## Texas Men Operating <br> Mine in New Mexico <br> H. Warren Dies At Home of Daughter

Jack Cavett of Abilene, who is one of the owners of the White Mountain Mining and Milling Company of Ruidoso, N M., was here Wednesday in the interest of the enterprise. Mr. Cavet says that during the past summer enough ore has been blocked out to keep the concentrating mill operating for a year.
The main values of the mine run in zinc, gold and silver, but zinc predominates in the ore that is now being taken out, it averaging about the per cent in this metal. The ore also assays around two ounces of gold and a like amount of silver to the ton However, in a lower working than from which the zinc ore comes, assays show as high as seventy-one ounces in gold to the ton have been found This part of the mine is now re ceiving attention and Mr. Cavet believes that a strike will soon be made that will startle the mining world for values.
Tne concentrating mill is op
erated by water power, the big turbines not only furnishing power for the plant, but will supply Tularosa with lights and power, the hi-ling already having been constructed.
The mine is owned principally by Soyder, Abilene, Labbock, Lamesa and O'Donnell men and Mr. Cavett believes they have in vested their money wisely.
