

"Because 'old age comes first in he title of the program, many people overlook the fact that it is sur-vivors insurance, too" he said. "The survivors protection feature of the program is of the greatest importance to the younger worker. While the time when he can retire and get monthly payments is many years away, his widow and child-ren would get monthly benefits if anything should happen to him at any time while he is insured under the law," Hutton declared.

He pointed out that under the survivors insurance portion of the social security program, monthly benefits were being paid to over 1,170,000 widowed mothers and minor children at the end of July. In many families social security in surance payments are making it possible to maintain the home and to educate the children after the untimely death of the family bread winner.
