Change of Schedule in Santa Fe Train

Beginning last Monday the Santa Fe now reaches O'Donnell 55 minutes earlier than on the former schedule. This gives the post office plenty of time to put up the mail before the closing hour and allows the train crew time to reach Lamesa and smoke a few more cigarets before bedtime. This is fine. But the change sets us twenty-four hours and fifty-five minutes behind time on the mail we receive from the south and east. This is not so fine. If we expect an important letter today it will reach here tomorrow. Day-before-yesterday's predated papers will also reach us today, thus giving us ancient history instead of news.

Instead of the Santa Fe giving us at least the service it inaugurated fifteen years ago when the first train pulled down this branch, it sets us back a day. Instead of giving us a service commensurate with the great development that is taking place in this bit of prize territory, it is retrogressing. The thousands of people who have moved into this country are striving with might and main to further develop the country and throw still greater business to the Santa Fe. They are deserving of a better train and mail service.

Something can be done and must be done to bring about a change. This little article will not have any effect. It will take the concerted action of the entire population the line serves to get relief.

Let's get together and do something.

O'Donnell Has Had Phenomenal Growth in Past Eighteen Months

It is often remarked by the close observer that O'Donnell has not advanced as rapidly as the country surrounding the town; that the business enterprises were inadequate to supply the demand of the great number of people who have moved here during the past eighteen months. But this is rapidly being overcome and the business establishments are now in splendid shape to take care of the wants of the people in the adjacent trade territory. For the benefit of those who are not acquainted with the rapid growth of the town, we give a resume of the business and social directory: 14 dry goods stores, 12 grocery stores, 4 hardware stores, 2 drug stores, moving picture theater, 9 filling stations, wholesale oil and gasoline station, 4 garages, bank, 4 lumber yards, 3 blacksmith shops, tin shop, planing mill and sash and door factory, 2 feed and grain stores, mattress factory, shoe shop, 5 gins and another under construction, 2 bakeries, 2 variety stores, second la-

store, 3 meat markets, produce house, millinery store, steam laundry, top and curtain factory, newspaper, 3 hotels, 4 cafes, 5 hamburger stands, 2 tailor shops, 4 barber shops, telephone exchange, telegraph station, ice and cold storage warehouse, horse and mule sales yard, 4 real estate offices, 4 doctor of medicine, doctor of chiropractic, 2 dentists, lawyer, undertaker, 7 churches, a school with an enrollment of about 550, Masonic lodge, Eastern Star lodge and an Odd Fellows' lodge.

The exact population of O'Donnell is unknown, as the growth has been so rapid that it has been impossible to keep tab on the number of people who have made their homes here, but the population is somewhere between 2,000 and 2,500 souls—and more coming every day. The town is served by the Lamesa branch of the Santa Fe which gives one mixed passenger and freight train a day, with extra freights to take care of the business. Two automobile lines run from Slaton and Lubbock every few

hours, giving people connection with the outside world at their convenience. The town is served with electricity twenty-four hours a day from Lamesa and is the best lighted town on the southplains, having not only a white way through the business-district, but the lights extend over the residential section, and gives the town a civilized appearance when viewed from a distance.

O'Donnell is not booming, but steadily forging ahead, coming into its own that will put it on equality with the surrounding country. Perhaps, there are more buildings under construction today than at any time during the town's growth, showing the faith that the home folks have in the town's future.

Mail Affected by New Ruling Effective April 7

Postmaster Hal Singleton invites the attention of the public to the increased rates of postage and changes affecting post cards and mail of the third and fourth classes as provided by the act of February 28, 1925, amending the sections of the postal laws and regulations involved. He states that it is of the utmost importance that patrons of the service become thoroughly familiar with these changes in order that the proper amount of postage be affixed on mail. The outstanding features of the changes which become effective April 15, 1925, are as follows:

The rates on all post cards will be 2 cents each, whether they bear written or printed matter. There will be no change in the rate of postage on Government postal cards nor on any other first class matter.

The rate for money orders are slightly increased. The rate on registered letters has not been determined but will be somewhere between 15 and 20 cents.

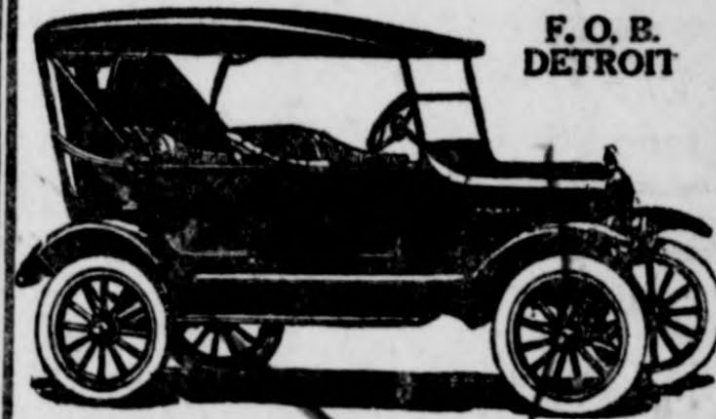
