### Suggestions On Polio Control Given

Dr. Geo. W. Sox., State Health Officer, has issued the following statements and suggestions concerning the control and preven-tion of poliomyelitis which is always more prevalent during Until recently it was gener-ally believed that this infection

is transmitted by means of discharges from the respiratory tract. It is now believed that poliomyelitis is primarily anot her of the several gastrointestinal infections. Therefore, control measures must emphasize clean-up campaigns and improvements in sanitation. sanitaary Strict

must be observed in all comm-unities. Stringent efforts shoulld be made to eliminate the housfly and to destroy its breeding places. All mosquitoes and mosquito breeding places must eliminated at once. Every effort should be made to institute collection garbage approved systems immediatly Safe water supplies must be assured. Where adequate community sewage disposal systems are not available feasible, it is important to build and properly maintain san-itary septic tanks. In the event a water carriage system of sewage disposal cannot be secured it is important that at least an approved pit tyle toilet be con-structed and properly maintain-

All raw foods and les should be washed thoroughly befor use and protected from flies, filth, and insects. All eating and food handling estab-ishments should adhere stritly to the State Law concerning the sterilization of dishes utensils.

Every effort should be made to secure approved milk. Rats and mice should be eliminated Maintain in the home the same sanitary standards that nessary in combunity life. ticular attention should be paid to personal hygiene. Excreta from cases and contacts should handled and disinfected with the same scrupulous care as in typ-hold fever or bacillary dysentey headache, paralysis are vomiting, drowsiness, followed by stafness in the neck and back. When suspicious symp toms appear, a physician should be called immediately.






