What may turn into one of the rowdiest battles in the administration's history began to take shape when a subcommittee of the senate banking and currency committee charged that influence emanating from the White House had been exerted on the R.F.C.'s lending policies.

At first the investigation seemed just another periodic urge to probe by investigating senators. But then President Truman stepped in where many Presidents have feared to tread and disclosed he had collected a file of letters written by congressmen to the R.F.C.

He let it be known that he had in his possession between 700 and 900 letters, most of them from congressmen, and some asking favorable consideration of loan applications.

At the time it looked like President Truman was turning the investigation from the White House back to the senators themselves. Immediately the senators screamed that they refused to be intimidated.

It was at this point that the President issued a statement saying he saw no reason to make the correspondence public since it did not show any illegality either on the part of the executive branch or

The investigation fell into something of a lull after the first flurry of publicity, but it is not likely to stay dormant for very long. It has all the ingredients for a mud-slinging battle. And the offended senators are not likely to forget Truman's tactics of turning the spotlight of publicity upon them.

Moreover, it appears that before the fight is ended a set of new, deep resentments between the President on the one hand and influential members of congress on the other will have been created-the latest in a long and bitter series.

FIXER:

Faces Huge Tax Lien

Salvatore T. Sollazzo, who allegedly spent thousands to fix bigtime college basketball games, found himself the subject of an investigation by the federal government. The internal revenue bureau placed a \$1,128,493 tax lien against him.

The effect of the lien was to freeze Sollazzo's assets until the government can collect whatever it may be entitled to. The lien listed allegedly unpaid taxes running into hundreds of thousands of dollars for each of the years from 1943 through 1947.

There was no indication from the government as to the source of Sollazzo's income during those years. He is a jewelry manufactur-

Mineral oil is used in reducing diets to replace other oils or fats used in making salad or other dressings.

However, there is a fly in the ointment in the use of mineral oil; research workers have found that mineral oil removes some of the vitamins from the body, especially vitamin A, and advising against its use for this reason.

While it is true that some vitamins are removed from the blood and in some cases may cause roughness or other skin conditions, there is no reason why the individual cannot eat enough foods rich in vitamin A daily and so get all

Now in our sad times, with death so near to all of us, the approach of death is not something to talk about as if it were an event of the 21st century. Death may come to any of us soon; death is very likely to come to many of us soon; and sooner or later, death is certain to come to all of us. Facing death may bring out all a man's hidden selfishness. From the moment he knows his days are limited, he may think of nothing but himself and his "chanees" to escape.

Jesus, on the contrary, under no illusions about escape, accepting death quietly, day by day thought of others rather than of himself.

MANY PERSONS, in the felt presence of death, withdraw into themselves. They cut the ties that have bound them together, they set their faces "outward bound. Not so with Jesus. While it was still day, he would not act as if it were night. So we find him tightening up the bonds of friendship.

It is an interesting fact that of all Jesus' living days, those which were remembered best were those which came just before his death. Part of the reason for this may be that his friends came closer to him in those days; there was an intimacy, a greater warmth, between him and his old friends than there had ever been. Even when he prayed in Gethsemane he was not content to pray alone. If there was none to watch with him and in some dim way share his agonie, it was because his friends were not awake to his need, not because he in any way turned his back on them.

Again, we find Jesus' prayer-life growing intense in those last days and nights. Nowhere else from Jesus' whole life is such a long prayer recorded as the one John puts into the story Mark tells so briefly of the last supper (John 17). Not in Jesus' whole life before, though he prayed early and often, do we hear of such agony of prayer as that in the garden before Judas came. He not only turned to his friends, but turned to God, but it is plain that he wished of all things most to bring his friends nearer to God.

Yet how many Christians are there who, if they knew death would be coming for them within the week, would think of others' spiritual welfare rather than their own? How many would help to prepare others for God, and not themselves alone?

First, a Good Life

THE CHURCH has always been a bit suspicious about "deathbed repentance." We know it can be real; but over a period of two thousand years it has been noticed that most people who suddenly turn good in the presence of death are likely to be just as bad as ever if death postpones his visit.

Jesus' last days were not those of a scared man trying to make up in a few short days the lost opportunities of a mis-spent lifetime. On the contrary, Jesus' last days were all of a piece with the rest of his life. Prayer, friendships, appreciation and help of others, even sacrifice, were not strange to him.

So with each of us. We all know how we ought to live if death were hevering near. But we shall have a hard time living and acting so, then, unless it is our habit already. It is well to pray for a "good death;" but the best way to have a good death is first to live the good life.







Brucellosis Is

ALTHOUGH FARMERS are in constant danger of getting brucellosis from cattle and swine, veterinarians and packinghouse workers run an even greater risk, according to a report in the Journal of the American veterinary medical association.

The report, made after a joint survey by the U.S public health service and the Indiana state board of health, declared that brucellosis can be regarded as an "occupational hazard' of persons whose work brings them into contact with intected animals

Through use of a blood test, it can be determined if a person has been exposed to brucellosis.

Tests showed that as many as 25 per cent of one group of veterinarians either had had the disease or had been exposed to it. The tests were made during a three-year period on more than 600 veterinarians.

Considerable numbers of packinghouse employees also showed exposure to the disease. Numbers of reactors to the test were highest on jobs requiring frequent centact with infected animalswith group percentages running as high as 33 per cent

When groups of term workers were tested, slightly less than four per cent of the men reacted to the est and less than two per cent of the women.

Employees of a rendering plant also showed a high incidence of exposure, with some 27 per cent giving positive reachings on the ood test

Danger in Work Properly Framed Pictures Will Liven Any Livingroom

PICTURES can add more to your rooms than you've probably ever dreamed, especially when they adroitly hung and cleverly framed. The pictures themselves do not need to be expensive originals, if these are out of reach, but they should be properly used for effect.

Dull rooms look smart and colorless settings take on new brightness if the walls are properly adorned with pictures. These may be something you've clipped from greeting cards, calendars, papers or magazines. They may be inexpensive reproductions which are, however, true to the original.

Good framing and background can dramatize even the inexpensive picture and make it an asset in your room. Clever groupings of pictures can become the center of attention in many a room, especially if you use some of the time-tried formulas for hanging them proper-

Those who like a lot of pictures should be careful to group and place them in accordance with good decorating precepts. Pictures do not necessarily have to be of one type, their framing and matting should bring them together enough to place them in a grouping for the sake of effectiveness.

Making unlike pictures somewhat alike can frequently be done at home with good matting and fram-

ing. When you do the job yourself, do it with the care and attention of professional, and your pictures will look that much the better for

Relate Pictures To Decorative Style

To observe the rules of balance and unity, use traditional pictures in the same type rooms. Victorian bouquets, Early American historical scenes and Colonial portraits belong in rooms of these different periods.

Modern paintings and prints are best in rooms of the current period, while floral and fruit prints, seascapes, family portraits, black and white etchings are considered neutral and may be used in any period type of rooms.

For the neutral types, you choose framing that goes with a certain period, if you want to keep all furnishings in harmony. A very decorative gilt frame on a family portrait might be used in one of the decorative French period rooms for unity, while in a modern home the same picture could be framed in simple light wood or ebony type to be in keeping.

If your home is a combination of traditional and modern, then some pictures of either type may be used. provided they're in good taste.



Avoid too large pictures in smaller rooms. If you have no small ones, it's better to eliminate them entirely.

Smallpatterned papers may sometimes be used with very simple prints and frames, if the effect is not too con-



Use Common Sense In Hanging Pictures

If you do not have large enough pictures for the large pieces, then plan to use several small ones or bottom lines of all pictures should. bottom lines of all pictures should,

of course, be at the same level.

Let's take, for example, the chest or sofa that is quite low. Is it then wise to hang the picture at eye level? No, common sense as well as unity and balance dictate that this picture or grouping would look best hung low enough on the wall to become almost a unit with couch or chest.

The above frequently happens in a chest in the hall or even a room. The better the picture is tied to the chest, the more dramatic the effect. If you have taken the colors for the room from such a picture, use it close above the chest, and try to get one or two accessories to place on the chest. These accessories should have lighter or darker color of the same hue as that in the picture.

Centering a picture on the wall is done for pleasing and restful feeling. However, if you have a massive arrangement of plants or a lamp on one side of the wall, the large print or group of small ones can be slightly off center to balance the mass properly.

Pictures will stay hung straight if they are fastened with wire run through a small screw eye at each side of the frame. They should be flat against the wall, with no wires showing in a "V" above the frame.

Treatment of Seed With **Good Fungicides Stressed**


Treatment of grain seed with effective fungicides to insure better stands takes on additional importance this year, the U.S. department of agriculture reports.

The department says the average cost of a few cents an acre makes failure to take the precaution not only thoughtless but reckless. Fungicidal treatment of grain seed is mostly for the smuts and other con-trollable diseases of wheat, oats, and barley and for the seed rots and seedling blights of corn and sorghum.

Department officials contend it is fortunate that much seed, such as hybrid corn, is treated at the source. Also there are large-scale treating plants where farmers may take their seed for treatment.

"Farmers who hire someone to treat their seed should make sure that the proper chemicals are used and that they are applied at the recommended rates per bushel," department officials warn.


