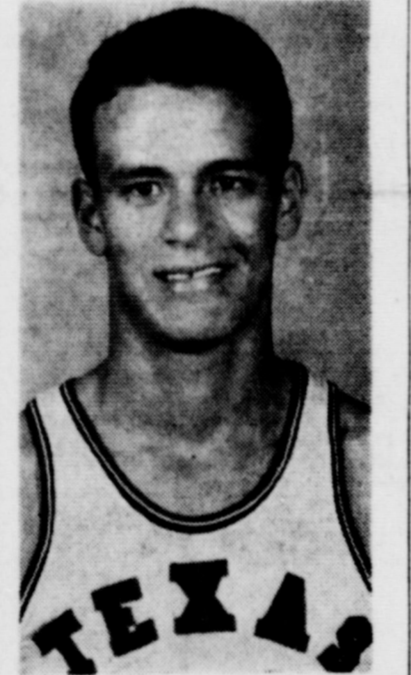
CHARLES PIERCE TO GRADUATE THIS MAY

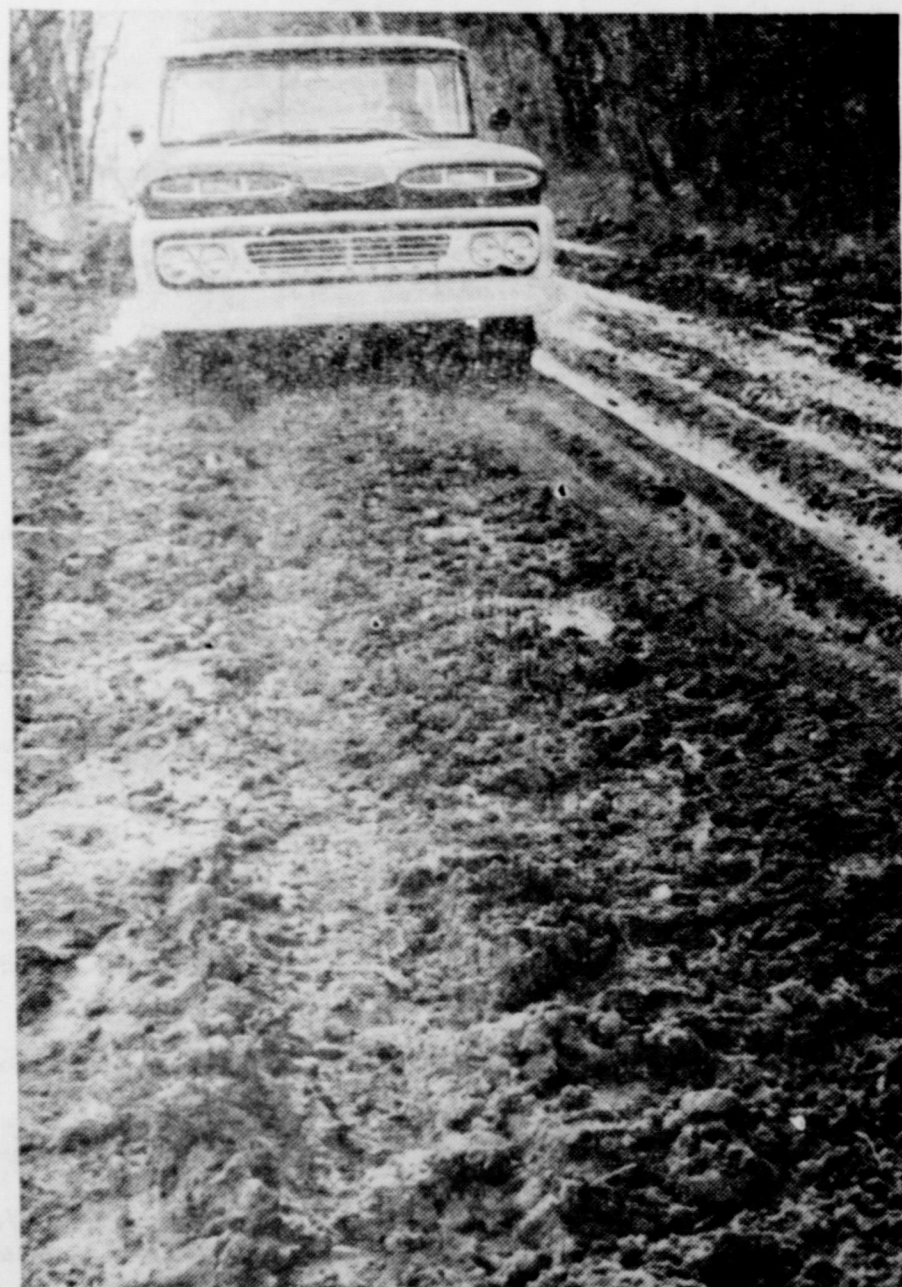

Little French Girl Conquers America

Francoise Sagan is a little French girl of 18 who conquered America last year. And she is about to do it all over again this Spring.

It began in the Summer of 1953, when Francoise flunked out of the Sorbonne in Paris. Having little else to do, she wrote a book, and called it "Bonjour Tristesse."

The story of a girl, her father, and his two mistresses, it was told with such frank innocence and perception, that Francoise became overnight the talk of all France. The book won the coveted Prix des Critiques, and was translated into a dozen languages.

But it was the American edition that really catapulted Francoise to the literary heavens, dominating best-seller lists for nearly a year, and for three months unchallenged first-place champion.

The final conquest came with Francoise's visit to the United States. She landed in America hatless, with closely-cropped hair and wearing a black skirt and striped turtle-neck sweater. A slim, dreamy-eyed girl who had been educated in convent schools and written poems at 13, and who had been described by a friend as "a strange mixture of reserve, exuberance, recklessness and worldly wisdom," she completely captivated her American hosts.

Those who had read her sensational novel were especially delighted at the mingled innocence and provocativeness of this teen-ager who loved fast cars and jazz as much as she loved 18th Century literature. "Sometimes I think philosophic

thoughts when I have nothing better to do," she told one reporter. Asked what friends her own age thought of her book, she replied: "They're too young to read it."

This year, "Bonjour Tristesse" and Francoise Sagan are about to conquer America again. Reprinted by Dell Publishing Company in a 35¢ edition, the paperback is on its way to selling a million and more copies, and there is no telling when Americans will tire of this perceptive study of love in modern France. As for the little French import who created the biggest stir this side of the Atlantic since Lafayette, she is in quiet retreat from the combined French and Americans revolutions she privately launched, and is busily at work on a second novel.

Medical treatment of acute alcoholism has been "all but revolutionized" by the use of the new tranquilizing drugs, a leading official of the American Medical Association says.

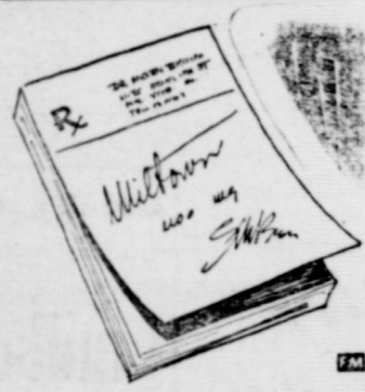

Block, Chairman of the Committee on Alcoholism of the AMA's Council on Mental Health, made the statement in a recent article in the Journal of the American Medical Association, reviewing the general problem of alcoholism, the doctor-patient relationship and the drugs used in treating alcoholics.

The tranquilizers, Dr. Block wrote, "have proved of immense value in treating the acutely intoxicated patient. The patient not only is given a sense of comfort that enables him to sleep but is also relieved of his nausea and is able to eat much earlier than heretofore."

He described one of the drugs, meprobamate ("Miltown"), for example, as having a "decidedly tranquilizing effect upon the patient, reducing the tension and alleviating some of the anxieties so common in the alcoholic...."

"Many physicians treating alcoholics use these tranquilizing drugs to the exclusion of all other medical practitioners generally," he said, "and have obtained excellent results with this type of treatment. Even with patients in delirium, tremens and extreme hyperactivity, these drugs have been used very effectively, although large doses may be necessary," Dr. Block continued.

While cautioning against possible side effects from the tranquilizing drugs, Dr. Block said, "so far there have been no untoward reactions reported from the use of meprobamate...."

In a preliminary report, the Committee on Alcoholism pointed out that "much of the recently developed information on... (treating the problems of alcoholism)... has not had wide circulation." As a result, the Committee said, "many patients with this illness are not now receiving the necessary attention and treatment that could be given them."
