Cleaning, painting and wallpaper sprees at this time of the year sometimes yield only a small measure of satisfaction since they merely serve to point up how dingy curtains and drapes look.

You've suddenly discovered this state of affairs and simply can't afford new curtains or drapes. What's to be done?

New and inexpensive trimmings have saved many curtains and draperies from being a complete disgrace. A simple tinting or dyeing job done quickly in the washing machine is another answer to rather perplexing problem.

this Neither of these involves much expense or time and both offer great satisfaction because they make old things look almost new. If you merely want a change, then add a touch of inexpensive trimming

temporarily which you'll plan to emove when fall comes around. Effects rather than intricate stitches are what we strive for in both curtains and draperies, and this means little work for you.

Look over problem window apparel carefully and decide from these tips just what would be the best solution. It may be that shrunken curtains or drapes may be more easily used with smaller windows in another room than trying to make them fit the original room. If so, you may be able to afford new draperies for this particular room. On the other hand, some fringe or other trimming might be used for edging the drapes, thus giving them a whole new aspect, very possibly more effective than they were originally.

If the color of curtains needs refreshing, plan to use the washing machine to do the work quickly and without streaking. An agitator will spread the color evenly.

Use These Tricks To Lengthen Curtains


Faded Draperies Respond To Treatments like These

Badly faded draperies often result after long time usage because they are exposed to sun as well as windows which leak. Don't feel too low about this situation because it, too, can be helped. If the draperies are light and you

want to cover all the faded spots completely, plan to use a fairly dark dye. If you don't want too dark a color on the draperies, then remove the original color with remover. Check a sample of the material to see whether the drapes will take both color remover and dye since many of these require hot water. Interesting results are often

achieved by dyeing printed draperies because the print remains and background color is made darker. You can outline the print with light colored yarns, thus giving interesting texture and new color to the drapes.

So all the charges from whatever source, whether in praise or condemnation, of this nation's foreign policy either in Europe or Asia, are charges directed at the people of the United States. Let's see if this is true.

Demobilized Too Rapidly

All of you folks in the home towns of the nation remember after the shooting war stopped in 1945, our chiefs of staff, our state department and the president. definitely believed we should keep a tremendous army in Europe and another army of occupation in Japan and China. It would have been expensive to keep a million men under arms in Europe and approximately 150,000 to 250,000 in China. But what happened?

Almost every mother, father, wife and sweetheart in the country burned up the wires, swamped the mails with "Get my boy home." Members of congress were panicky. Constituents decended upon them in droves and smothered them with letters to get those boys back home. Congress fell for it and demobilization came so rapidly we could hardly get ships fast enough. And, as our troops embarked for home, Russian troops moved into the so-called satellite countries, with the exception of Czechoslovakia.

So the mothers and fathers and sweethearts of this country fixed the foreign policy of this nation in 1945 and 1946. It was a foreign policy against all reason and prudence, and our leaders knew it. Had we kept a million men in Europe there would have been no cold war and Russia would have been contained. Had there been 250,000 GIs sitting in China, that unfortunate nation teday would still be free, although probably as corrupt as it always has been. But the communists would not have overrun the country and found themselves today poised to advance toward the rest of Asia. And, it would have probably cost less than the ECA.





Sunken City Lures Diver To Explore Port Royal, **Old Pirate Stronghold**

SOUTH GATE, CALIF .- Sometime this spring a lumbering tanklike tractor will slowly edge down the streets of a private city sunk since 1692 under the waters of the Caribbean sea.

At the controls of the tractor will be Lt. Harry E. Riesberg, a California deep sea diver. In 1935 Rieseberg, hunting pirate treasure on sunken Spanish galleons off Kingston. Jamaica, stumgled into Port Royal, a fabulous city destroyed by an earthqupake and tidal wave in

Now, with a costly expedition to back him up, Rieseberg is going back to Port Royal, the city under 30 fathoms of water. For 15 years he's been dreaming and planning to revisit Port Royal. What he saw in 1935 is worth a second look.

He stood on the ocean floor, All around him were crumbled relics of buildings, now encrusted with dazzling coral formations. Brilliant tropical fish swam in and out of 200 year old windows.

All alone, he didn't have the equipment to venture too far from his salvage ship. But he could see other streets, other buildings.

Back on shore, Rieseberg learned that Port Royal was the lair of fabulous pirates in the 17th century. It was known as the richest-and wickedest-city in the world. Captive girls, bedecked in plundered finery, presided over tables set with gold and silver. Then, in 1692, the whole city and 5,000 people were plunged into the sea.

Rieseberg thought that some of the pirates' treasure might still be in the water covered buildings of

A five-point program to "balance the soil's needs" and obtain maximum crop yields per acre at lowest production costs, was outlined by O. T. Coleman, Missouri university extension soils specialist.

Here are the steps Coleman suggests:

1-Provide plenty of plant food in available form for growing crops. 2-Have soil tests made to find out whether the plant food supply is in balance. Growing crops need a balanced ration the same as do humans and livestock. A soil test will be a guide in adding the kind and amount of plant nutrients the soil needs.

3-Get the soil in condition so crops can use the plant foods. This means building up the organic matter supply. Organic matter can be added and soil tilth improved by growing well-fed deep-rooted legumes such as alfalfa or sweet clover in the rotation. When the soil is well stocked with plant nutrients and organic matter, minerals are released so that plant roots can more efficiently use them.

4-Keep water, plant nutrients and soil at home by conservation methods. Where needed, these may include terracing and contouring to reduce runoff and erosion losses on upland soils.

5-Follow a well-balanced cropping system. Rotate pasture and green manure crops regularly with grains. Livestock is a "must" to properly make use of pasture and roughage crops. Tests have shown that where a crop is pastured off, about 75 per cent of the organic matter is returned to the soil through

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

Most Americans, who cannot make themselves believe Russia is ready or wants a war, were being told otherwise by European diplomats.

In Europe the belief is growing that Russia now accepts a shooting war as the alternative to the cold war in winning world supremacy. Until recently experts believed European security could be viewed in terms of political activity and economic pressure.

A recent poll of European diplomats, however, reveals that they now believe the political bureau of the Russian Communist party soon will be willing to fight a hot war in pursuit of its aims.

One reliable source declares the Russians would be "ready" to fight in 1952. By then the Soviet Union will have a stockpile of atomic bombs and numerical superiority in ground and air forces.

The Russians are estimated to have 20,000 first-line planes in oper-ation at the present time. That would indicate Russia may be able to fight a "hot war" on a moment's notice. It is generally accepted by observers that the atomic bomb is already in production behind the iron curtain.

BARUCH: Stop Inflation

Since the war all classes of Americans-farmers, laborers, busiressmen, office workers-have worried about inflation.

For all of them the dollar buys less than before the war. Of late, however, there has been little said or done about the inflation spiral. Now Bernard M. Baruch, adviser to Presidents for 40 years, has taken another swing at inflation.

"Inflation is the cold war we Americans are waging against ourselves," the statesman warns.

"Inflation affects the integrity of all our defenses, both moral and military, national and international," he added. "This continuing spiral doesn't necessarily mean trouble ahead if we don't put a stop to it. Somewhere along the line, the balloon always bursts.

The national situation as he sees it finds the country balancing precariously between employment and the maintenance of a high standard of living, and unemployment and inflation.

We must work out a program to curb inflation that will be fair to everyone, he said. No one will like it, but we must do it and soon.


