SOME APHIDS

Following is a report on crop conditions made by the Extension Service —

Light to heavy rains fell over a wide area during the past week. Heavy hail damaged or destroyed stands of cotton on an estimated 100,000 acres. Damage was heavy in Borden, Lynn, Dawson, Floyd, and Terry counties. Some increase in insect activity was observed in a number of fields. Conditions were favorable for growth of cotton in areas not affected by hail.

Aphids were observed in light infestations in North Lynn county. Fleahoppers were reported in light infestations where cotton has reached the fruiting stage. Cotton is too small to attract many insects.

PREPARE NOW PRE-SCHOOL CHILD FOR SCHOOL

Austin — Although summer has hardly started in Texas, school days are practically around the corner and it is time that mothers should start thinking about getting the young ones ready for school again.

Special consideration should be given to the thousands of Texas youngsters who will be starting school for the first time. Most school districts have certain requirements which must be met before a child may be entered in school. Foremost in nearly every school is proof of birth. If you do not have a copy of your child's birth certificate, a certified copy may be obtained from the Texas State Department of Health for a one dollar fee.

Write to the Bureau of Vital Statistics, Texas State Department of Health, Austin. Be certain to include the child's name, birth date and birth place and the name of his parents. Also send \$1. Every child should have a pre-school health exam. Height, weight, posture, vision and hearing should be checked. Often school beginners' problems can be traced to faulty vision and hearing.

Have your dentist go over your child's teeth again. With the excitement and challenge of school, new physical and emotional demands are made on him and to get the most out of school, he needs to be physically ready for it.

To help prevent illness, check up on immunizations, especially your school district's requirements. See that your child is still protected against diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, small pox, and by all means have his polio series started if you have not already done so.

Town Youth Drowns In Stock Tank Here

Mishap Saturday On Earles Farm

At about 3:30 Saturday afternoon, with the temperature a burning 107 degrees, a tragic death overtook Willie Rodriguez, a well-liked 17 year old Spanish-American youth, Willie, and his brother, Julio, 23, were trying to escape the searing heat by cooling off in the John Earles stock tank about four miles south of town.

Willie, with an inflated inner tube, was splashing around, and Julio, who can swim, was in deep water. When Julio turned to look at his brother, Willie's hat was floating on the water and bubbles were coming to the surface. Julio rushed to the spot and managed to grasp the boy and the two surfaced and sank three times before the brother slipped from Julio's grip.

In the now muddy water the older youth in panic was unable to find the lad. Their grandfather, on the mud bank of the tank, witnessed the mishap. Beside himself with panic, Julio ran for help. Later Preston Stokes and J. T. Middleton Jr. reached the scene and got the apparently dead boy out. About five members of the Fire Department tried in vain to revive the youth but limited regis mortis was setting in.

Willie was known to most of O'Donnell. He attended school here thru the fifth grade. He was a good worker doing yard work around town. His parents, Mr and Mrs. Marcelino Rodriguez, own their home on east 11th street where the family lives.

Survivors, in addition to his parents, are five brothers, Julio, Earnest, Raul, and Cruz and two sisters, Carolina and Lucy.

Funeral services were at the O'Donnell Cemetery at 3 p. m. Monday.

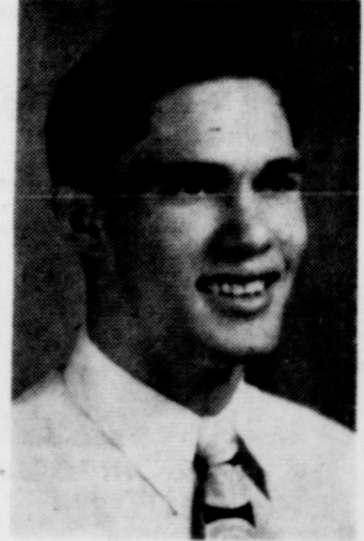

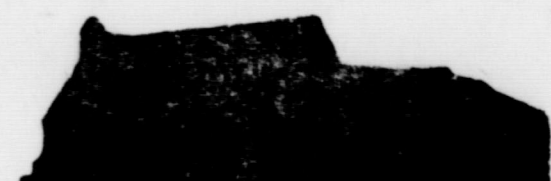

MANY PESTY INSECTS THIS YEAR

Austin -- This can be said without reservation -- we'll have more insects to fight this year than ever before, especially flies and mosquitoes. The reason is the unprecedented ed seige of wet weather most of the state is going thru this spring.

Mosquitoes breed in standing water -- whether in a Gulf Coast marsh, a West Texas stock tank, or a tin can or old tires in the back yard. They harbor in damp vegetation and undergrowth like we have so much this year. As for flies, they breed in the garbage and filth of the area. And conditions are equally favorable for most other insect species. Insects have troubled man ever since he has been on earth. In all there are some 10 thousand insect public enemies that do \$4 billion in damage annually. It is only by constant effort that man is able to hold his own against insects.

Insecticides have steadily improved. One, DDT, was developed in 1942, and gave early promise of providing the knockout punch against insect hordes. But it hasn't. Flies, salt marsh mosquitoes, roaches, and lice quickly developed resistance to the chemical and Mexican beetles, spider mites and many aphids are not affected by it.

Today we know a complete program of insect control calls for constant application of good home and community sanitation -- such things as garbage cans with tight lids, good systems of garbage pickups and well operated sewerage disposal plants -- together with periodic spraying with effective insecticides.

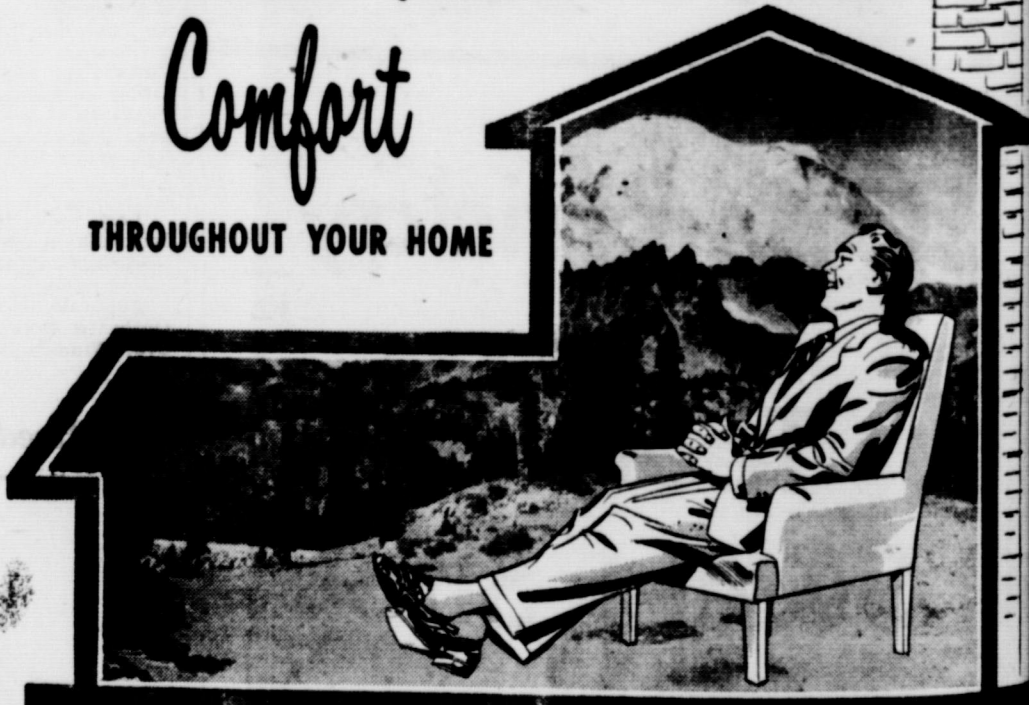

Pennsylvania Town Tackles Tough Job

CANTON, Pa.—Under the leadership of the Canton Borough Authority (water service), plans are now progressing for the complete numbering of every property in the borough.

The cooperation of the Canton Borough Council seems assured, thus paving the way to make the project legal. The plan has the backing of the post office, public utilities, and local firms.

Attempts have been made several times to have the town numbered but each time the task seemed too great and the project would fall by the wayside.

At the present time, Floyd D. Taylor, a member of the authority, has mapped the town and has the task two thirds completed for assigning numbers to each property.

It is the plan of the authority to have numbers purchased and as each resident is notified to have the numerals placed on the house.

In order to make this program fully effective it will be necessary to have an ordinance passed by the council and published.

The numbering project will come as good news to all residents of Canton as well as to strangers coming to town. At the present time there has been no rhyme, reason or sequence to the numbering. If a person didn't like his number he could buy any number and place on his building.

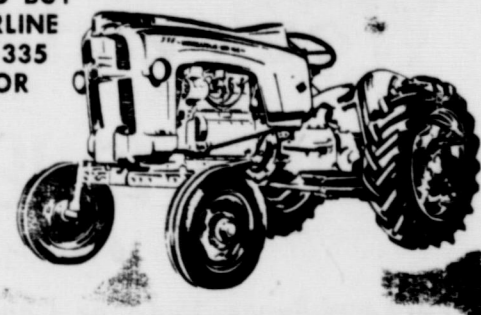
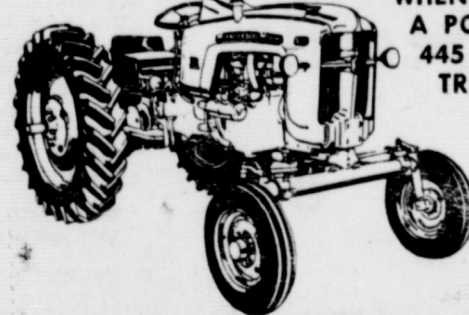
