Bryan Farmer Receives **Highest FFA Degree**

Bryan Farmer of Eula received the American Farmer Degree November 10 at ceremonies held during the 50th National Convention of the Future Farmers of America, in Kansas City, Missouri. He is one of the 801 FFA members selected to receive the American Farmer Dgree, he joins a select group representing about one percent of all FFA mem-

Bryan is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J.J. Farmer of Eula.

Each American Farmer Degree recipient is presented a gold key and certificate by the Future Famers of America. They also receive a cash award for travel to Kansas City and attend a breakfast in their honor both of which are co-sponsored by the National FFA Foundation, In., of Des Moines, Iowa; The Federal Land Bank Systems of the United States; Amoco Oil Co. of Chicago; and the Chevrolet Motor Division, General Motors Corporation of Detroit, Michigan.

The American Famer Degree is the highest degree of membership in the FFA. It is presented only by the National Organization of Future Farmers of America to members who have demon strated exceptional agricultural and leadership ability. Sate FFA Associations may submit candidates for the American Famer Degree based on total FFA membership in the state. The 801 members awarded the American Farmer Degree this year represent the highest


achievement of more than 509,735 FFA members in 8,143 high school vocational agriculture departments.

All the FFA members who receive the American Farmer Degree begin "Greenhands". after at least one semester of vocational agriculture, members may be advanced by the local chapter to the degree of "Chapter Farmer." The third degree, that of "STate Farmer" is presented by the State FFA Association and only students who have earned the State Famer Degree are eligible for the American Farmer Degree.

In addition to having earned the State Farmer Degree, candidates for the American Farmer Degree must have been active members of the FFA for at least three years. They must have a record of participation in local and state FFA activities and they must have completed all of the voacatioanl agriculture instruction offered in their high school. American Farmer applicants must have earned at least \$1,000 by their own efforts and they must have demonstrated leadership and cooperation in student, cahpter, and community activities.

The National FFA Convention is an annual event of the Future Farmers of America and is carried out in cooperation with the U.S. Office of Education, of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. This year over 20,000 FFA members, vocational agriculture teachers. parents, and guests are taking part in the 50th National FFA Convention.







THE DESOLATE WILDERNESS

Here beginneth the account of Nathaniel Morton, secretary and keeper of the records for the Plymouth Colony, concerning those memorable circumstances of the year 1620:

'So they left that goodly and pleasant city of Leyden, which had been their resting place for above eleven years, but they knew that they were pilgrims and strangers here below, and looked not much on these things, but lifted up their eyes to heaven, their dearest country, where God had prepared for them a city (Hebrews 11:16) and therein quieted

When they came to Delfs-Haven they found a ship and all their things ready; and such of their friends as could not come with them followed after them, and sundry came from Amsterdam to see them shipt, and to take leave of them. One night was spent with little sleep with most, but with friendly entertainment and Christian discourse, and other expressions of true Christian love.

"The next day they went on board, and their friends with them, where truly doleful

was the sight of that sad and mournful parting, to hear what sighs and sobs and prayers did sound amongst them; what tears did gush from every eye, and pithy speeches pierced each other's heart, that sundry of the Dutch strangers that stood on the Key as spectators could not refrain from tears. But the tide (which stays for no man) calling them away, that were thus loath to depart, their Reverend Pastor, falling down on his knees, and they all with him, with watery cheeks commended them with the most fervent prayers unto the Lord and His blessings, and then with mutual embraces and many tears they took their leaves one of another, which proved to be the last leave to many of them.

"Being now past the vast ocean, in a sea of troubles before them in expectations, they had now no friends to welcome them, no inns to entertain or refresh them, no houses, or much less towns, to repair unto to seek for succor; and for the season, it was winter, and they that know the winters of the country know them to be sharp and violent, subject to cruel and fierce storms, dangerous to travel to no places, much more to search unknown coasts.

'Besides, what could they see but a hideous and desolate wilderness, full of wilde beasts and wilde men? And what multitudes of them there were, they then knew not: for which way soever they turned their eyes (save upward to heaven) they could have but little solace or content and respect of any outward object, for summer being ended, all things stand in appearance with a weather-beaten face, and the whole country full of woods and thickets, represent a wilde and savage hew






