### Bank Deposits Near Record

#### Reflects Good Crop

Bank deposits here stood at \$2,894,556.93 at the end of the year compared to \$2,403,791.93 at the same time last year (1959). This is a net gain of about half a million and reflects the good crop year and good prices that were recorded. Local bank officials report that sometime during this month they expect the local bank to set a new record for deposits. As of Saturday, Jan. 6th deposits were \$3,354,000.00. A record high was set in 1958.

Government reports show that farmers of this immediate area are in the most "liquid" condition in the history of this area. Farm mortgages are at a low figure. Land, when offered for sale locally, is selling at an all time high. It is not unusual for dry land to sell at \$200 to \$250 per acre. Twenty years ago the same type of land sold from \$100 to \$125 per acre. Irrigation, discovered here during the 1953 drought due to extensive drilling, totals about 25,000 local acres. Currently subsoil moisture is average for this period of the year and prospects are bright for another record crop year.

### WITHHOLDING AND S. S. TAXES EXPLAINED

Dallas — Employers liable for income tax withheld and social security taxes in excess of \$100 for the month of January, must deposit such taxes with a depository district director Ellis Campbell, Jr. of Internal Revenue Service, announced today.

Stressing the importance of compliance with deposit deadline of Feb. 15th Mr Campbell added that a Form 450 should be used for this purpose. Deposits may be made in Reserve Banks, the IRS spokesman added. Employers who do not have a copy of Circular E — "Employer's Tax Guide," may get it from any IRS office. Circular E explains employment taxes and gives tables and percentage methods for computing such taxes.

### IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS -- TENANT

Joe Dogood and his wife rented their home to Joe's cousin, John Messmaker. The Dogoods were planning to be out of town for several months and since Mr. Messmaker was temporarily out of work and in need of a place to house his family, Joe rented their home at a very reasonable figure. The Messmakers were very grateful and promised someday to pay back Joe and his wife.

When the Messmakers finally moved out they left the house in a shambles. There were holes in the walls, the furniture was torn and broken, windows were broken, doors were off of their hinges and the house looked as if it had never been cleaned.

The Dogoods asked the Messmakers to clean and repair the house and furniture but they refused. They said that they were only tenants and such repairs were the responsibility of the property owners.

Can the Messmakers be made to pay for the damage they caused? The courts have generally held that the tenants can be made to pay for damages in such a case. A tenant, even though bound by no express agreement as to the condition in which he is to leave the premises at the end of his tenancy, is nevertheless under a certain implied obligation. He is impliedly obligated to so use the rented premises that it will be returned to the landlord in the same general condition in which it was rented, subject to such general deterioration as is caused by a reasonable amount of use and lapse of time.

If, by the negligence of a tenant, the rented property is materially injured, he is liable to the landlord for the resulting damages. An implied contract binds the tenant to make good any loss that results from the want of reasonable care. However he is not liable for depreciation resulting from normal use of the property.

### 'O'Donnell Day' At Stock Show

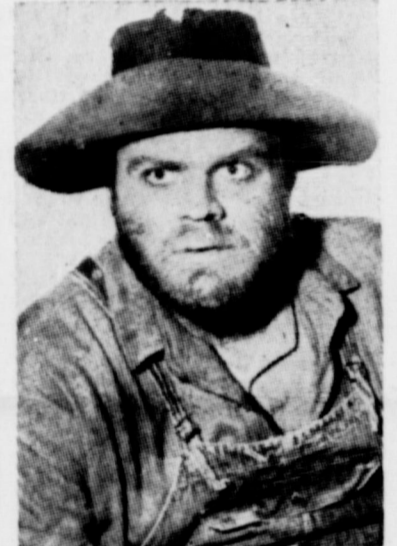
#### Is Monday, Jan. 29th

### BIRDS CARRY SLEEPING SICKNESS

The fact that birds are a reservoir of some diseases transmissible to man has been known for a long time. However, the mounting store of knowledge concerning the arboviruses (literally bird-borne) is a comparatively new item of public health research.

Some of the more common diseases caused by these viruses occur in Texas. These are the St. Louis encephalitis (mistakenly called sleeping sickness) and the Western and Eastern equine types. The names signify where a particular virus was first identified.

Puzzling transmission cycles are the hallmark of these viruses. Encephalitis is borne by birds. However transmission of the virus from birds to horses or from birds to man is thru mosquitoes. There apparently is no direct transmission from horse to man or from man to man. The responsible culprit is a family of mosquitoes called Culicidae. These include the common household mosquito and a mosquito common to rural areas. There are others but these two cause the most trouble in Texas.

In late summer and fall of 1961 several cases of encephalitis were confirmed by the State Health Department. Most of the cases were reported from counties of south and west Texas in the Hi-Plains area.

Reports from thruout Texas indicate that the state's stockmen are behind the Southwest Animal Health Foundation's drive to do something about controlling the bothersome and costly screwworm. As of Dec. 7th the Foundation reports that 157 counties now have active organizations and credits county agents and teachers of vocational agriculture with getting the educational phase of the program rolling.

Foundation seed for Oro, a new shattering type sesame variety are now available to certified seed growers for multiplication from the Foundation Seed Section, Department of Soil and Crop Sciences, College Station.

### COTTON VARIETY IMPORTANT IN HARVESTING

College Station — Did your mechanical cotton harvester do a satisfactory job on this year's crop? If it didn't the blame might lay with the variety of cotton you planted.

According to tests conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, some cotton varieties are more suitable to mechanical harvesting than others. For the studies, 14 open boll varieties were tested on the A. and M. Plantation near College Station and 12 stem resistant varieties were tested at Substation No. 6 near Denton.

In the mechanical picking tests all varieties were planted on the same date and all received the same cultural practices. All were harvested in a once over operation and immediately after the harvesting the cotton remaining on the plants and cotton dropped to the ground was collected and weighed. This information was then analyzed statistically to determine mechanical picking efficiency.

The stem resistant varieties were tested in the same manner but two different types of stripper rolls were used. Double steel rolls, which are used on some commercial strippers, and rubber paddle stripper rolls developed by the Experiment Station were used on all varieties. In almost every case the rubber paddle stripper rolls showed higher harvesting efficiency.

If you use machine harvesting and did not get the harvesting efficiency you desired on your last crop, then you should get a copy of PR 2209. This Texas Agricultural Experiment Station publication contains the test results and this information may help you select a cotton variety more suitable.

### STATE AND COUNTY TAXES ARE 80 PERCENT PAID

State and county taxes, on which a discount is allowed or payment in October, November and December are much higher in comparison to city and school district taxes which no discount is allowed or early payment. State and county taxes were 80 percent paid up as of Jan. 1st, according to Geo. McCracken, Lynn county tax assessor and collector. Of tax roll of \$247,232.70 on a county valuation of \$19,956,139, a total of \$198,233.29 had been paid up to Jan. 1st. Lynn County tax rate is \$1.90 and the state rate is 42c.

Mr. McCracken added that vehicle registration in Lynn County totaled 11,133 and b.o.b. at a total of \$163,136.95. Of this amount \$106,416.60 remains in Lynn County for building and maintaining county roads and \$56,719.45 goes to the State.

Mr. McCracken said that state taxes have been paid in full for 31st and may be paid in full for 31st month at state level. He said that as you know this is a lean year and from time to time there are special elections in which the voter has an interest.

**WHO MUST FILE A FEDERAL INCOME TAX RETURN**

All citizens or residents of the United States, including minor children, who had gross incomes of \$600 or more in 1961 must file a federal income tax return. John J. Sloan of the Lubbock Internal Revenue Service said today.

If the taxpayer is 65 or over as of December 31, 1961 he or she is not required to file unless his or her gross income for 1961 was at least \$1,200. The IRS representative added that even though a taxpayer is not required to file under these rules, he or she must file to obtain a refund, if any income tax was withheld from his or her pay.

He said there is one exception to the general rule. Self-employed persons such as sole proprietors, partners and independent contractors, must file an income tax return and pay a self employment tax if net earnings from self employment were \$400 or more.

Filing deadline this year is Monday, April 16th

**STROKE VICTIMS MAY BECOME ACTIVE**

Austin — Several thousand Texans are proof that stroke victims need not lead an invalid life, according to State Health Commissioner J. E. Peavy.

These victims of "cerebral vascular accidents" have been totally or partially rehabilitated and have returned to their jobs or other worthwhile vocations, Dr. Peavy says.

The key to this dramatic advance is starting the rehabilitation process early, as soon as the patient is able to communicate, and consistent continuation of a prescribed series of exercises usually by a physiotherapist with a physician's supervision, Dr. Peavy pointed out.

Today, more progressive hospitals, nursing and convalescent homes no longer consider themselves custodians of stroke victims but institutions of education and training for the patient and his family. As soon as the immediate task of saving the patient's life has been accomplished, the rehabilitation process begins.

More than 1.6 million pounds of food was donated by the U. S. Department of Agriculture to state and local welfare agencies for use in feeding the victims of Hurricane Carla last September.

A revised edition of the Plant Disease Handbook for Texas, first published in 1957, is now available. The author of the original and the revision is Dr. Harlan Smith, extension plant pathologist. Local county agents can supply information on how and where copies may be purchased.

Tuberculosis struck down 50,000 Americans last year. Among those were 4184 Texans who discovered they had this contagious disease.

Forty million Americans are now infected with live TB germs — germs which will cause active tuberculosis in many of them.

No one is born with TB. The only way to get TB is to catch it from someone who has it.

Every seven minutes another American falls prey to TB. Each month TB kills 1,000 Americans.

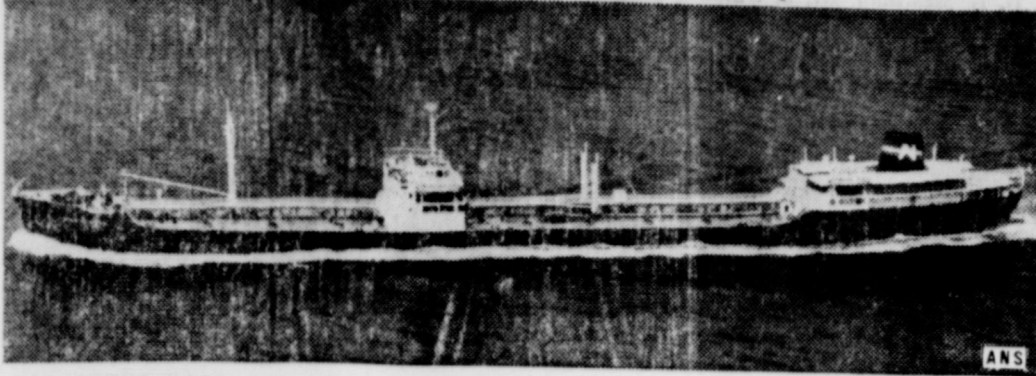

**THE WORLD HOPE**, first major ship built in Greece since ancient times, goes through her trial paces. In the background is the island of Salamis, from which mighty Ajax launched twelve "black-hulled" ships for the Trojan war.

Without oars or sail this new black-hulled giant glides across the "wine-dark sea," and she uses galleys half as big as Ajax's for lifeboats. Yet her crew is less than the complement of one of his vessels. Her sole purpose is to transport a substance Homer's people had no use for, the legendary water that burned—crude oil.

The 25,000-ton tanker was constructed by Hellenic Shipyards Company at Skaramanga, near Athens. She joins the fleet of Greek shipowner, Stavros Niarchos, who also founded the shipyard, Greece's first heavy industry.

Over 5,000 Texas cotton farmers reduced root rot damage by deep plowing more than a quarter million acres during 1961 according to year end reports from county agricultural agents. Demonstration results indicate that on fields where losses have ranged up to 75 percent were cut to 5 percent or less by deep plowing — 1 to 18 inches — and by turning under large amounts of organic matter and letting the soil dry for periods of from 10 to 14 days.
