Carrying a message of the future

The Dispatch today salutes the Texas Industrial Commission as the No. 1 unit in Texas state government today which is getting the most mileage out of the taxpayers' dollars.

And mighty few of them they get, too.

At the West Texas Press Association's winter meeting in Vernon over the weekend we heard Harry Clark, executive director of the industrial commission, who was our principal speaker.

Harry brought a message which came through "loud and clear" to us-and we hope we can impart some of the enthusiasm Harry has to our Post Chamber of Commerce and its industrial committee.

Some of the things Clark told us were well nigh unbelievable

As you know Texas was the last state in the nation to organize an industrial development commission. It came about in 1958 and required the approval by Texans of a constitutional amendment to permit Texas to advertise and promote industry with the taxpayers' dollars.

Well, this is to report that on a paltry few dollars, the Texas Industrial Commission is an outstanding success.

Clark, a nationally-known industrial developer, took over his present job in January, 1962.

Today, Clark, besides himself, has a staff of only five persons, including two women office secretaries. He has an annual budget of only \$179,000 on which to operate. That today is the lowest per capita amount being spent by any state industrial commission.

But look at the results. In 1963 Texas ranked second, behind only New York, as the state securing the most new industries within its borders during the year. In 1963 it received the national award as the state industrial commission doing the most effective job.

Clark showed us a number of "mail outs" of the industrial commission which have gone into the office of 5,000 of the nation's leading industrialists. They were superb-eye catching and attractive. He showed us a small ad series run in some of the nation's top magazines out of that small \$179,000 budget. They were judged to be the most appealing ad series to appear last year in any of the magazines from industrial commissions

When Harry gets a reply from a mail-out or ad, he puts them on what he calls his "suspect list" and makes the list of over 100 firms available to every city industrial foundation or Chamber of Commerce seeking new industry.

Harry Clark has the other two members of his staff traveling like himself constantly back and forth across Texas meeting with Chamber industrial committees and community industrial foundation directors.

He puts out a monthly news letter, filled with new ideas on seeking new industry, to all Chambers and industrial foundations interested.

In other words, he runs the promotion campaign from Austin and encourages Texas communities to do the "follow-ups". He says some towns are "geared to go" for new industry and some aren't. The ones that are get all the help they want from his office, including personal advice on problems and how to go about the job.

This is something Post needs to take advantage of and we hastened after Clark's address to get a supply of his community service mail-outs coming our way for Chamber consideration,

Harry hammered at the theme, as others have before him, that the national trends are for big cities to grow bigger and small towns to grow smaller until 1980 when the trend will be reversed due to saturation living conditions in the big cities. He urged the small towns to get organized and buck the tide.

He said that U. S. industry, built from the revolution in 1776 to the end of World War II, is due to increase 100 per cent in the 25 years from the end of the last conflict to 1975. This, he said, will account for the big job increase.

Harry Clark is carrying a message of the future all over Texas. We want him to bring it to Post. We want the Post Chamber to reorganize and activate itself with a full-time, professional Chamber manager this year and get on with the all important job of Post's future.

It is going to take some dedication, a lot of time, and some money on all our parts. But as Harry Clark said there is no room for complacency in any small town today.
