The Fillin Station in Putnam offers a selection of more than 30 import beers from 11 countries.

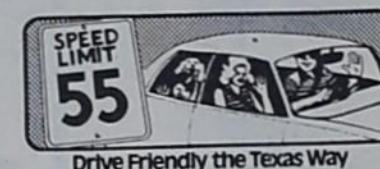

The oil strike is Olympia Oil Co., Abilene, No. 1 Rutherford, located two miles southeast of Putnam.

Location is 1,481 feet from the south and 183 feet from the east lines of Section 8, BOH Survey.

Daily potential was 48 barrels of 44 gravity oil, plus 63 barrels of water. Flow was through an 18-64 inch choke with package

set on the casing and 300 pounds tubing pressures.

Production is from perforations at 3,762-70 feet, treated with 1,500 gallons of mud acid. The pay was fractured with 13,000 pounds of sand and 15,000 gallons of fluid.

Operator set the 4½ inch casing at 3,842 feet, and the hole is bottomed at 3,850 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 6.041-1. The well is producing from the Duffer.

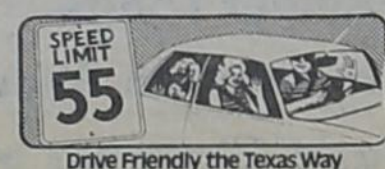
