### Well Set For Caswell Farm Near Draw

Last week's rains totaled nearly one and half inches to put the area out of the drouth and insure general planting. About one fourth of the crop off to a fast growth while this week the remainder of the land is being seeded or re-seeded. Tractors and farmers are working round the clock to get the planting laid by. General tests show that the moisture has met the sub soil and the cotton could go thru June without rain and still get by. The week end also saw the announcement of the location of a step out to the recent Magnolia discovery east of Draw. The new well will be the Magnolia, No. 1 W W Caswell west of the discovery. Also a 3500 wildcat will be drilled 2 miles northwest of Redwine on H. Howell farm. One and half miles southwest of Lamesa a wildcat will be drilled to test Spraberry production.

### Needs of Corn

Corn needs plenty to eat and drink to produce high protein yields. You can get extra pounds of protein and more bushels per acre, too, with a well-rounded bill of fare based on good soil management. University of Illinois research men proved that in tests on a number of experiment fields. H. J. Snider of the agronomy staff reports that good soil management increased the corn's protein content by nearly a pound per bushel. Corn grown on well treated land averaged 5.8 pounds of protein per bushel, or about 10 percent of the total weight. Corn on untreated soil averaged only 4.8 pounds of protein per bushel, or about 8.5 percent.

The well managed land had the benefit of liming and rotation built around well-fed deep-rooted legumes. The organic matter added by the legumes built good soil structure and tilth, improved the drainage and increased the soil's water holding capacity. That made it easier for corn roots to get at plant nutrients, oxygen and moisture. The fertilizer treatment included phosphate and potash where needed. In soils requiring more nitrogen than the legume crops provided, nitrogen fertilizer helped increase the corn's protein content. Snider says good soil management not only improved the corn's feeding value, but improves yield.

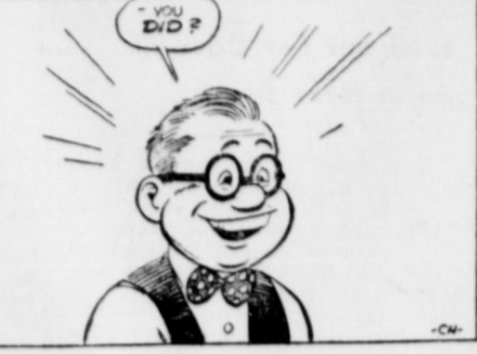

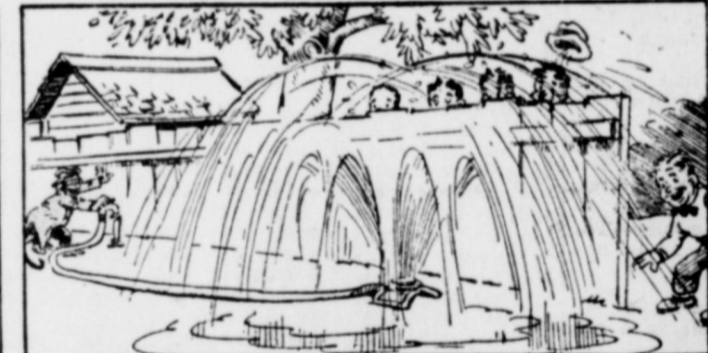

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# Dingy Drapes Look New With Inexpensive Trimmings

You've suddenly discovered this state of affairs and simply can't afford new curtains or drapes. What's to be done? if the curtains are white or ecru, select colored mending tape which goes well in the room in which curtains are used. Cut flowers or leaves out of the mending tape and apply scatter fashion to the curtains simply by pressing with a hot iron. These give a novel decorative touch to the room as well as added life to the curtains.

### Faded Draperies Respond To Treatments like These

Badly faded draperies often re- sult after long time usage because they are exposed to sun as well as windows which look. Don't feel too low about this situation because it, too, can be helped.

If the draperies are light and you want to cover all the faded spots completely, plan to use a fairly dark dye. If you don't want too dark a color on the draperies, then remove the original color with remover. Check a sample of the material to see whether the drapes will take both color remover and dye since many of these require hot water.

Interesting results are often achieved by dyeing printed draperies because the print remains and background color is made dark- er. You can outline the print with light colored yarns, thus giving in- teresting texture and new color to the drapes.

If the drapes have been lined, re- move the lining and see what the reverse side looks like. Frequently this may have been saved from

fading and often this has an inter- esting texture of its own. In this case, simply reverse the drapes, lining the side that has already been used. If it's necessary you can add some fringe. Deep "v" arrange- ments of this can be very effective in living and dining rooms.

When it's essential to dye a drap- ery a darker color that is less ef- fective in the room, you might con- sider adding a border that will light- en them sufficiently to be attractive.

### Add Length, Width By These Methods

There are several ways to remedy skimpy draperies through they have shrunk through cleaning or laundering, or were just too small in the beginning. The easiest way is to add a clever border along the inside edges of the drapes, and pos- sibly along the bottom, too.

When drapes are plain, choose a geometric print in the necessary width, making certain the fabric and texture match or harmonize properly with the drapery fabric.

Five or six inch inserts as borders can be extremely effective with plain drapery fabric. They may be purchased frequently in this width; otherwise, you may buy them wider and cut to fit.

If desired, another effective way to acquire a border is to buy ma- terial which goes well with the drapes, then stamp and stitch it with yarn to carry out an effective idea for a border.

### At Times Advice Is Infuriating

IN MY MAIL this week was a re- sentful and angry letter from a woman named Kate Bush, who lives in Williamsville, New York. Kate differs with me very definitely, and wants me to know it.

The article that enraged her was intended for those American women who are worried about money. These women, and there are mil- lions of them, are managing in- comes that range from \$3,000 to \$8,000 a year. With the rising de- mands of their children, the drain of visible and hidden taxes, the in- creased cost of living, they find themselves in a constant state of anxious discouragement. There simply is no way to make ends meet, to save the husband and father the responsibility that is kill- ing him, to satisfy the demands of the children.

Hundreds of letters come to me every year, emphasizing this predic- ament, and it was in answer to one of them that I quoted in my article the case of a Polish fami' that arrived in America only seven years ago, and that is now independent; the daughter prosperously married, the son in a contracting business with his father, the mother secure in the home she is so proud to keep comfortable and happy for them.

### Peace of Mind

I said that in the beginning these exiles rented three rooms for \$26 a month, "near the river" in an un- fashionable neighborhood, and that both son and daughter worked in high school days, so that two- thirds of the combined earnings went into government bonds. Fresh

everything. But it was not for wom- en like Kate Bush that I wrote. It was for the troubled ones, the we- rilled ones, who feel that every- thing in the home must be as com- fortable and luxurious as things always were in Mama's house, and who simply can't manage it today.

### Get Out from Under

To such I give the old advice, get out from under it all. Move to the unfashionable neighborhood — it needn't be a slum. As a matter of fact, unfashionable neighborhoods near the river or the bay, or up on the hill, or out in the fields on the fringes of the city, will be the choicest locations of all in a few years. When I was married in 1908, large sunny flats on the river in New York's upper east side, run- ning from 40th to 90th Street, were rented for \$20 and \$25 monthly. That is New York's most elegant Mayfair now.

If—and the if is underlined—you can move your family, as Kate Bush did, to country freedom, veg- etable garden, pets, skates, skis, sleds.

But so ideal an arrangement is not within reach of many of the housewives who find themselves caught in the confusions of a chang- ing world, and have not the courage to realize that at such times each of us must make her own world, sweep away past sensitiveness and prejudice, and give her children an honest view of tomorrow.

If you are living over your in- come, then try living under it. It is much more restful. Most of the things you will have to sacrifice are valuable only in your imagina- tion.

## Sunken City Lures Diver

### To Explore Port Royal, Old Pirate Stronghold

SOUTH GATE, CALIF.—Some- time this spring a lumbering tank- like tractor will slowly edge down the streets of a private city sunk since 1692 under the waters of the Caribbean sea.

At the controls of the tractor will be Lt. Harry E. Riesberg, a Cali- fornia deep sea diver. In 1935 Riese- berg, hunting pirate treasure on sunken Spanish galleons off King- tons, Jamaica, stumbled into Port Royal, a fabulous city destroyed by an earthquake and tidal wave in 1692.

Now, with a costly expedition to back him up, Riesberg is going back to Port Royal, the city under 30 fathoms of water. For 15 years he's been dreaming and planning to revisit Port Royal. What he saw in 1935 is worth a second look.

He stood on the ocean floor. All around him were crumbled relics of buildings, now encrusted with daz- zling coral formations. Brilliant tropical fish swam in and out of 200 year old windows.

All alone, he didn't have the equipment to venture too far from his salvage ship. But he could see other streets, other buildings.

Back on shore, Riesberg learned that Port Royal was the lair of fab- ulous pirates in the 17th century. It was known as the richest—and wickedest—city in the world. Cap- tive girls, bedecked in plundered finery, presided over tables set with gold and silver. Then, in 1692, the whole city and 5,000 people were plunged into the sea.

Riesberg thought that some of the pirates' treasure might still be in the water covered buildings of Port Royal.

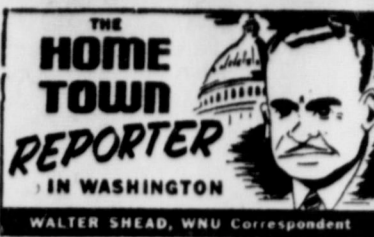
from enslaved Poland, these people found our world a veritable para- dise, and my point was that their road to security and success is open to all families, and that it is the only way to peace of mind, when domestic ways and means are the problem.

More than that, to completely change one's way of life is a most stimulating adventure. To stop wor- rying about one's social standing with utterly unimportant acquain- tances, to stop all consideration of what is the right environment for the children, to make a game of getting way under the income in- stead of eternally overspending it—this is really to live, and certain harassed anxious housewives never have known real living.

### Doesn't Need Counsel

But this advice infuriated Kate Bush, and her letter told me why. Kate Bush doesn't need such coun- sel. She has solved her problem by moving to the country, which she truthfully asserts is a much "more wholesome place for children than a cheap city slum. Our youngsters go to a fine school," her letter says, "and to Sunday school, and to a show every two weeks. They have pets and amusements galore, chick- ens, ducks, rabbits, skates, skis, sleds, every kind of fun at home. They never tease for money because there is no place to spend it."

Of course, that is an ideal solu- tion for all problems, mother's, dad's, the children's, the budget.



## People Decide Policy

PRESIDENT TRUMAN in a re- cent speech told his audience that the people of the United States, not Congress or the president, were responsible for the foreign policy of this country.

And in this great democracy of ours, no truer words were ever spoken. It is the temper and feel- ing of the people which fixes and directs the actions of this nation toward all other nations, just as it is the feeling of the people which determines domestic policies.

So all the charges from what- ever source, whether in praise or condemnation, of this nation's for- eign policy either in Europe or Asia, are charges directed at the people of the United States. Let's see if this is true.

## Demobilized Too Rapidly

All of you folks in the home towns of the nation remember after the shooting war stopped in 1945, our chiefs of staff, our state department and the president, definitely believed we should keep a tremendous army in Europe and another army of occupation in Japan and China. It would have been expensive to keep a million men under arms in Europe and approximately 150,000 to 250,000 in China. But what happened?

Almost every mother, father, wife and sweetheart in the country burned up the wires, swamped the mails with "Get my boy home." Members of congress were panicky. Con- stituents decended upon them in droves and smothered them with letters to get those boys back home. Congress fell for it and demobilization came so rapidly we could hardly get ships fast enough. And, as our troops embarked for home, Russian troops moved into the so-called satellite countries, with the exception of Czecho- slovakia.

So the mothers and fathers and sweethearts of this country fixed the foreign policy of this nation in 1945 and 1946. It was a foreign policy against all reason and prudence, and our leaders knew it. Had we kept a million men in Europe there would have been no cold war and Russia would have been contained. Had there been 250,000 GIs sitting in China, that unfortunate nation today would still be free, although probably as corrupt as it always has been. But the communists would not have overrun the country and found themselves today poised to advance toward the rest of Asia. And, it would have prob- ably cost less than the ECA.

We are paying for that too- rapid demobilization today. But that was what the people of this country wanted. We are also paying in high prices for a too-rapid elimination of war- time controls. But that, too, is what the people of this country wanted. You all remember the phone cry of "give us meat" in 1946. Well it elected a re- publican congress that year, the 80th Congress. So the tem- per and feeling of our people is direct domestic policies.

## Officials Alerted

Here in Washington today offi- cials are alerted, there is a tense- ness that is not just a cloak. Rus- sia is getting tougher and we are also getting tougher. There's likely to be bloodshed in Berlin, or Trieste or Greece. This is not po- litical talk the observers here say. There is real danger in the air and we are treading softly, getting more money for national defense, for more ships and planes, and stockpiling of war materials.

The Senator McCarthy hoax goes on. It is political and nothing more. A reasonable person would agree that the Senator lost his case on Owen Lattimore. Four outstanding Americans, General Marshall, former Secretary of State James Byrnes and former secretary of State Cor- dell Hull, as well as Dean Acheson have said emphatically that Latti- more never had anything to do with the state department, nor has he ever had anything to do with our foreign policy either in China or anywhere else. So that leaves the ex-communist Budenz and McCarthy on the other side. Lattimore may be a Communist, a leftist, a stooge, a brilliant writer, or all of them. What has it to do with the state de- partment?

## Reorganization Fight

Opposition to the President's re- organization plan for the agricul- tural department has developed with the charge it does not follow recommendations of the Hoover commission. The Farm Bureau federation urges rejection of the president's plan as does the Hoover commission under the theory the plan leaves too much to the discre- tion of the secretary of agricultur- e in farmers' affairs.

## THE READER'S COURTROOM

### Tricks, No Treat for Murderer

May the Police Use Trickery To Obtain a Confession?  
A wealthy recluse was found slain in his garage one night, and suspicion fell upon a woman who lived nearby. However, the police did not arrest her at once. Instead, a detective called at her house—pretending to be a cosmetics sales- man. He managed to draw the woman into conversation, and she confessed that she was "in hot water." He replied: "Tell me all about it. I've got a magic potion



that will keep you out of trouble!" Thereupon the woman confessed the murder—and, of course, was immediately arrested. At the trial, she protested that the confession had been obtained by trickery. However, the court said that didn't matter and found the woman guilty. The judge pointed out that the trick was designed merely to bring out the truth.

An actor was divorced by his wife, on grounds of immoral con- duct. At the trial, the main battle was for custody of the couple's 12-year-old daughter. It seems that the mother had been rather careful and firm with the girl—while the father had pampered her and humored her in every possible way. As might be expected, she told the court that she chose to go with her father. But in spite of this preference, the judge granted cus- tody of the child to the mother, for the good of the girl herself.

A man who lived in a small apart- ment decided to move to larger quarters. Since his lease still had six months to run, he subleased the place to a woman—after getting the consent of the landlord. A few weeks later, the woman skipped town. When the landlord demanded that the man keep up the rent payments, he flatly re- fused—on the ground that the land- lord had consented to the sublease. However, the court felt differently and held the man responsible for the woman's act.

### Must a Will Be Written in Ink?

While thumbing through a maga- zine in a dentist's waiting room, a man came upon a form for making out a will. On the spur of the moment he seized a pencil, filled out the form, and tucked it in his pocket. A few weeks later the man died. When his widow found out that all her husband's property had



been left to his brother, she went to court to contest the validity of the will. She argued that a document of such importance is no good unless made out in ink. However, the court disagreed and held the will valid. The judge said that, even though the man had been foolish to use a pencil, the will was just as "legal" as if written in indelible ink.

**Five-Point Program**



A five-point program to "balance the soil's needs" and obtain maximum crop yields per acre at lowest production costs, was outlined by O. T. Coleman, Missouri university extension soils specialist.

Here are the steps Coleman suggests:

- 1—Provide plenty of plant food in available form for growing crops.
- 2—Have soil tests made to find out whether the plant food supply is in balance. Growing crops need a balanced ration the same as do humans and livestock. A soil test will be a guide in adding the kind and amount of plant nutrients the soil needs.
- 3—Get the soil in condition so crops can use the plant foods. This means building up the organic matter supply. Organic matter can be added and soil tilth improved by growing well-fed deep-rooted legumes such as alfalfa or sweet clover in the rotation. When the soil is well stocked with plant nutrients and organic matter, minerals are released so that plant roots can more efficiently use them.
- 4—Keep water, plant nutrients and soil at home by conservation methods. Where needed, these may include terracing and contouring to reduce runoff and erosion losses on upland soils.
- 5—Follow a well-balanced cropping system. Rotate pasture and green manure crops regularly with grains. Livestock is a "must" to properly make use of pasture and roughage crops. Tests have shown that where a crop is pastured off, about 75 per cent of the organic matter is returned to the soil through manure.

**Remodeled Farm Kitchen Saves 45 Miles Yearly**

Mrs. George C. Wheatcroft of Warren county, Kentucky, recently had a farm kitchen remodeled into a u-shape, saving an estimated 45 miles of walking a year. She says: "I can now prepare three meals and take only 250 to 300 steps where it did take 300 to 500, and that means a saving of 45 miles a year. Besides saving miles it saves time and is much more attractive."

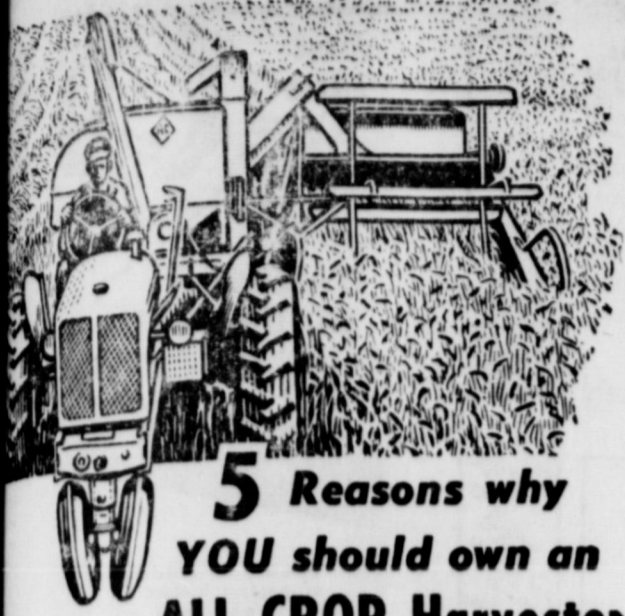

#### Secretary Brannan Pays Tribute to Homemakers

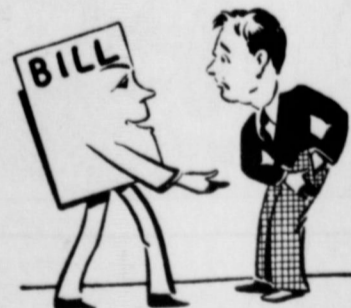
Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan paid tribute to three million homemakers in home demonstration work in special messages during the annual Home Demonstration week.

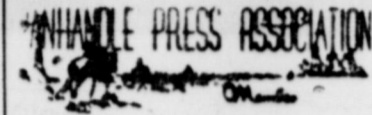

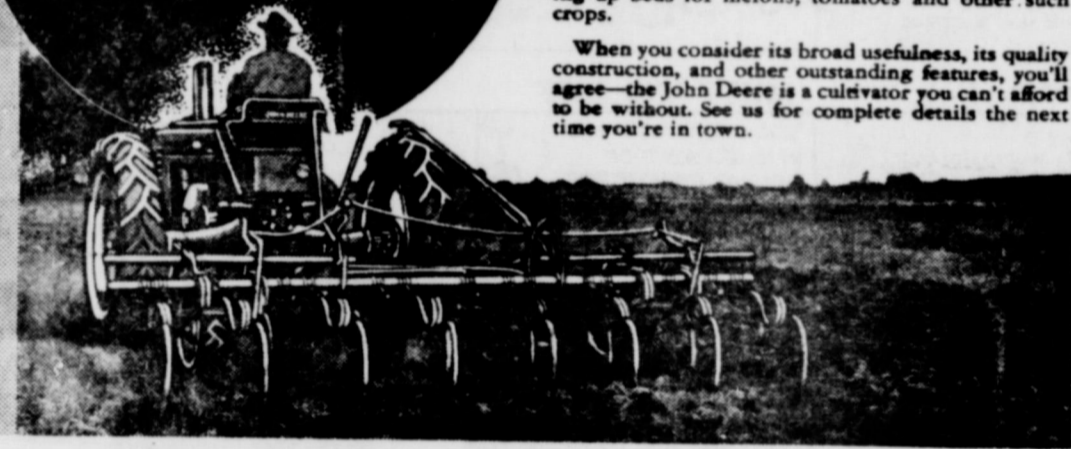

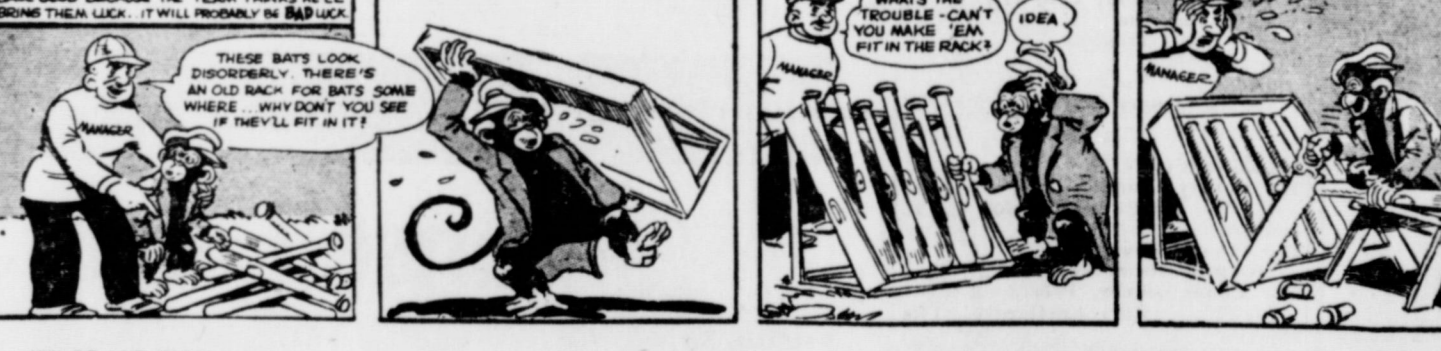

### Beat Fatigue With Oxygen

**Few Whiffs of Ozone Perk Up Mind, Body**  
PITTSBURGH, PA.—Tired housewives, fainting women and overworked businessmen have been offered new hope through experiments conducted by two local basketball teams.

The experiments seemed to indicate that a few whiffs of pure oxygen from a portable container will stop that breathless feeling and perk up both mind and muscle.

The basketball teams, threatened with "slumps" from overwork, bought oxygen dispensers, used them during games and walked off with just about all the honors in western Pennsylvania.

Homestead high, trailing the Altoona (Pa.) team 15 to 8 in the first quarter, hauled its first stringers out of the game and made them take a few pulls at the machine. At the half, Homestead led, 27 to 19, and the "oxygen eaters" won the game going away, 60 to 44.

## RUSSIA:

### Wants Hot War

Most Americans, who cannot make themselves believe Russia is ready or wants a war, were being told otherwise by European diplomats.

In Europe the belief is growing that Russia now accepts a shooting war as the alternative to the cold war in winning world supremacy. Until recently experts believed European security could be viewed in terms of political activity and economic pressure.

A recent poll of European diplomats, however, reveals that they now believe the political bureau of the Russian Communist party soon will be willing to fight a hot war in pursuit of its aims.

One reliable source declares the Russians would be "ready" to fight in 1952. By then the Soviet Union will have a stockpile of atomic bombs and numerical superiority in ground and air forces.

The Russians are estimated to have 20,000 first-line planes in operation at the present time. That would indicate Russia may be able to fight a "hot war" on a moment's notice. It is generally accepted by observers that the atomic bomb is already in production behind the iron curtain.

## BARUCH:

### Stop Inflation

Since the war all classes of Americans—farmers, laborers, businessmen, office workers—have worried about inflation.

For all of them the dollar buys less than before the war. Of late, however, there has been little said or done about the inflation spiral.

Now Bernard M. Baruch, adviser to Presidents for 40 years, has taken another swing at inflation.

"Inflation is the cold war we Americans are waging against ourselves," the statesman warns.

"Inflation affects the integrity of all our defenses, both moral and military, national and international," he added. "This continuing spiral doesn't necessarily mean trouble ahead if we don't put a stop to it. Somewhere along the line, the balloon always bursts."

The national situation as he sees it finds the country balancing precariously between employment and the maintenance of a high standard of living, and unemployment and inflation.

We must work out a program to curb inflation that will be fair to everyone, he said. No one will like it, but we must do it and soon.

## STATE DEPARTMENT:

### McCarthy Lied

The state department had waded into the McCarthy spy hunt of the department's personnel by issuing a white paper that hints that the senator deliberately lied.

Assistant Secretary Edward W. Barrett sent 500 newspaper editors an eight-page analysis of McCarthy's speech which charged the department was overrun by Communists.

Barrett's reply contained a point-by-point denial. While it did not assert it so many words that McCarthy was lying, the document repeatedly sought to show that he uttered "misstatements" and "inaccuracies."

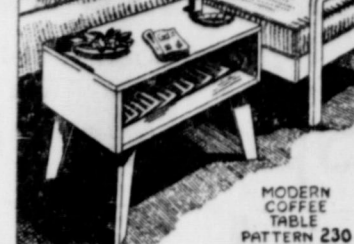
Meanwhile, the loyalty files, recently turned over to the senate foreign-relations subcommittee investigating communism in government posts, were being studied.

## THE READER'S COURTROOM

### Make Bridges Safe for Elephants

#### Elephant Through a Bridge, City Liable?

Every spring a traveling circus stopped in a certain small town to give its show. The day before the parade, the company would stage a parade—headed by a five-ton elephant. The parade route, which was approved by city officials, led over an old wooden bridge. One morning day, during the parade, everything went along fine until



the animals came to the bridge. The elephant took a few steps into the structure, when all of a sudden it cracked beneath its weight. The huge beast dropped through the bridge to a road below, and rolled over—dead. The owner of the circus later sued the town for the value of the elephant. The local officials insisted that anybody who crosses an elephant on a bridge does so at his own risk, but the court disagreed. Holding the town liable, the judge said that a public bridge should be kept safe for any proper and lawful use thereof.

A wealthy manufacturer gave his nephew a gift—a huge iron bell. The church officials began using the bell not only for services but also to toll the hours. From early morning to late at night, the chimes rolled out over the neighborhood. Some of the neighbors found this very annoying, and finally one home owner took the matter to court. He complained that the chimes woke his children, even shook his house! The court ordered its clamor stilled.

#### Are the Parents to Blame If a Child Runs into the Street?

A mother told her five-year-old son to play in his room until she finished cooking dinner. After a few minutes, the boy became bored. He slipped out of the house and ran into the street—right in front of a speeding car. The youngster was killed, and his parents later sued the driver for recklessness. The man tried to shift the blame onto the boy's mother, saying it was her own fault for letting the child run into the street. However, the court felt otherwise and held the motorist liable. The judge said that parents can't be expected to keep their children under lock and key—or watch them every single instant. His Honor commented: "Parents are not required to do the impossible!"

#### Should a Policeman Ride On Your Running Board To Guide You to the Hospital?

A woman stopped her sedan alongside a traffic officer and said: "I'm taking my aunt to the hospital. Could you tell me how to get there?" The policeman jumped onto the running board and cried: "Straight ahead!" After driving a



few blocks, the woman made a sharp stop at a corner and the policeman tumbled off—breaking his leg. Later he sued the woman for damages, but the court turned down his claim. The judge said that even a policeman shouldn't risk riding on the running board, when it would be just as easy for him to get inside!

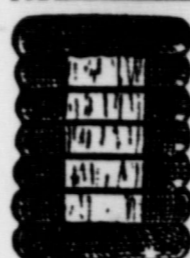
