## Bears Win District Opener Against Hawley Bearcats

BAIRD-The Baird Bears started district play with a big win over the Hawley Bearcats, 21-0.
The first quarter remained scoreless, but Baird jumped ahead in the second quarter 14-0.
Greg Austin ran 34 yards for a touchdown. Alan Bohannon kicked the extra point. Next, Baird covered an on-side kick and Austin again scored. His second run was 28 yards. Bohannon again kicked the extra point.
During the thirc quarter, Baird recovered a fumble on the Hawley four yard line. Will Morgan took the ball across the goal line two plays later. Bohannon added
the extra point.
The fourth quarter was scoreless for both teams.
Baird had five first downs, rushed for 137 yards and completed one out of eight passes. They had four penalties for 40 yards and lost 2 fumbles.
Hawley had eight first downs and 104 rushing and 32 passing yardage. They completed 2 of 12 passes and lost 2 fumbles. The Bearcats had three penalties for 22 yards.
The Baird Bears will travel to Hamlin Friday, October 19, so everybody come out and support your team.
The Jr. Varsity will not have a game this week because of cancellation.

## Baird - Clyde Councils Refuse To Raise EMS Budget

COUNTY- Monday night, October 15 members of the Clyde City Council, Baird City Council and County Commissioners, the governing agents for EMS, met in the courtroom on the second floor of the courthouse to discuss the budget of the Citizens Emergency Medical Service.
Clyde Mayor A.N. Johnson announced members of Clyde City Council. They were Tommy Tucker, Ed Craig, Don Gordon, Paul Dugan, Foy Alcorn and city secretary, Ruby Cutbirth.
Mayor Jon Hardwick introduced members of the Baird Council, Harold Hass, Robert Martin and Mrs. James Paul Shanks. Two members could not attend because of other obligations.

Judge Mack Kniffen introduced members of the County Commissioners, Jigg Shackelford, M.D. Ellis and E.F. Odom.
Representing EMS were Don Haley and Billy Parker, Coordinator.
Many aspects were discussed about how to keep the ambulance service in operation, such as dropping one employee cutting them to only three, or using volunteer help. EMS stated that each employee is working 96 hours a week right now.
Don Haley began by explaining the EMS budget and proposal for the rest of 1979 and 80 . He explained that they needed $\$ 1500$. more for the month of October in order to meet their budget.
The proposed budget which was issued to the three agencies is as follows:
Salary- $\$ 44,100$., Payroll taxes- $\$ 2,646$., Workmans comp. $\$ 1,675.80$, Vehicle Ins.$\$ 1,849.92$, Vehicle fuel- $\$ 1,800$., Vehicle maint.- $\$ 1,000$., Medical supply- $\$ 800$., Office- $\$ 1,080$., Linen supply- $\$ 218.64$. A total of $\$ 55,170.36$. The ambulance service anticipates collecting $\$ 18,000$. for the 1980 budget and the governing agencies paying $\$ 37,000$.
EMS states that the average collection rate is $93 \%$. The first half of 1979, EMS spent $\$ 22,000$. Calls averaged 1.2 per day. Charges average $\$ 55.00$ per call.

Shirley Emmons who works on the Cross Plains ambulance service explained how theirs works. It was started by an ambulance being donated by Higginbothom Funeral Home. They now have two units. Theirs is only worked by volunteer help. They have about 30 people working on their EMS. They have no subsidy from any agencies. They charge $\$ 35.00$ a call plus a $\$ 1.00$ a mile then charge for equipment used. They are doing just fine.

The group discussed the fact of contributions. Contributions can be made, but they would have to be made directly to one of the three agencies. It was stated that contributions would be tax deductable this way

After all discussions, Kniffen adjourned the meeting and went to separate quarters to discuss EMS proposed budget, and help for the rest of the year.

When regrouped, the County had accepted and said they would go along with the $\$ 1,027.77$ per month for 1980 budget, but did not discuss what they would do for the rest of the year.

Baird and Clyde Councils both said they could not go along with the budget proposed for 1980. Clyde did say they could only go to $\$ 650$. Baird can pay $\$ 500$. plus Baird's telephone bill which averages $\$ 60.00$ a month.

When agencies were asked about the rest of 1979, the City of Baird and the County offered to pay $\$ 500$. each extra for the remainder of October. Clyde made no offer.
The question was raised towards the end of the meeting by EMS as to what the governing agencies wanted them to do. At that point, there was no direct answers to the question. The three agencies are to have a future meeting to work out something in order to keep the ambulance service for this area.
All three governing agencies stated that they were very pleased with the way EMS has been operating. Their services were highly praised.

Outstanding offensive personnel were, Clint Phillips, Foy Odom, Michael Cerda, Brad Watson, and John Burns. Defensive standouts were Brian Patterson, Matt Berry, Lewis Gomez and Leading tackler was Jody Turnbow.

## Letter to the Editor:

Dear Editor:
I would like the answers to a few questions.
Why would the City salaries and employee benefits go from $\$ 118,324$ in 1978 to $\$ 169,489$ in 1979 making an increase of $\$ 51,165$ which is a $43 \%$ increase? Whay would repairs and maintenance in crease from $\$ 30,250$ to $\$ 43,102$ which is a $42 \%$ in crease?' Why does the City of Baird need twenty-plus employees when the City of Clyde has eleven employees, including three full time policemen?
I would suggest that the council make a good analysis of athe auditors report recently presented to you, and unless your minds are completely closed, you can see wherein lies the City's financial difficulties. would like to insert here a quote taken from a publication of the Texas Municipal League pertaining to the process of policy determination and I quote: "It requires that each councilperson have a basic belief in his or her city, an understanding of its people, and a concept of what government is and does and could and should do. Sound policy decisions result when councilpersons possess determination, imagination and devotion to the best interests of the public. The councilperson who is unable to separate the public interest from his own cannot hope to be effective in the determination of sound policies."
I still think the best interest of the public would be served by the council, through a vote, get the peo ples opinions in regard to selling the electrical system. It has been mentioned that if the system were sold the money would have to be used to pay off the city's indebtedness. Tell me what would be wrong for the City to be out of debt? I wish I were.
Increasing taxes has been mentioned also. Based on the operation re port for the year ended June 30, 1979 taxes would need to be increased a mere $11 \%$ to maintain the status quo. How does that small amount compare with the excessive charge you are now paying for electricity?

The Mayor was recently quoted in the Abilene paper as saying that when the complete hook-up is made with WTU, rates would decrease $20 \%$. Using the 1000 kwh example I used in a previous letter your electrical cost would decrease from $\$ 75.75$ to $\$ 60.60$. How does that compare with a WTU rate of $\$ 42.67$ ? You'll be getting ripped off for about $\$ 18.00$ per month.

Again I would urge those of you who agree with
me, and I think that is 70 to 80 percent of you, attend the next council meeting which will be October 23. By law the meetings have to be open and thus you can see how your money is being handled.
