OIL VALUATION FALLS IN SCHOOL DISTRICT

The Board of Equalization of the O'Donnell School District met Saturday to study adjustment of real estate, personal property and oil property. This was the final meeting and three or four persons appeared before the Board.

T. J. Vandell, tax collector and assessor for the district, estimated



that the assessed valuation for the district might drop by about \$200,000 in 1958 as compared with \$6,900,000 for 1957. The drop was expected because of the depreciation in oil property caused by curtailed oil production.

Oscar Furlow was chairman of the Board. Other members were Bertice Askew and Ralph Gary. Later in the summer the budget will be adopted by the school board and the tax rate set to cover the budget. The present rate is \$1.50 per \$100 assessed valuation and the new rate is expected to be slightly higher. Like everyone else our school is caught in the inflation pressure.

Crops Look Good Wind Is Damaging

Hot dry winds are burning crops some especially young cotton. Some burning is suspected as come from static electricity generated by moving sand and low humidity. A good general rain is now needed. Crops remain far above average for this season and chopping is nearing an end. Temperatures have varied from a high of 100 degrees to a low of low 50's. A good rain fell Saturday night in Draw area. Early cotton is setting fruit. Thrips were reported but as were fleshoppers. Now is time to watch for insects as fruiting stage sets in. Some Lygus bugs were reported as being Aphids. Insect prospects remain light.
