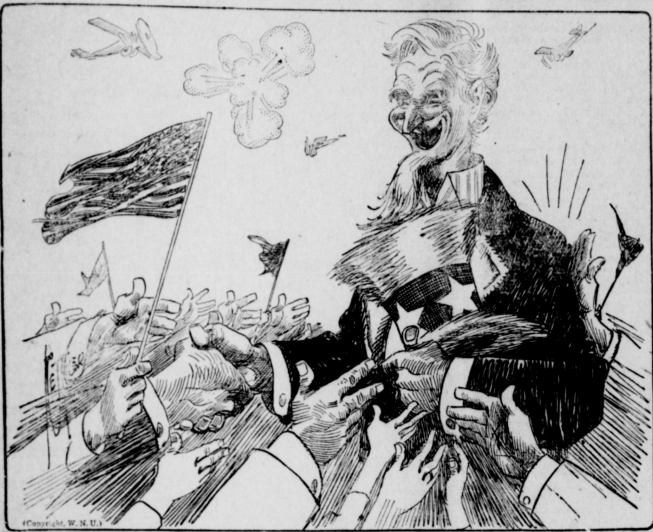
FALLS IN RUBBER BALL

TO BEGIN WORK IN DECEMBER

Agent Will Be Selected By A. & M. Extension Department; Salary To Be \$2,600 Yearly

(Lynn County News)

At a meeting of the commissioners' court Wednesday afternoon, it was decided to employ a county farm agent in this county, his services to begin on December 1.

This date was selected for the reason that the court felt that this year's crop is already planted that date would be as early as he could be of any material benefit to the farmers.

The court agreed to pay \$1,000 of the salary and the Federal Government will pay \$1,600, making a total salary of \$2,600.

This action was taken because the commissioners felt that the farmers wanted another trial of this kind of work. Petitions bearing the names of a large portion of the farmers of the county were filed with the court some time ago praying that a county farm agent be procured for this county.

This move had the support and backing of the Tahoka Chamber of Commerce as well as other organizations in the county. No action was taken on the petitions when filed, but after due consideration the court decided Wednesday to make provision for this work, the services of the agent to begin on December 1.

The agent for this county will be selected by the Extension Service of the A. & M. College and the name of the agent selected will be given later.

That this a forward step on the part of Lynn county seems to be the general opinion of the citizenship. Every county touching Lynn county has an agent, we believe, except Crosby and Borden. Lubbock on the north, Garza on the east, and Dawson on the south, have long had an agent. Recently Terry county employed an agent, the name of the county agent for a part of the time.

The news has long favored the employment of an agent in this county, believing that an efficient agent can be of vital assistance to the farmers in their farm operations and in teaching the importance and methods of preserving the fertility of the soil.

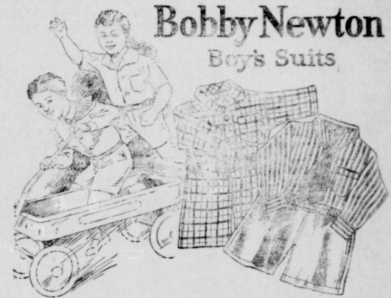
