MAHON SAYS '57 COTTON ACRES TO BE SAME AS '56

Congressman George Mahon of the 19th District advised from his office in Lubbock this week that he has received information from the Department of Agriculture in Washington indicating that 1957 cotton acreage allotments in Texas will be about the same in each co-

unty as in 1956.

An additional large shift of acreage from West Texas to East Texas is not contemplated since it is planned that each Texas county will get not less than 99 percent of its 1956 allotment. Under the plan most West Texas counties should get slightly more acreage than in

1956.
The Department of Agriculture has approved a compromise plan which had been submitted by the State ASC Committee which will allow the State Committee to withhold from the State allotment slight ly less than four (4) percent for small farms of 15 acres or less. For hardship cases and all purposes other than small farms 2.78 per cent will fe witheld. West Texas farmers and farm groups had asked that not more than two (2) per cent be withheld for other than small farms. The total amount with held for all purposes will be about 6 3-4ths percent of the State allot-ment. Mahon said, "I had joined with other West Texans in an effort to keep the withheld acres to the lowest possible figure. I think our efforts helped because an additional large shift of acreage out of West Texas in 1957 is not now con templated. However the compro-mise plan still gives the edge to the small farm areas of East Texas."

TWO MAIN TYPES OF APPENDICITIS

All of us at one time or another have pain and cramping in the abdomen. Fortunately, most of these pains are unimportant. However, if the pain persists it should not be ignored. It may be the beginning sign of appendicitis, a disease which, althou far from being simple, is easily and safely cured if surgery can be performed in time, says Dr. Henry Holle, Commissioner of Health.

There are two main types appendicitis — acute and ch appendicitis — acute and chronic. Acute appendicitis strikes suddenly and is usually marked by severe pain that generally grows sharper and stronger. Occasionally the pain may let up or stop entirely but this must not be taken to mean that the attack is over. In fact, it may be a warning signal that the appendix has ruptured, thus lessening the localized pain, while a more serious condition, peritonitis usually gets a start. Other usual signs of acute appendicitis slight fever, nausea, vomiting and tenderness over region of the appendix. Chronic appendicitis is

just what the name implies; it comes and goes. But it may, at any time, become acute. It results from acute attacks that have been mild enough to subside without an operation. Symptoms in general are the same as in the acute type but they are also similar to other adverse abdominal conditions.
