Country Editor

In the lead editorial of Sunday's Lamesa Reporter, an interesting proposal was suggested. The idea of a dam in the "breaks" south-east of here some 14 miles in the Dean Ranch was proposed as being worthy of study.

There are some 6 or 7 major canyons feeding into a canyon known as Rock Canyon that would make an ideal location for a lake. The primary watershed is estimated at 80 to 100 sections, much of it in grass and the secondary watershed is thousands of square miles of North Borden, North Dawson and South Lynn Counties.

Few discard the long-discussed Canadian River project but in the event this project does not work out to the best interests of O'Donnell — it is worth considering for Lamesa, Tahoka and O'Donnell to band together and secure the needed engineering data on this local proposal.

In addition to water, a Dean Ranch dam would be ideal for a recreational and wild-life area. Whether there would be enough water to warrant a dam being built is, of course, strictly a problem for engineers, but it is an interesting proposal to keep in mind if the Canadian proposal does not "work out."

Road Bond Election Set For Sept. 24th

Money Needed To Buy Right-Of-Way

A road bond election has been called for September 24th for the sum of \$200,000.00 to finance the purchase of right of way within Lynn County for the proposed 4 lane divided super highway to be built out of the present U. S. Highway 87, Dawson Co. has nearly completed all of its purchase of right of way up to O'Donnell. The first leg of construction will be from here to Tahoka, as planned. The dreaded head-on accident known to the Plains will become impossible with a divided highway and is expected to save many lives.

It is possible that NOT all of this bond issue will be issued but if it is the bond issue can be retired in 15 years with an increase of only 20c per \$100 of county valuation.

The State will pay the cost of ALL construction and the later upkeep.

Who May Vote

Anyone who is otherwise qualified to vote and who has rendered taxable property in Lynn Co. for taxation may vote.

Where South End Votes

Voting will be at the O'Donnell School with S. M. Clayton, Jr. as Judge, Methodist Church at Dr. W. New Moore School Bldg., N. S. Parker, as Judge, as well as the other voting boxes in County.

In editorializing the Index believes that this bond issue will have the support of all of us in South Lynn County interested in the continued growth of our County.

This money can not be lawfully used to buy right of way within an incorporate town such as in O'Donnell or Tahoka.

As far as O'Donnell is concerned there is no desire for the extra heavy, thru traffic to pass thru our town, and if Tahoka desires the hazard of 4 lanes of traffic thru the main drag, the City of Tahoka will have to buy right of way thru its city limits which will run into many thousands of dollars.

Currently the State Highway Department has a plan for the super-road to run to the West of O'Donnell and to the East of Tahoka.

An official notice of the election will run next week.

S. S. For Farmers

The year 1955 brings social security to most farmers and ranchers in the country according to John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock, Texas, social security office.

Mr. Hutton explained that the 1954 social security amendments extend social security coverage to self-employed farm and ranch operators for the first time in 1955, and more hired farm and ranch workers will be covered under liberalized rules in the new law.

Self-employed farmers and ranchers whose net income from agricultural operations is at least \$400 in 1955 will be required to file a social security tax return in early in 1956 as a part of their Federal income tax return and pay the social security tax at the rate of 3 percent. Optional methods for reporting agricultural income are provided in the law. If the gross income for the year is \$1500 or less, the farmer may report his actual net income or 50 percent of his gross income. If the gross income exceeds \$1500, the farmer must report his actual net earnings unless the net is less than \$900 in which case he may instead report \$900.

Hired farm and ranch workers are covered by social security beginning in 1955 if they are paid at least \$100 in cash wages during the year by one employer. "The number of days worked will no longer be involved", Mr. Hutton said. "This does away with the somewhat complicated test in effect through the end of 1954 which covered only "regularly employed" farm hands. The tax rate on work-ers is 2 percent each from the employe and employer", he added.

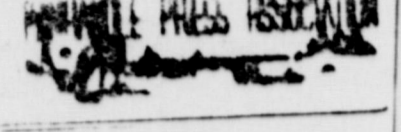

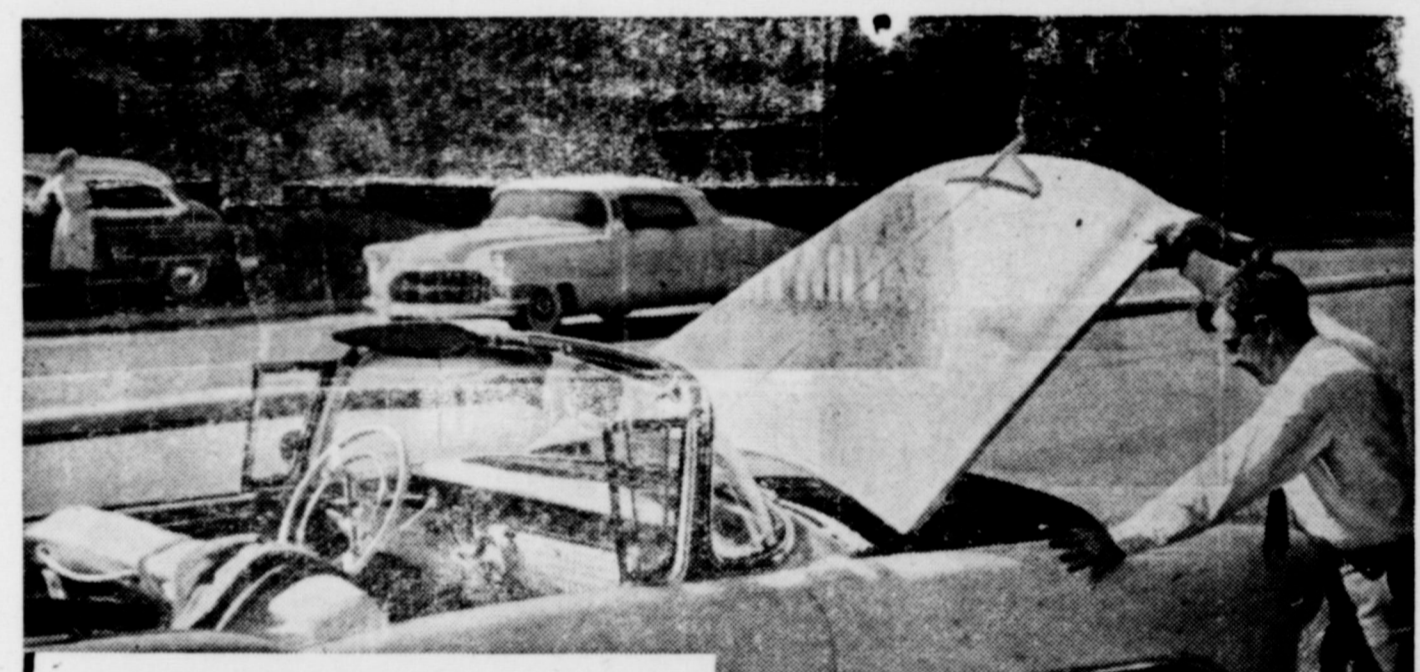



Spiderweb Business Proves Profitable In California Town

YUCAIPA, Calif.—Such pre-
cision devices as gunsights, astro-
nomical instruments and survey
instruments require crossed
hairs." Mrs. Nan Songer supplies
spider webs with which the "hairs"
are made.
Her business goes back to her
childhood when, because of her
frail health, her parents encour-
aged her to be out-of-doors as
much as possible. She became in-
terested in insect life—first moths
and butterflies, then crickets, and
finally spiders.
By 1939, when 37, she had been
experimenting with extracting the
silk web from spiders for sev-
eral years. The government was
inquiring whether the web would

tible to extreme temperatures. They
contracted and broke in the sub-
zero cold of the stratosphere—and
sagged in high temperatures. An
extremely fine, sturdy and elastic
strand was needed—and the spider
web was the answer.
Using fine needles, Mrs. Songer
draws the silk from one of the
spider's spinnerets and reels it on
a metal frame for shipment.

WORLD NEIGHBORHOOD

International Kids' Village Peace Inspired

TROGEN, Switzerland—In the
Swiss canton of Appenzel, over-
looking the Boden See (Lake of
Constance) and the German shore
across the lake, is a new kind of
village, an experiment in bettering
international relations through the
minds of children.

The International Pestalozzi Chil-
dren's Village, on the outskirts of
the modest village of Trogen, is
the temporary home of some 200 chil-
dren of varying European national-
ities. All of them were in need of
help when they arrived, and many
were war orphans.

The village is the outgrowth of
the idealism and compassion of
Walter Corti, an Italian-speaking
Swiss, who not only deplored the
ravages of war upon children in
belligerent nations, but who did
something about it.

Popular Subscription
Corti first suggested a children's
village in neutral Switzerland in
1944, while the war was still
raging. The suggestion was re-
ceived with enthusiasm by the
Swiss.

Thus French children live in
French homes, English children in
English, and so on. They live much
as they would in normal homes in
their own countries, speaking their
mother tongues and studying the
subjects they would in their native
schools, with teachers of their own
nationality.

Joint Activities

There is a difference, however.
In some classes the entire group
works together. Recreation and
community duties are internation-
al. Italian, Greek, German and
English children may be playing
soccer together while French chil-
dren teach Finns the French words
to a German tune.

Mutual suspicion and distrust
were problems when the school
first opened. In the immediate
postwar days Polish children re-
fused to play with Germans and
the Finns had a tendency to keep
to themselves.

Get Longer Life, Better Service From Your Appliances

IF you've been plagued with
many electrical repairs for ap-
pliances, resolve to take better
care of them in the future.

That dreadful buzzing sound
which your vacuum cleaner starts
making spells trouble usually, and
trouble which might have been
saved if you'd just picked up loose
hairpins, marbles, buttons or
string before starting to use it.

This and other simple measures
add longer life and better service
to appliances.

Protect Electric Cords

Do you have an electric cord
to disconnect? Don't pull it out of
the socket by gripping the cord.
Hold the plug and pull. Should
the plug stick, and they some-
times do, if the cord has been
plugged in for any length of time,
rock the plug gently from side
to side, pulling gently as you
do so.

Electric cords to your irons can
amount to a great deal of money
if you're careless about them. Not
only can you pull the cord loose
from the plug, but the cord frays
because of its use.

Remove the cord from the iron
by gripping the plug rather than
the socket, just as in the case of a
cord attached to a wall outlet.

A cup hook, a piece of cord
and a plumb weight can be at-
tached to the wall where you iron
to hold the ironing cord out of the
way while you iron. This will still
give free play when you need the
cord at different locations on the
ironing board.

Overloading Appliances

One of the major appliances to
be overloaded frequently is the
washing machine. Either weigh
the load or check in some recep-
tacle like a basket so that you can
avoid making the machine work
too hard. The manufacturer usual-
ly gives specifications as to the
weight the machines does effi-
ciently.

You can overload the refriger-
ator with ice if you don't defrost
regularly. This may, of course,
vary with the season. When the
frost becomes a quarter of an inch
thick, it's time to defrost!

Always wipe spilled foods or
grease from the gasket or rubber
seal around the door. Keep your
fingers off the rubber when you
open the door so it does not be-
come sticky.

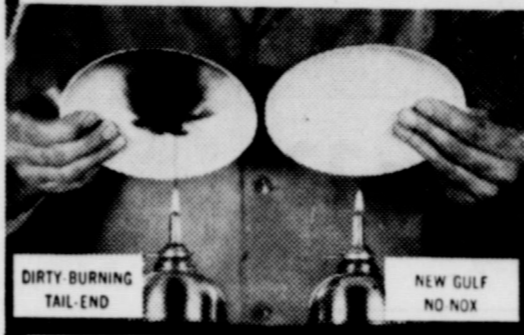
