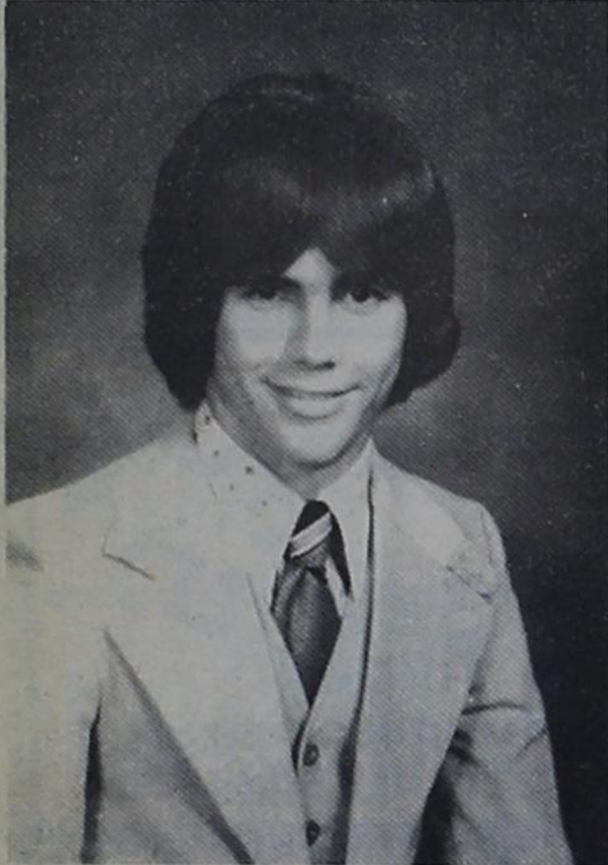

Stenholm To Ride In Rodeo Parade Saturday

BAIRD—The 1979 Callahan County Sheriff's Posse will open at 8 p.m. nightly May 10, 11 & 12 at the arena in Baird.

Producer of this year's show is Terry Walls of Stephenville. Dick Vestal will serve as announcer during the three-night run.

Advance tickets will sell for \$2.00 for adults and \$1.50 for ages 6-12. Admission at the gate will be \$2.50 per adults and \$2.00 for ages 6-12.

will be Congressman Charles Stenholm, who will be riding in a car furnished by Hanner Chevrolet. All entries are to meet at Chief's Texaco at 4:30 p.m. Saturday.

All children are encouraged to decorate their bikes and join the parade. All bikers are to meet near the Baird Drive In at 4:30 p.m.

In conjunction with the parade, the Baird Chamber of Commerce will be sponsoring a barbecue dinner with all the trimmings at the Baird Fire Station located downtown, beginning at 4 p.m.

So join the fun, enjoy a home-cooked meal and thrill to exciting rodeo competition May 10, 11 & 12!

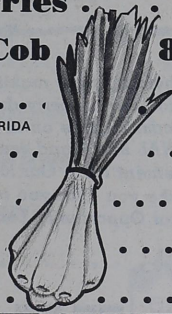

Hospital To Present Featured Papers

BAIRD—Dr. Emil L. Vilfranca, PhD, Administrator of Callahan General Hospital in a news release today announced that the Callahan General Hospital is a member of the Hubbard Lake Hospital Group, Inc. Ticks to Be Problem in '79

COUNTY—It looks like 1979 will be another bad year for heavy tick populations, according to Greg Gerngross, County Extension Agent.

Tick populations increase dramatically with warmer weather causing inconvenience and health hazards for homeowners and pets.

Ticks are biting, blood sucking parasites and their bites may become inflamed and infected due to toxic secretion. Tick Paralysis, Tularemia and Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever may be transmitted through tick bites. The American dog tick and the brown dog tick are the most common in this area.

Regardless of the species, control is basically the same for all ticks. Household sprays containing 0.5 percent diazinon or ronnel will control light infestations. Heavy infestations in the home may require treatment by professionals.

Outside the home where vegetation is thin, use 5 percent carbaryl (Sevin) dust at the rate of 1/2 pound per 1,000 square feet. Increase the rate if vegetation is thicker. If using a spray-mix five tablespoons of 25% diazinon emulsifiable concentrate in one gallon of water. Apply one gallon of spray per 1,000 square feet. Carbaryl gives the best residual control. When spraying, pay particular attention to roadsides, animal trails and paths.

Pet owners should examine their animals frequently. Light infestations can be controlled by rubbing carbaryl dust into the pets hair. Also treat the animals sleeping quarters every week.
