

#### Peace and War

#### "We must be prepared to pay the price of peace or assuredly we shall pay the price of war."

Those words, spoken by President Harry Truman to the U. S. congress, could be the seeds of the first genuine, effective foreign policy this nation has had for half a century.

Disregarding any political overtones there might have been in the President's speech, his address to the joint session of congress reflected the realization at the top level of government that any successful foreign policy must be based on the fundamental concept of striking a balance between commitments abroad and the national security or strength at home available to back up those commitments.

By definition, the term "foreign policy" implies that any nation expressing such a policy possesses the strength-in military forces and alliances-to follow it consistently at all times and to defend it just as consistently in case of war.

In that connection Mr. Truman

#### TRIESTE: Surprise

In a move that surprised everyone from the Russians to American congressmen, the U.S. proposed jointly with France and Britain that the free territory of Trieste be returned to Italy.

Trieste, long a storm center coveted by both Italians and Yugoslavs, had been made a free state under United Nations guidance in the sixmonths-old Italian peace treaty.

The proposal was, apparently, a shrewd and calculated move to try to help the anti-Communist forces in Italy win the April 18 election.

It literally put the Russians on the spot, leaving them with little choice of reaction. If they support the western powers' proposal to return Trieste to Italy they will be, in effect, turning their backs on their previous arguments for a Yugoslav Trieste, thereby kicking their Yugoslav cohorts in the face.

On the other hand, if Russia were to side with Yugoslavia it would amount to a rebuff for the Italian Communists. Possession of Trieste is a great political issue in Italy. and it well may turn out now to be a deciding factor in the elections coming up there.

Yugoslavia's Marshal Tito, however, lost little time in answering the proposal of the U.S., Britain and France. He simply rejected the demand and proposed instead that a plebiscite be held in the free state of Trieste to decide whether it should be Italian or Yugoslav.

Moscow diplomats were calling the action "another move toward war." Said one: "The beginnings of international order which emerged after the war are being destroyed.

But to those who were working tooth and nail against the spread of communism it looked like a master stroke, one which might keep Italy and all of western Europe out of reach of the Kremlin.

That, you may remember, was the climax of the play RUR-"Rossums Universal Robots"-written by Karel Kapek.

I was reminded of it because of one of the first deeds of Jan Masaryk in 1946 when he returned to his native country after the exile imposed on him when Hitler's robots crushed the first Czech republic When Masaryk returned, he laid flowers on the grave of Karel Kapek, the great Czech author who wrote that prophetic play, giving us the word "robot" and the warning behind it. The word comes down from the old Slavic "robota," servitude.

We have accepted the word. We have not heeded the warn-

ing. The robots, like the Golem of the Hebrew myth, and the Adam of the Psalms "yet being unperfect" before a soul was breathed into his substance offer a grim warning to us now. Unhuman beings released today, may re-enact Kapek's play on a stage, wide as civilization.

Day after day come the frightened echoes from Europe of the fear of war. And yet no people wants it. If you were to write down all the material demands of the diplomats and the rulers of each nation, and put them in the hands of the peoples of the world and tell them: If you want these you must have war, who would pay the price of war? None. None but a robot, without sensitivity, without soul.

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free erercise thereof." No federal lar was in question, merely the ac-tion of a school board which is under jurisdiction of the state, as are all public schools.

Justice Reed in his dissenting opinion held there was no more violation of the traditional separation of church and state than the practice of using chaplains in the army and navy or for congress itself.

So concerned was the neutral National Education association that it issued a statement holding the decision "in no way voids the responsibility of the public schools to inculcate those moral and ethical principles which are the essence of the good life. One of the important objectives of public education has been, and always will be, to inspire in youth a deep appreciation for the basic spiritual and religious values which give meaning to existence, provide the foundations of good character and are guides to a high order of human conduct." . . .

About the only semblance to rent control remaining in the so-called rent control bill as it came from the house banking and currency committee is the name. #### Western Pact

Lending force to Mr. Truman's scattering of the seeds of foreign policy was the fact that, an hour before he delivered his pronounce-ment, the just-completed five-nation western European pact for common defense against attack had been announced officially.

Under the treaty, Britain, France, ABOUT FACE: Belgium, Luxembourg and the Netherlands pledged one another military aid in the event that any one of them should be attacked.

According to the new "Truman doctrine," the United States would be the principal guarantor of this five-power union. Without such a guarantee of U.S. backing, the western European treaty would be meaningless.

By his declaration in support of the western European pact Mr. Truman seemed to be guiding the U.S. to a point of departure from its historic adherence to the diplomatic enormity of refusing to engage in "entangling alliances" even at the price of its own welfare.

#### **BACHELORS:** Declining

Best opinion holds that, while Russia is not now seeking war, the Communists have created a kind of Frankenstein monster in Europe that at any moment could plunge out of control and involve the world in another conflict. Secretary of State Marshall is said to feel this way

The Soviets are motivated by a sense of urgency to act before the European recovery program begins to function and before the union of western European nations is firmly established. Driven by this feeling of urgency, the Soviets may not be able to avert an incident which would lead to a shooting war.

# Expedience

To many persons it looked as though the United States, in abandoning its support of the Palestine partition plan, had pulled a "Pon-tius Pilate" on the same scene where the procurator of Judea had washed his hands not quite 2,000 years ago to sanction the Crucifixion.

In reversing its role in the partition struggle, the U.S. proposed that the Holy Land be made a United Nations' trusteeship, giving Jews and Arabs a chance to reach agreement on their own concerning the future of their country's government.

Warren R. Austin, American delegate to the U.N., said that it was obvious that partition could not be carried out except by force, and the U.S. consistently has demurred against the idea of sending troops to Palestine.

It was ironic that the American statement withdrawing support from the partition plan was undoubtedly the death blow to that plan which never would have been adopted by the U.N. in the first place if it had not been for American pressure and influence

There is one vast source of meat -maybe an inexhaustible one-that the U.S. public might have to consider seriously if beef and pork become as scarce and expensive as if is predicted they will:

#### In teaching children about the peoples of the world, Allport says the tendency is to accentuate the DIFFERENCES.

He says: "The American child learns with horror about headhunters, about infanticide; and he learns to laugh at the Dutch who clop in wooden shoes, and at the quaint observances of Easter among adherents to the Orthodox faith. The implication of inferiority is a usual by-product of our present method of teaching cultural and national differences. Less dramatic, but far sounder, would be the teaching of the common considerations of justice and morality that are identical over vast areas of the earth. Practices that may SEEM to differ dramatically often indicate common aspirations and common values. The prayer wheels of Tibet and the silent Quaker meeting have virtually identical functional significance; so too the initiation rites of the Pawnee and the American high school commencement.

Allport thinks that a study of the common peoples of the world undoubtedly would reveal that more important to them than boundaries and national aspirations are matters of self-respect, pride, food, shelter, marriage and the welfare of their children.

Yes, as I said earlier, ask the peoples of the world to vote between capture of territory, acquisition of ports or oil fields at the price of war-and there would be no question of their choice.





Rationalization is to indulge in false thinking, while segregaton is not to let your right hand know what your left hand is doing.

When you practice repression, you forget unpleasant things; and when you disassociate, you pass the buck. Sometimes you resort to conversion -that means to have a breakdown or illness in place of a conflict. Displacement is to worry over one thing when another is to blame, and projection is to attribute your own faults to others.

Arother escape is called identification: that means to form phantasies. When you follow compensation, you overdo some particular thing in order to overcome your inadequacies.

The final escape route is the only one which is wholeheartedly recommended. It is called sublimationthat means to turn the effect of the conflict into some useful channel.

## Soybeans Provide Protein To Offset High Food Cost

High food costs make it difficult for the homemaker to know how she can get the most for her food dollar. Protein is one of the most essential protective elements in the human diet, say extension service nutritionists.

Foods which contain proteinmeats, eggs, milk, cheese-are high in cost but they must not be left out of the diet. Cheaper cuts of meats, meat stretchers, egg dishes and chuese dishes will help supply the body's need for protein. Other sources of protein are soybeans, dried beans and peas. These vegetables come nearest to meat, eggs, milk and cheese as body builders. They also contain Vitamin B1 and iron.


For homemakers not familiar with the soybean, this information is offered: 'Soybeans contain protein of high quality, similar to animal protein. They can be used in place of meat in the diet. Soybeans are good sources of usable iron and other mineral such as calcium, phosphorus, as well as an excellent source of vitamins of the B-complex. Fresh, green soybeans are rich in vitamin A. They are high in fat, and sprouted soybeans are a useful source of Vitamin C."

## Pasture Makes Cheap Dairy and Stock Feed

Pasture is the cheapest and best feed your dairy and meat animals can get, declares the Middle West, Soil Improvement committee. Not only will it save scarce feed grains, but also it will cut production costs and step up the milk and meat output. However, the soil must be fed to get a good stand of legumes and grasses. Legumes are heavy "eaters" of phosphorus and potash, requiring plenty of plant food. Liming, based on soil tests, use of manure and the return of crop aftermaths to the soil are other essentials.

By marketing their hogs at just one pound lighter weight, hog men over the country could conserve about seven million bushels of grain, says Wisconsin College of Agriculture. Marketing hogs at lighter weights is one of the best ways to stretch the feed supply. Hogs marketed before they weigh 230-240 pounds usually require less feed to put on a pound of gain than hogs fed to heavier weight.



Every Sunday morning an openair dog market is held in Club Row, a narrow, sordid street off the notorious Petticoat Lane.

There, shabby sharp-eyed men in tweed caps congregate to offer dogs of all breeds and ages. There's everything in Club Row

from happy-go-lucky mongrels to dignified animals which look like potential show dogs.

There are families of scarcely weaned yelping pupples in baskets and dogs so old that their real ages are closely guarded trade secrets. Police keep a watchful eye on Club Row for many of the dogs on sale are likely to have been stolen. Stolen dogs are sold as quickly as possible because police circulate their descriptions within 24 hours. Buying a stolen dog isn't the only risk you run when you select a pet in Club Row. He is pretty sure to be either much younger or much

older than you were told. He may be afflicted with costly and incurable diseases. He may be blind in at least one eye. He may even be dyed. The salesmen are experts in the art of camouflaging dogs.



Honey Almond Cream Cake (Makes two 8-inch layers)\* 2 cups sifted cake flour 2 teaspoons baking powder 1/4 teaspoon soda 3/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup shortening 1/3 cup milk 3/4 cup light corn syrup 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 teaspoon almond extract 2 eggs 1/2 cup honey cups oven-popped rice 11/2 cereal 1 tablespoon melted butter.



grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge. As I live, saith the Lord God, ye shall not have occasion any more to use this proverb in Isreal. Behold, all souls are mine." And then God adds, "The soul that sinneth, it shall die." . . .

#### GOD'S LOVE AND CARE

A LL through these chapters in Sunday's lesson, two solemn truths appear-God's love for his people, manifest in unwearied care: and the responsibility of each soul for the sin which such commits against God.

This truth, or these truths, I should say, are equally applicable for us today. As Ezekiel was sent to remind the people of God's love and care, so must we, early in our youth, accept the responsibility of accepting his love or rejecting his love.

We cannot claim his care if we despise his will. That is the message of Ezekiel for us.

#### WHAT GOD IS LIKE

NOWHERE in the Old Testa-ment is the love of God more manifest and compelling than in Ezekiel 34:11-27. I hope that you will open your Bible to this passage. Here the Bible speaks in words that burn with the compassionate love of God for sinful souls.

"I will both search my sheep, and seek them out. As a shepherd seeketh out his flock in the day that he is among his sheep that are scattered; so will I seek out my sheep, and I will deliver them out of all places where they have been scattered in the cloudy and dark day . . . And I will bring them to their own land, and feed them upon the mountains of Israel by the rivers."



A new heart and a new spirit. That is what the Jews needed. That is what the world needs today-a new heart and a new spirit. Only God could give a new heart then, and only God can make such gift today.

EZEKIEL'S MESSAGE FOR US

WOULD we listen to Ezekiel to-day? He has the message we need above all other words that may be spoken. He called the Jews to repentance of sin. That is what America needs today. Boys and girls need it. Men and women need it. And just as God waited patiently to bestow the new heart and spirit to Israel in the long ago, so does he wait to grant us today a new heart and a new spirit.
