R.F.C.: Illegal Influence

What may turn into one of the rowdiest battles in the administration's history began to take shape when a subcommittee of the senate banking and currency committee charged that influence emanating from the White House had been exerted on the R.F.C.'s lending policies.

At first the investigation seemed just another periodic urge to probe by investigating senators.

He let it be known that he had in his possession between 700 and 900 letters, most of them from congressmen, and some asking favorable consideration of loan applications.

At the time it looked like President Truman was turning the investigation from the White House back to the senators themselves.

It was at this point that the President issued a statement saying he saw no reason to make the correspondence public since it did not show any illegality either on the part of the executive branch or legislators.

The investigation fell into something of a lull after the first flurry of publicity, but it is not likely to stay dormant for very long.

Moreover, it appears that before the fight is ended a set of new, deep resentments between the President on the one hand and influential members of congress on the other will have been created—the latest in a long and bitter series.

FIXER:

Faces Huge Tax Lien

Salvatore T. Sollazzo, who allegedly spent thousands to fix big-time college basketball games, found himself the subject of an investigation by the federal government.

The effect of the lien was to freeze Sollazzo's assets until the government can collect whatever it may be entitled to.

Meanwhile, investigation of the bribery charges against players for three New York colleges continued.

Basketball is the most popular high school and college sport in the nation.

The American farmer is angry. He is on the defensive and he doesn't like it.

Since the government ordered price controls the farmer has been attacked with the charge that he is the "hog" in the high food price picture.

BACK EUROPE:

Dewey and Stassen Plea

The split within the Republican party on the issue of sending troops to Europe came into sharp focus with testimony of Harold E. Stassen and Gov. Thomas E. Dewey before the senate foreign relations and armed services committees.

In urging the policy of sending troops to Europe, Stassen joined Dewey in opposing Sens. Kenneth S. Wherry, Nebraska, and Robert A. Taft, Ohio, and supporting the administrations claimed authority to send American troops overseas without congressional restrictions.

Governor Dewey went even further than Stassen. He told the senate groups, as he looked at Mr. Wherry across 20 feet of space in the caucus room:

"The most terrible thing that has happened to this country and the world is the defeatism evidenced by some of the questions asked here as to whether we could hold Europe."

Dewey and Stassen visibly angered some Republican senators by their testimony.

As far as sending troops to Europe and backing Gen. Eisenhower's plan to defend Europe, the congress finds itself in a position where it can do nothing but back the administration.

AMENDMENT:

Two Term Limit

The 22nd amendment, barring future Presidents from serving more than two elective terms or more than 10 years in the White House, was added to the constitution when Utah and Nevada became the 35th and 36th states to ratify the amendment.

Minus the legal phraseology, here's what the amendment provides:

That a President may serve only two elected terms. A man who served up to two years of another President's unexpired term could still serve an additional eight years.

But a Vice-President succeeding to the Presidency and serving more than two years before the term expired would be eligible for election only once.

The proposed amendment had been kicking around in state legislatures since March, 1947, but only 24 states had voted to ratify until late in January of this year.

The amendment does not apply to President Truman. He was specifically exempted when congress submitted the proposed amendment.

The last amendment to the constitution—the 21st—repealed prohibition. It became effective December 5, 1933.

KEEPING HEALTHY

Safe Uses for Mineral Oil in Diet

IT IS INTERESTING to watch the phases through which medicines, drugs, and foods pass as the years go by.

As the paraffin puts nothing into the body and apparently removes nothing of value from the tissues, it was considered a harmless method of aiding removal of wastes from the large bowel.

In addition to acting as a lubricant, paraffin oil has been found of help in actual inflammation of the gall bladder where there are gallstones with colic and other symptoms.

However, there is a fly in the ointment in the use of mineral oil; research workers have found that mineral oil removes some of the vitamins from the body, especially vitamin A, and advising against its use for this reason.

While it is true that some vitamins are removed from the blood and in some cases may cause roughness or other skin conditions, there is no reason why the individual cannot eat enough foods rich in vitamin A daily and so get all the vitamin A necessary.

Jesus Faces Death Lesson for March 18, 1951

MANY A STORY has been written around the theme of a man who knows he has only a short while to live. But the best of these is the story of Jesus.

FOR ONE thing, Jesus did not try to conceal from himself or others the fact that he would shortly die.

Now in our sad times, with death so near to all of us, the approach of death is not something to talk about as if it were an event of the 21st century.

Jesus, on the contrary, under no illusions about escape, accepting death quietly, day by day thought of others rather than of himself.

His Friends and God

MANY PERSONS, in the felt presence of death, withdraw into themselves. They cut the ties that have bound them together, they set their faces "outward bound."

It is an interesting fact that of all Jesus' living days, those which were remembered best were those which came just before his death.

Again, we find Jesus' prayer-life growing intense in those last days and nights. Nowhere else from Jesus' whole life is such a long prayer recorded as the one John puts into the story Mark tells so briefly of the last supper (John 17).

THE CHURCH has always been a bit suspicious about "death-bed repentance." We know it can be real; but over a period of two thousand years it has been noticed that most people who suddenly turn good in the presence of death are likely to be just as bad as ever if death postpones his visit.

Jesus' last days were not those of a scared man trying to make up in a few short days the lost opportunities of a mis-spent lifetime. On the contrary, Jesus' last days were all of a piece with the rest of his life.

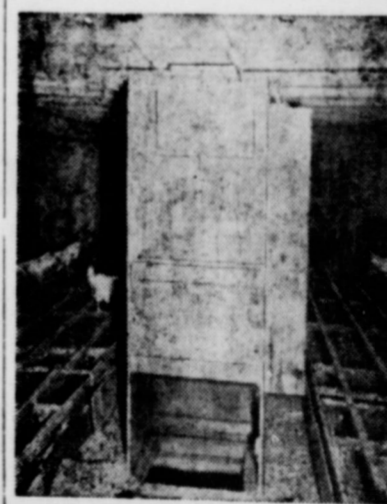
**DDT Is Being Replaced By A New Array of Chemicals**

DDT, miracle insect-killer of a few years ago, is losing ground to a whole new array of chemicals that destroy biting parasites of livestock and pets, the American Veterinary Medical Association journal reports. Shortcoming of DDT created a need for new insecticides in livestock and farming, and the need is being filled with methoxychlor, lindane, and chlordan. Farmers should be instructed on their use.



**Ingenuity Is Needed In Poultry Business Poultrymen Devise Easy Ways of Doing Old Chores**

It takes more than hard work to make money in the poultry business. It takes ingenuity too—lots of it. This is the intangible quality which enables farmers to devise new, faster and easier methods of doing old chores. For example, one poultryman solved the problem of removing



The picture above is the litter shaft invented by one poultryman. The elongated box-like structure to the right of the main structure houses the electric ventilating fan—one being located on each floor.

Litter from each floor of his three-story chicken house in a simple, inexpensive way. His plan was to extend a two-foot square flue from top to bottom of his poultry structure. The end of the flue opened into a feed lot.

Openings, which can be closed by hinged doors, were constructed in the flue at each floor level. Litter is scraped into the opening with a converted electric lawnmower—the cutting knives being replaced by a small bulldozer blade. Litter drops down the chute and into a manure loader, parked at the feed lot end of the flue.

Cotton will be planted in 226 Texas counties this year. Farmers are urged to follow the recommendations outlined in the 7 Step Cotton program for better yields, higher quality and more efficient production.

More than 10,000 Texas cotton farmers last year used rotary hoe equipment on their farm tractors to reduce the cost and amount of labor needed for hoeing their crops.

**154 Million Pounds Green Peas Frozen During 1950**

Green peas are by far the most important single frozen vegetable, and the 1950 pack set a new high record of more than 154 million pounds, 10 per cent greater than the previous record in 1946, the U.S. department of agriculture reports. Cold storage holdings of frozen vegetables were at an all time peak at the end of October 1950 when 48 million pounds were in frozen storage.

Corn yields can be increased from 20 to 30 percent and in some cases as much as 50 per cent by planting adapted corn hybrids. This has been shown by tests conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and by many farm demonstrators.

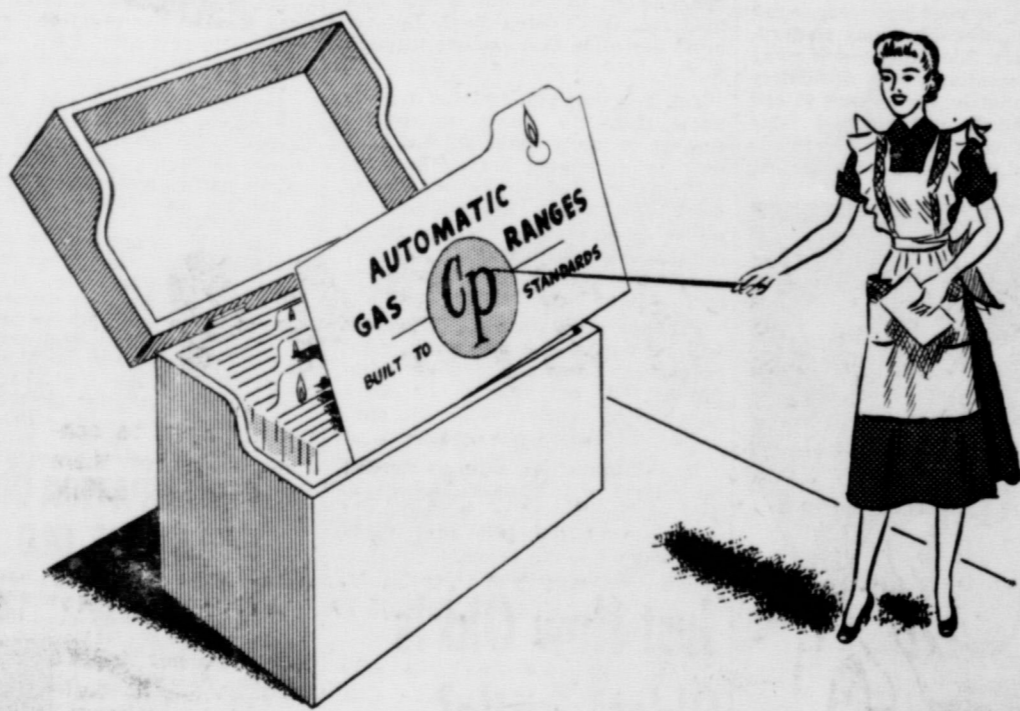

**2,161 Million Bushels Of Corn in Farm Storage**

The U.S. department of agriculture in a general crop report in January reported stocks of nearly 2,161 million bushels of corn remained on farms at the beginning of the year, and these were bolstered by relatively large stocks of other feed grains.

While these farm supplies of feed grains were larger than in all but three years on record, they were considerably smaller than on January 1 of the past two years, in total and particularly per animal unit to be fed, the report said.

Hay stocks appeared ample in most areas. Farm stocks of wheat, however, were smaller than average but slightly larger than a year ago. Soybean stocks were much larger than on any other January 1, because of the record crop. As for the wheat prospect, a relatively large acreage of winter wheat, a sixth more than average, was sown in the fall of 1950 under conditions mostly favorable to ideal for germination and early growth, the report said.

# AROUND THE HOUSE

Stubborn caps on nail polish bottles can usually be dealt with if you run hot water over the cap for a few minutes.

Turner, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4; and among other proceedings had were the following: WHEREAS, the Commissioners' Court of Lynn County, Texas, deems it advisable to submit to the resident qualified taxpayers voters of said County, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered same for taxation, propositions for the issuance of bonds of said County for the purpose herein-after stated; therefore

BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF LYNN COUNTY, TEXAS: That an election be held in said County on the 24th day of March, 1951, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this order, at which election the following propositions shall be submitted to the qualified taxpayers electors who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their action thereupon:

**Treatment of Seed With Good Fungicides Stressed**

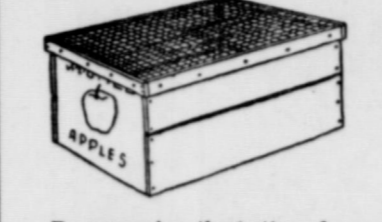
Treatment of grain seed with effective fungicides to insure better stands takes on additional importance this year, the U.S. department of agriculture reports.

The department says the average cost of a few cents an acre makes failure to take the precaution not only thoughtless but reckless. Fungicidal treatment of grain seed is mostly for the smuts and other controllable diseases of wheat, oats, and barley and for the seed rots and seedling blights of corn and sorghum.

Department officials contend it is fortunate that much seed, such as hybrid corn, is treated at the source. Also there are large-scale treating plants where farmers may take their seed for treatment.

"Farmers who hire someone to treat their seed should make sure that the proper chemicals are used and that they are applied at the recommended rates per bushel," department officials warn.

**Vegetable Washer**



By removing the bottom from a sturdy wooden box and nailing a piece of wire mesh (discarded window screen) in its place, you will have an excellent "washer" for the vegetables you grow. Place the box, screen face down, on the lawn and play the hose on the vegetables in it. This will remove all dirt.

Corn Must Ripen—Because many farmers had a great deal of soft corn this year, they will be looking for hybrids that will ripen next year. A check on results of local corn demonstrations will be of some help.

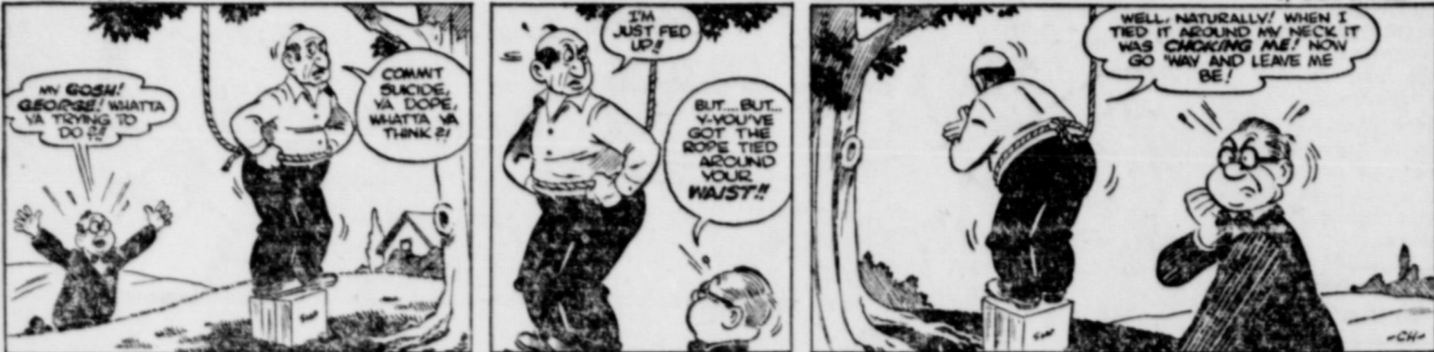

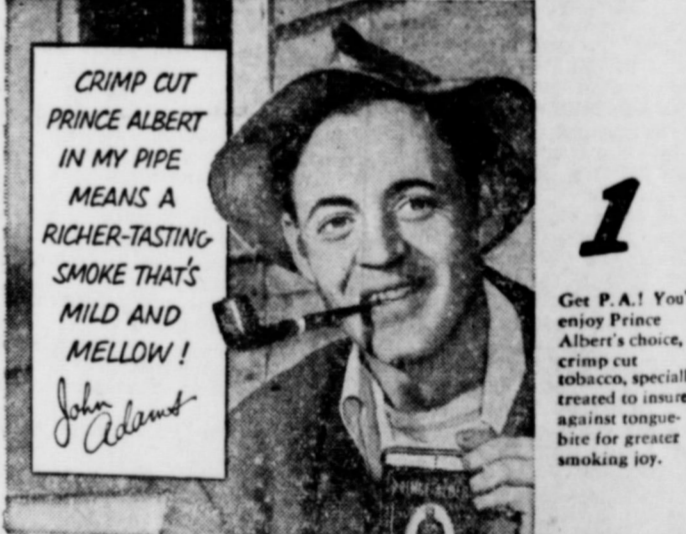

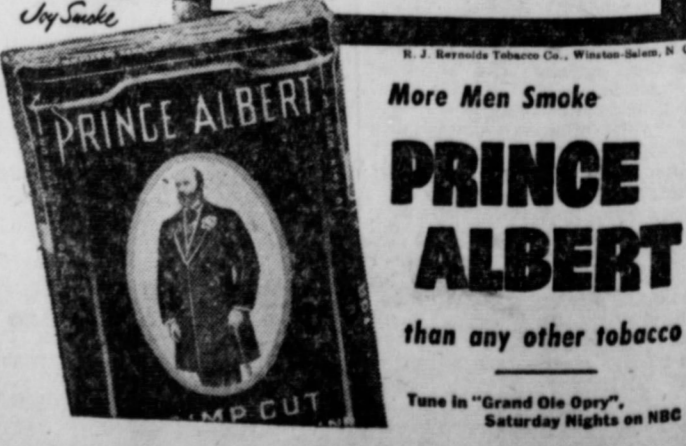
