Education, Not CCC is answer

The jobless rate among youths is two or three time that of the rest of the population.

That fact has been haunting the Kennedy Administration in Washington which wants to spin the clock back 30 years and re-activate the old Civil Conservation Corps in which they hustled the young men off into work camps by the thou-

That's no answer. We guess we should call this kind of stuff "the old deal". It certainly isn't new anymore.

After such pick and shovel tours the youths would be no better prepared for home town jobs than before, it has been pointed out by those who oppose seeing such another federal boundoggle start mushrooming.

The core of the problem is getting our youth trained to step into industry, instead of, as so many of them do, "dropping out" of high school before graduation unprepared to do anything but common labor.

Uneducated and unskilled people are not wanted for jobs. Therefore, the answer is in education and training. Jobs for people with skill and education are plentiful.

You can read today that the latest trend in college education is to cram a four-year college education into three years. Why? Simply because

a bachelor's degree today is about as useful as a high school diploma was to the last generation.

If you really want to train your mind for the promising fields today it requires considerable graduate work-master's and even doctor's de-

Parents of young people must work hard to guide their sons and daughters not only through high school, but as far down the college road as they can go.

Another part of the problem is the early marriage. It is extremely difficult for young man, who has the obligation of providing for a wife and probably children, to go to college and obtain the education he needs for today's challenges.

The old fashioned idea of a young man completing his education and at least getting into his starting blocks in the business world before marriage is still by far the most sensible.

Youth unemployment in our big cities today is really a frightening thing. But it is bad enough in small communities such as ours,

The more complex the life, the more preparations youth needs to make for it. And that's the core of today's unusual youth unemployment problem. Most of the unwanted are simply not

Tornado sophistication needed

It's about that time of year-for the thunderheads to start brewing twisters and spewing them up "tornado alley" through northwestern New Mexico, West Texas, Oklahoma, and on into Kansna and Missouri

The nice thing about it is that along with all the threatening weather come the rain cloudsand once in a while a hard, slushing spring rain-

Science has zeroed in on the formadoes the last few years. Radar has beloed to pinpoint the viclous funnels and to truck them across country

Now torondo pierts are sounded for large areas even as the thundernesses are building up When an actual furmed is aposted on radar any community to its path is immediately alerted by the weather bureau

Law enforcement officials then race out and stand guard on the approaches to the town. If they sirens, radar, and TV-JC

see it coming they radio the alarm into the police department and the "take shelter" alarm button is pushed to send the citizen running for their shelters-or their neurest neighbor's.

The only trouble with all this is that this enving emphasic on tornadoes; makes nervous wrecks out of lots of otherwise sensible people.

The TV stations overdo it breaking into programs-if you happen to be watching-to scare a lot of indice half to death.

Science has come a long way. Now it's up to as-the people-to keep pace.

We we got to be a bit more sophisticated about our tornadoes. If we can't adjust to the tornado warnings, it probably would be better to do away with the whole setup.

After all, we didn't lose many folks when it was everybody for himself-without three-pitch

How about two rodeos in one?

We understand that the agreement to combine the two shows was reached only after careful consideration, so it stands to reason that officials of both shows will bend every effort to have as outstanding a show as it is possible to have.

The way it will be set up, the junior rodecers will not be able to count points toward American Junior Rodeo Association standings, but then go on with it -CD

Stamps are scarce on Sundays

The main thing we've noticed about postage stamps going up from four cents to a nickel is that they cost a penny more, but there is something else: It is much more difficult now to buy a stamp on Sunday than it was when they cost only four cents.

For some reason or another-maybe because the new five-cent stamps wouldn't fit-business places here that sold stamps from vending machines aren't doing it anymore. These vending machines were owned by the business places, not by the Post Office Department, and post office personnel explain that any decision to stop vending the stamps by machine was made by the machine's owner.

The assistant postmaster here said that since the post office lobby remains open 34 hours, a

stamp vending machine cannot be placed there because it would be contrary to postal regulations.

The best way, it seems, to assure yourself of stamps you might need on Sunday is to lay in a supply while the post office is open. Incidentally, the assistant postmaster said they are selling quite a few more book of stamps since the price advanced to a nickel than they were when the stamps cost four cents. The reason, no doubt, is that visc can buy 20 of the five-cent stamps in a book for \$1, which means that no extra charge is made for the book, as was the case before the stamps went up to a nickel. The assistant postmaster said that since the

price boost they are selling more five-cent stamps in books than they are in sheets -- CD

TRUST ARRANGEMENTS

When property is placed in trust is turned over to a trustee who will see to it that it is properly managed for the benefit of a person or persons you name as beneficiaries. It is a method of disposing of your property and may be used in conjunction with a will.

Trusts have many advantages. A trust may be used to provide income for persons unable to support themselves, to provide funds for a child's education, as a means of establishing an annuity, or to provide a gift for a charitable institution.

In these days of high taxes, a trust may be utilized to minimize the tax burden. If carefully planned, a trust may decrease income and inheritance taxes.

A trust arrangement works roughly in this manner. A person who desires to create a trust is called a grantor. The grantor chooses a trustee. The trustee may be a bank, an individual, or a trust company. The grantor through a trust instrument tells the trustee how to distribute the trust property or income. The trustee will then water skiing. Frank Franklin and proceeds or property in whatever manner the grantor desires.

A very common arrangement is to place the property in trust with directions to pay the income from the property to a wife for her lifetime, and upon her death the trust to end and the property to be distributed to the grantor's children.

An interesting type of trust is that which is sometimes called a spendthrift trust. This is an arrangement whereby one sets up a certain sum of money to be given out to another at a definite rate per month or per year, or under definite restrictions.

Trust property quite often consists of securities. The law regulates the type of property in which trust funds may be invested. However, the grantor may designate the type of investments the trustee may make.

The effectiveness of a trust is dependent largely on its proper creation. To avoid the pitfalls and danlawsuits and ineffective trust operations, a trust instrument should be properly prepared. A poorly planned or carelessly drawn trust instrument can not only defeat the objectives of its creator, but may prove costly as well.

Q. As an enlisted man in the reserve I was recalled to active duty and I have been told my former job will not be waiting for me What should I do?

A. If you are refused reemploy ment and you apply for it within 31 days after release from service you should report immediately to the nearest state employment of fice or, if you were working for the Federal government, to the nearest office of the Civil Service Commission. This benefit is administered in the case of private employment by the Bureau of Veterans Reemployment Rights of the Department of Labor.

Q. I am a veteran, but I did no serve in either World War II or in Korea. I am applying for a federal job under Civil Service. Do l get any veteran's preference?

A. There is a 5-point preference for peacetime veterans if they have been in campaigns or expeditions for which a badge or service me dal is authorized. A 10-point pre ference is granted peacetime veterans if they meet the above condition and were wounded in action have a service-connected disability retrement benefits or pension. To
