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### Ordinance

REGULATING THE KEEPING OF DOGS IN THE CITY OF O'DONNELL: PROVIDING FOR THE VACCINATION OF DOGS PROVIDING FOR A DOG POUND: PROVIDING FOR THE REDEMPTION OF DOGS AND THE DISPOSAL THEREOF IF NOT REDEEMED: AND PROVIDING FOR THE VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE. BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF O'DONNELL, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. The City Clerk may employ a special office to be known and designated as the Dog Catcher, whose duty it shall be to carry out the terms and provisions of this Ordinance. The City Clerk shall be responsible to the City of O'Donnell for all moneys collected under this ordinance and shall make monthly reports in writing of all money collected under this ordinance to the Council and shall deposit with the city treasurer all money so collected at least once a month.

SECTION 2. All dogs within the City of O'Donnell, Texas, are hereby required to be vaccinated against rabies by some licensed veterinarian on or before June 1st, and each year thereafter and it is further provided herein that every Veterinarian who vaccinates any such dog, either male or female, within the City of O'Donnell, Texas, shall collect his fee for same from the owner of the dog and shall issue a certificate of vaccination to such owner, stating the name of the owner, a brief description of the dog, the date of vaccination and the fee collected by him for same.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of the Police or his authorized agent to capture and impound in a pen to be provided by the City for that purpose and called the "Dog Pound" and any dog, male or female, found running at large within the City of O'Donnell, Texas, without a tag as provided for under the terms of this ordinance and if such dog, male, or female, is not redeemed and reclaimed and taken from said pound within the time required under the provisions of this ordinance then the City Clerk shall advertise said dog for sale twenty four hours by posting one notice of said sale at the door of the City Hall, which notice shall give the time and place of sale and shall, if not redeemed, sell said dog, male or female at public auction and if no one shall bid upon the same, the amount of charges due on said dog, the said dog shall be bought by the city at once and killed by the police or his duly authorized agent.

SECTION 4. (a) The owner and keeper of any dog or dogs captured or impounded under the provisions of this ordinance shall be permitted and allowed at any time within forty-eight hours after such dog or dogs shall have been impounded, to redeem, reclaim and again receive possession of said dog or dogs, upon payment to the City Clerk, or his duly authorized agent, the sum of \$25 per day or fractional part thereof during which time said dog or dogs may have been impounded for every such dog so impounded which sum so paid to him shall by the police be paid over to the City Clerk for deposit with the Treasurer for the use and benefit of the City as well as all other money received by him under the terms of this ordinance.

(b) Should the owner or keeper of said dogs, male or female, fail to redeem the same as provided for in paragraph (a) of this section within the forty-eight hours then said dog or dogs shall be advertised and sold or killed in the manner provided for in this ordinance. It shall be the duty of the police and duly authorized Dog Catcher to see that the terms of this ordinance are strictly enforced, provided however, that the terms of this ordinance shall not be applicable to dogs following countrymen into the City.

SECTION 5. The policemen of this city shall have the right to shoot or kill any rabid dog or any dog in the streets which shall manifest a disposition to bite.

SECTION 6. That any person who shall willfully take from any dog a collar or tag shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00.

SECTION 7. Any person violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$100.00.

### Drylot Cows Doing Better

Spur—Cows living in the confinement of a productive long pasture are doing better than their cousins in the Rolling Plains Livestock Research Station here. Only 26 head of the original 36 head turned to pasture remain in the herd, says Station Superintendent Paul Marion, while 32 head of the original 36 put in drylot

are still productive. Part of the difference between the two groups may be a result of pure chance, according to the Texas A&M University researcher. Both herds are part of 80 Hereford heifers purchased from the Waggoner Ranch at Vernon, Texas. They went into the drylot versus-pasture experiment in May 1959. Since then, five of the pasture cows have died, three have been sold because of cancer eye and two were sold because they were barren, Marion said.

Only one of the drylot cows has died. Marion said three have been sold—one because of cancer eye, one with a hip injury and one which was barren. "Apparent things happen to pasture," Marion said. "For example, eye irritation is greater on pasture and this may have caused two cows to get cancer eye there while only one got it in the lot." The pioneering drylot-pasture comparison first started as a project to learn more about the nutritional requirement of beef cows, Marion said.

### Final Canadian Funds Approved

Congressman George Mahon announced today that the additional sum of \$3,500,000 is being made available for the continued construction of the Canadian River project for the current fiscal year. Congress had appropriated \$17,000,000 last year for the project and the additional funds have been made available as a result

of the completed speed of construction that has taken place. Mahon heads the House Appropriations Committee, said that the estimate now before the committee for continuation of the project at next year totals \$14,215,000. This will bring total appropriations for the project to about \$83,000,000 and will substantially complete it. Mahon said he anticipated no serious difficulty in securing approval of the funds requested. When the project was begun several years ago

it was anticipated that the total cost would be \$90,000,000. It is being built for the lesser figure. The project is scheduled to be substantially completed by June 1967. Limited range forced the scientist to put one of the herds in drylot and the comparison between the two management systems has gotten more attention than the findings on beef-cow nutrition, Marion said. Without considering longevity of production, the pasture cows have made a higher profit per head than the drylot cows, under the experimental conditions at Texas A&M station, Marion said. But he believes modifications in drylot system would make it highly competitive with traditional beef production systems.
