garage Building in Putnam; Pricint 5, Eula School Cafeteria; Pricint 6, Denton Valley Baptist Church; Pricint 7, Oplin Community Center and Precint 8, at the Clyde Assembly of God Church.

The seven Constitutional Amendments are:

NUMBER ONE:

The constitutional amendment increasing the size of Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges.

NUMBER TWO:

...Provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veteran's land fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

NUMBER THREE:

...permit denial of bail to a person

charged with a felony offense who has therefor been twice convicted of a felony offense...

NUMBER FOUR:

...authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources.

NUMBER FIVE:

...authorizing the formation of agricultural and marine associations which may be mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvements of production, marketing, or use of their products.

NUMBER SIX:

... to give the legislature power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines.

NUMBER SEVEN:

...change the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission of Judicial Conduct, and relatin to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the supreme court, or court of civil appeals justices serving in a place of the Supreme Court....

Correll Receives 3 Years Probation for Felony Possession

Charles Paul Correll, 30, of Baird, received a 3 year probated prison term and a \$1,000 fine Thursday, October 20, 1977, from 42nd District Court after a guilty plea to felony possession of marijuana. Judge Don Lane presided the hearing.

Wife, Rhonda Bouldin Correll, was indicted with Mr. Correll after officials

executed a search warrant on March 7. Officials searched their home at 511 Walnut, and confiscated more than 18 ounces of marijuana and 41 plants growing in pots.

The charges against Rhonda were dismissed after her husband pleaded guilty to the charges against him.



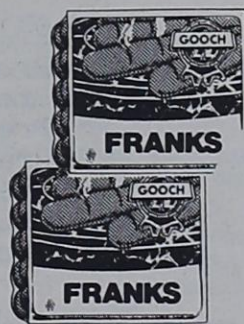



Sleeping Sickness Case Recently Diagnosed

A case of Equine Encephalomyelitis (sleeping sickness) was recently diagnosed in a horse in Baird. The diagnosis was confirmed as the Western form of Equine Encephalomyelitis by the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Lab from a blood sample drawn by Dr. Rob Harle.

Although the Western form of sleeping sickness is the least likely of the three forms of sleeping sickness to kill an animal, Dr. Harle urges all horse owners who have not vaccinated their horses this year to have them vaccinated as soon as possible.

Western Equine Encephalomyelitis is a virus affecting both horses and humans and is spread by the mosquito.

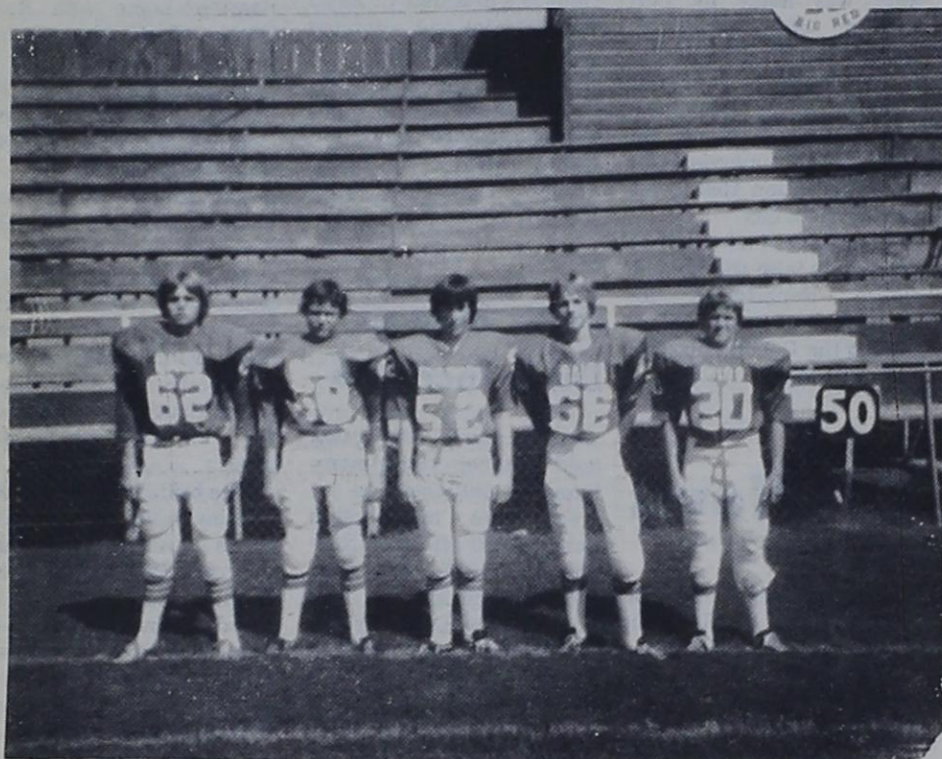

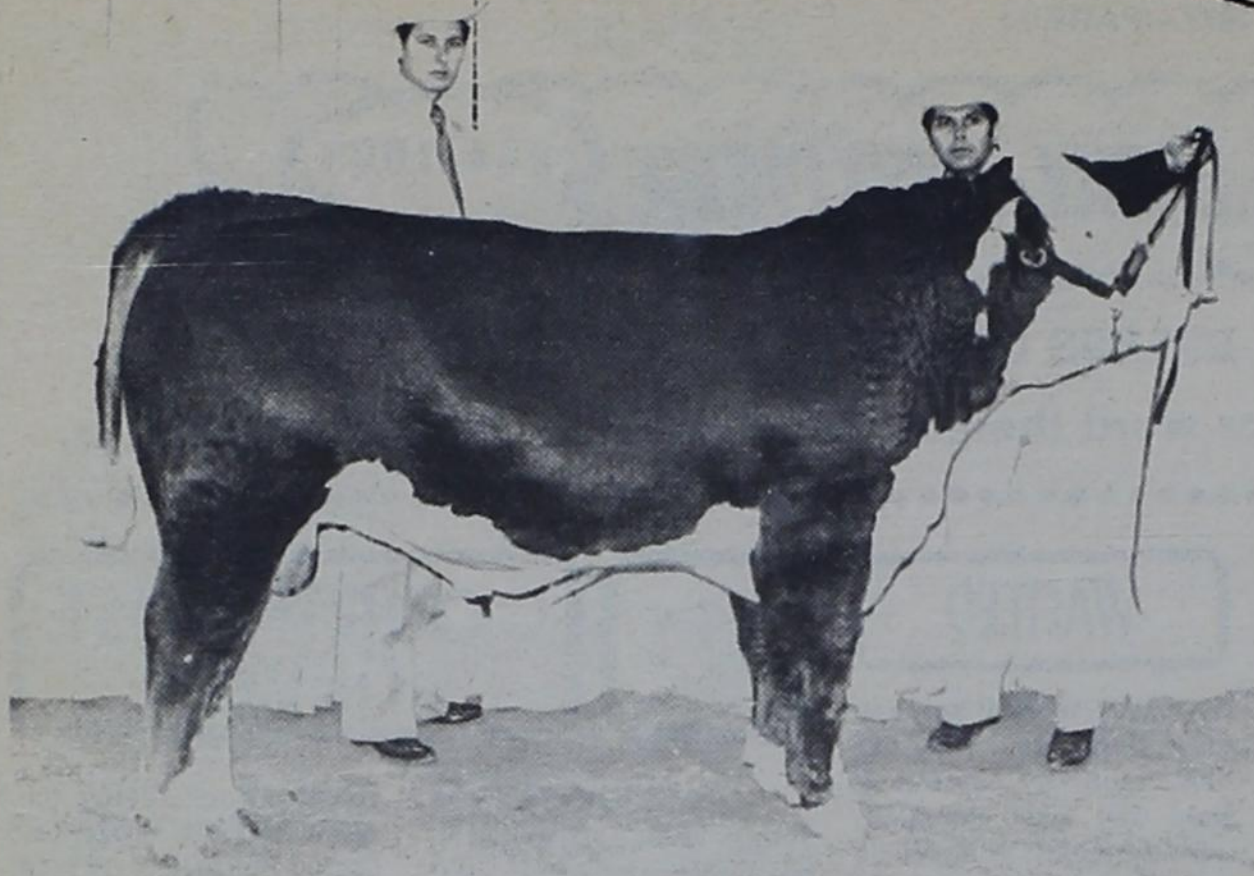


