#### Health Department **Cites Local Man**

Austin - An official State Health Department citation for work proficiency has been awarded to Tommy Modisette, assistant superintendent of the O'Donnell water supply system. The citation reflects the regard in which Modisette is held by state water of1 ficials.

Signed by the State Health Commissioner and authorities of the Texas Water and Sewage Works Association, the certificate of competency is awarded only to those utility plant operttors who have successfully demonstrated their skill and knowledge in modern principles of plant management.

To qualify for certification, a plant operator must have accumulated a prescribed amount of actual work experience. He must also have attended both regional and statewide short schools at which the techniques of water treatment and waste water disposal are taught, and must have passed an examination given by State Health Department sanitary engineers.

State law requires that at least one operator per shift be certified for competency by health department engineers. but many operators seek certification on their won time and at their own expense to increase their efficiency as key public servants to their community and state.

The engineers said the attainment is evidence of Modisette's efforts to better prepare himself for the duties of his profession.

CHRISTMAS is observed in Bethlehem on December 25 by the Roman Catholics and Protestants, on January 6, by the Greek Orthodox and affiliated churches, and on January 18 by the Armenians. •All Bethlehem, however, turns out on December 24 for the arrival of the Patriarch of Jerusalem— Cardinal of the Holy Land—who each year brings an ancient efflgy of the Infant Jesus to Bethlehem which he lays in the manger within the cave where Christ was born.




The early Christian church frowned on such pagan customs and tried to stamp them out. In due time, however, it was felt that some of the customs could be edapted to the new Christmas conception.



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
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
