

Union Station marks a noteworthy accomplishment in the history of important engineering undertakings, from which travelers from all parts of the United States will derive pleasure and benefit.

The station is without doubt one of the finest and most efficiently designed railroad terminals in the world. It forms a vital link in the realization of the "Chicago City Beautiful Plan." Simplicity, accessibility and convenience for the traveling public are the essential virtues of the new terminal. Rest and recreation rooms, ticket offices, barber shop, dining rooms, stores of various kinds, and almost every convenience known to travelers, are to be found on the one level, no steps to

The main station is a low monumental type of building with a row of massive columns of classic design along the entire east front. Once inside, the traveler finds himself in a gigantic waiting room more than 100feet high and brilliantly lighted through skylights in the great arch ceiling. Colonnades inclose the room, the walls of which are patterned after the architecture of ancient Rome. Bordering this room are the ultra-complete passenger terminal facilities. An innovation in railway terminal design is a

aference room accommodating 125 which is available, without

charge, to patrons of the Union Station lines for conferences and other meetings.

To give some idea of the immensity of the new station, it may be stated that the main building covers an area of about three acres with a concourse covering 60,000 square feet. The entire terminal facilities cover more than 35 acres and will expedite the promp and satisfactory handling of 50,000 passengers, 400 tons of baggage and 300 trains daily with room for future expansion. Fifteen acres of glass used in the various coverings over the train sheds, which extend more than 1,200 feet beyond the main A total of 17,000 tons of structure. structural steel, 175,000 cubic feet of Indiana limestone and 10,000 cubic feet of granite were used in the station building and concourse. The foun dation consists of 449 cylindrical concrete plers from four to ten feet in diameter, reaching to a depth of more than 60 feet below the level of the Chicago river.

Those who have had the privilege of inspecting the new station pro nounce it a marvel in terminal con struction and are urging their friends to see it on their next visit to Chicago

The station is used jointly by the Pennsylvania Railroad; Chicago, Mil-waukee & St. Paul Ry.; Chicago, Bur-lington & Quincy R. R., and the Chicago & Alton R. R.



CARE OF CONVALESCENT IN SUMMER

For those who are just recovering from a serious illness the problem o food is a serious one. The patient. though well on the road to recovery is usually weakened by the rigors of disease and the excessive heat is wont to sap his energy. Hence, the foods that are consumed during this period should be considered carefully as to digestibility, food value, ease similation, purity and sterility. These are important in any food but espe cially so when the consumer is not strong and healthy.

In most cases, the one who is con valescing consumes milk in largquantities. This food contains all o the elements that are essential to the body. If milk is pure and germless it is easily digested and assimilated

Where the milk supply is uncertain or the quality not of the best, evap orated milk should be employed. It is sterile; it is just pure milk with about sixty per cent of the water removed Its double richness may be modified if desired, by the addition of water o it may be used just as it is, where rich, creamy dishes are desired.

Many people make the mistake o confusing evaporated milk with con densed milk. They are not at all sim! lar in appearance, composition o taste. They cannot be used for the same purposes; condensed milk is combination of sugar and milk; evap orated milk has no added sugar, being pure milk of double-rich quality and food value.

Following are recipes of easily prepared dishes and foods that are well suited for the invalld and the con

Loganberry Cream.

& cup water

% cup evaporated % cup loganberry milk juice 2 thsp. lemon juice Pinch salt

Put all ingredients in a Mason fruit Jar and shake thoroughly. Chill and serve in glasses filled 1/2 full of fee chips. Raspberry, blackberry, and cherry juice may be used instead of the loganberry.

Iced Cocoa.

tsp. cocoa tsp. sugar 4 cup water Pinch salt Pinch salt % cup water % cup evaporated % tsp. vanilla

Mix cocoa and sugar thoroughly and add the ¼ cup water and boil over a low flame for 15 minutes. Scald the diluted raik and add cocoa syrup and salt. Continue cooking for 15 minutes in double boller. Add vanilla. Chili and serve with chipped ice, Top with whipped cream.
