EVERY AVERAGE American home will have a Christmas tree this year. Traditional and symbolic as the trees are, they present a great fire hazard, and should be carefully watched.

Remember that when you bring a tree into the house it is going to dry up. A freshly cut tree will not take fire any easier than the evergreen trees growing outside, but the hazard increases by the hour. For this reason, it is not wise to put up the tree too early before Christmas day or to leave it too long after the 25th.

Families, clubs, churches or organizations that wish to keep their trees up longer than a week should take special safeguards to keep it reasonably safe.

The tree can be kept fresh by setting it up in a pan of water. Cut off the base of the tree at an angle at least one inch above the original cut and keep it standing in water during the entire period it remains in the house. It may be necessary to add water from time to time to keep the water level above the cut.

Place the tree well away from stoves, radiators, and other sources of heat. When you smoke, stay away from the tree. Also be sure that the tree is secured in such a way that it cannot fall. Do not put it near a doorway where it might block an avenue of escape, should a fire occur.

Ag. Census Given

The 1959 Census of Agriculture, conducted in Lynn County last fall counted 962 farms, according to a preliminary report just issued by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

Total land in farms was 569, 074 acres. The average size of farm was 591.6 acres (land and buildings) in the county was \$90,763.

Of the county's farm operators, 214 owned their farms, 249 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage, and 499 were tenant farmers.

The average age of farm operators in the county was 45.9 years. There were 78 farm operators 65 or more years of age.

Of the 962 farms in the county, 830 were commercial farms.

Detailed statistics on crops, livestock, equipment, etc., are presented in the preliminary report, with comparable statistics for 1954. Copies of the county report may be obtained for 10 cents each from the Bureau of the Census, Washington 25, D. C.

**Copyright Law Is Important**

America has led the way in pro-  
 tecting the fruit of man's mind.  
 Of literature, drama, scholarship,  
 and vast media of public infor-  
 mation prosper because of our copy-  
 right law.

Are you an author? An artist?  
 A playwright? Or are you thinking  
 of going into such work? If so, find  
 out about copyright law. It pro-  
 tects you—against copying, but not  
 against independent reproduction  
 of a similar work.

A copyright enables you to sue  
 him if federal courts for damages  
 and collect — if someone copies  
 your work or any substantial part  
 of it without permission.

The most important single thing  
 about copyrights is this: Do not  
 publish anything until you find out  
 what kind of a copyright notice  
 you need. If you publish without  
 proper notice, you lose all rights  
 in the work.

As long as your book is not pub-  
 lished, you own the script. The  
 common law protects your right  
 in it the same as in any other  
 property. For an unpublished book  
 you need no added legal safeguard.

You cannot register its copyright.  
 But you may copyright such  
 work as a play, lecture, sermon,  
 or artwork, though it has not been  
 published.

A book's copyright may be reg-  
 istered in the author's name or any  
 one he selects, such as the publish-  
 er, who can better guard the copy-  
 right or grant proper consent to  
 quote the book under a contract  
 between himself and his publisher.

Here are some other kinds of  
 work you can copyright: Poems,  
 newspapers, maps, photographs,  
 dramatic and musical compositions.

A copyright is good for 28 years.  
 You may renew it once so as to  
 keep it in effect for a total of 56  
 years.

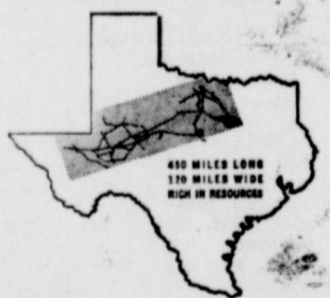

**St. Nicholas Possessed Of Great Virtue, Piety**

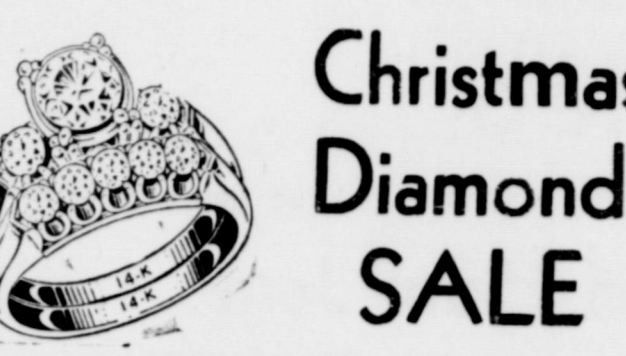
Saint Nicholas, Bishop of Myra, was said to have been a saint of great virtue and piety.

USDA scientists have discovered  
a possible new use for wheat. In  
laboratory tests, acid - modified  
wheat flour has proved equal to  
commercial sizing material for im-  
parting strength to paper.

With the rising toll of highway  
deaths in the state, many of them  
rural residents, the Texas Farm &  
Ranch Safety Council urges drivers  
to slow down when driving on  
rural roads. Because all roads in  
Texas are not marked, they  
advise slowing to a stoppable speed  
before crossing any road. Farm  
traffic is considerably heavier at  
this season, and hence, the extra  
caution.

Extra income can result from well  
kept farm or ranch business re-  
cords. C. S. Bates, extension farm  
management specialist, points out  
that good records can often help  
farmers and ranchmen make the  
right management decisions. Too,  
he adds, records are very import-  
ant come tax paying time. Local  
county extension agents can supply  
information and publications on  
record keeping.

With the huge feed grain re-  
serves now on hand and the large  
imports of pork into Texas, Lloyd  
Bergsma, extension livestock mar-  
keting specialist, suggests that an  
expanded swine feeding program  
might offer opportunities for in-  
creasing farm income in the state.
