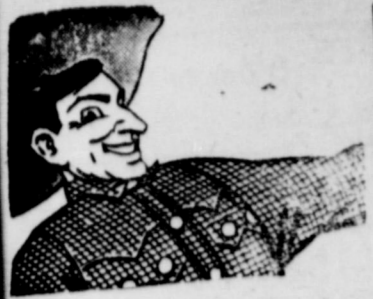

Here in West Texas is an opportunity for a novelist to write what perhaps could be the great American novel. Surely the theme weaving thru the pages would be the ever-present wind, the turbulent and choking dust, the turbulent and choking thunder storms, the violent killing cold of the dry winter rolling in with express train speed, the searing, burning summer heat which sees the crops and the stock die of helpless thirst. Yes, there are great, human, dramatic word pictures to paint of the challenge, a land which still holds a challenge. The bravery of the farmer who plants in May in trust and in October reaps in bitter disappointment. The dry, windy morning sky, the blood-dirty sun at day's end, the weary, complexioned people of the land live and work year following year on guts, and will give their last dollar to a neighbor's bid. Yes, the natives of the baldies are giants among men, and their cry is crying to be told, and told truly would also be the story of a great America.

The first week in March is Public School Week in Texas. In 1854 Texas laid the foundation which has developed into our present day public school system of which every Texan can brag. Only 3 generations away much education was a way of private schools and a FREE grade and high school education was out of reach of many of the children. Today in contrast the poorest child has EXACTLY the same opportunity as the world's richest child for the basic education. The very key to education is democratic treatment of children, and by the same token EDUCATION is likewise the golden key to the America we love and cherish. Neither could have existed day with out the other.

Next week every parent should call her or himself of the school's visitation to visit the classrooms. Next to the preacher, the public school teacher is most ordained good to minister to a child's life of present and future wellbeing. Parents should learn to know and trust and love the teacher of their child. More than the salary increase, we'd bet the school teacher would rather have a few flowers, or of praise, or often, far too often, the teacher's a lifetime wondering whether or her crusade is worth the gain. Tell the classroom teacher of your appreciation. She deserves it.

Not Just For Old Age

Don't make the mistake of thinking of social security insurance only as old age protection. John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security office, said this week.

"Because 'old age' comes first in the title of the program, many people overlook the fact that it is survivors insurance, too," he said. "The survivors protection feature of the program is of the greatest importance to the younger worker. While the time when he can retire and get monthly payments is many years away, his widow and children would get monthly benefits if anything should happen to him at any time while he is insured under the law." Hutton declared.

He pointed out that under the survivors insurance portion of the social security program, monthly benefits were being paid to over 1,170,000 widowed mothers and minor children at the end of July. In many families social security in surance payments are making it possible to maintain the home and to educate the children after the untimely death of the family bread winner.

V. A. Quiz

Q. What's the address of VA headquarters in Washington? I want to send in my application for Korean G I Bill training, and I want quick action.

A. Your application for Korean GI training should not be sent to VA headquarters in Washington. Instead, it should be sent to your nearest VA Regional office, which is responsible for acting on R. VA in Washington would only have to

return your application to the proper Regional Office anyhow, so time would be lost by mailing it to Washington.

Q. I am about to finish a correspondence course in accounting under the World War II GI Bill. I have some entitlement left, and I would like to go to school and take an advanced accounting course. Could I do this?

A. No. Once you complete or discontinue a course under the World War II GI Bill, after a cut off date for starting, you are not

permitted under the law to take another course.

Q. I hold a Korean GI term insurance policy; the kind that does not pay dividends. Could I apply for the total disability income provision that would pay me money in case I am totally disabled?

A. No. The total disability income provision may not be added to non-participating GI insurance policies; to hype that does not pay dividends.

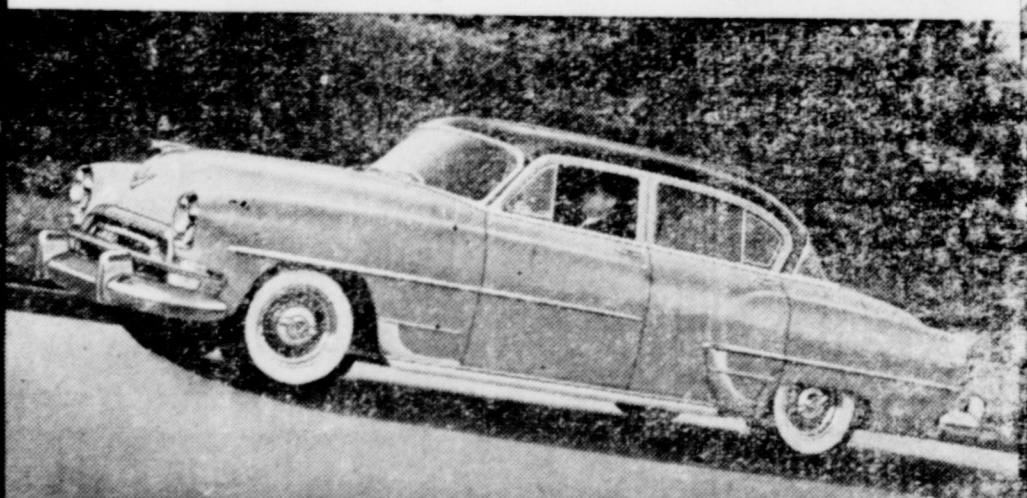
