Malil Affected by New Ruling Effective April 7

Postmaster Hal Singleton invites the attention of the public February 28, 1925, amendi g the sections of the postal laws and regulations involved. He states that it is of the utmost import. ance that patrons of the service become thoroughly familiar with these changes in order that the proper amount of postage be affixed on mail. The outstanding features of the changes which are as follows:

The rates on all post cards will be 2 cents each, whether they bear written or printed matter. There will be no change in the rate of postage on Government postal cards nor on any other first class matter.

The rate for money orders are slightly increased. The rate on registered letters has not been determined but will be gozzawhere between 15 and 20 cents


