## Mrs. Pat Gary Dies In Crash

Read Here Tuesday

Funeral services were read here Tuesday at 2 p. m. in the First Baptist Church for Mrs. Pat Gary, who died instantly in a grinding head-on car crash west of town at about 6 p. m. Sunday.

Her husband, Pat, 59, was driver of the 1957 Chevrolet sedan in the mishap 6 miles west of town in an empty grain truck driven by Jimmy Scholer, formerly of Mr. Gary was taken to Rumbold hospital here for first aid and then to Lubbock Methodist hospital. He had an injured hip, bruises of the face and other body bruises and Mrs. Scholer was treated at a hospital for cuts and bruises but was not seriously injured.

Mrs. Gary was apparently struck on the neck as most of the blood was on her side of the car. This was the 7th fatal car crash in O'Donnell area this year.

The mishap was on Farm to Mar. road 2053 at junction with road near Holcomb farm. The car was traveling toward here when the couple had visited in Seagraves when officers said Mr. Scholer's truck pulled onto the highway from a dirt road.

Beloved Resident Here

Services were conducted by the Rev. Bill Burton and assisted by Rev. Wayland Edwards of Lubbock and Rev. J. Clifford Harwood of Tahoka Interment followed in Tech Memorial Park in Lubbock.

Mrs. Gary was reared, educated and lived here most of her life. Mr. Gary is a farmer. She was born in Seagraves and was a member of the local Baptist Church before she converted to the Catholic faith at age 9. For several years she owned and operated Vern's Beauty Shop. She was a member of the 1946 Study Club.

Survivors in addition to her husband are her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Anderson, two sons, David and Joe Pat, a brother, Bart, two sisters, Mrs. Hollis Hunt of Seagraves, and Mrs. P. A. Wyatt of Tahoka.

Mrs. Gary was one of the finest and most respected ladies of the community. Her home town was in state of shock when news of the passing of this fine Christian and devoted fellow resident was known.

## County Valuations Record High

Lynn county has reached a new all time record in tax valuations as a result of oil development in the northeast section of the county, according to J. E. (Red) Brown, tax assessor and collector.

The current total valuation for tax purposes for 1957 is \$10,055,000.00. Brown states, an increase of more than \$300,000.00 over last year's total of \$9,750,000.

Practically all of the increase is a result of continued development of two small oil fields in the Gordos community and to the south west of Southland.

All state and county taxes become due and payable on October 1, and final date for payment without penalty is Jan. 31st. The taxpayer who pays up in October will receive a three percent discount and those paying in November two percent and those in December, one percent. Red also reminds taxpayers to pay their poll taxes. Next year is election year, and those failing to pay their poll taxes will not have a vote in the important elections.

LITTLE FLU HERE TO DATE

Austin — Earlier predictions of a wide spread Asian flu epidemic this fall and winter appear to be materializing. Reports of cases coming in from all quarters indicate that Texas has been well seeded with the virus. Only five brief months have passed since late April when the disease was first recognized in Hong Kong. This speed of spread is typical of the illness.

So far, Asian flu, which is really a new strain of virus type well known to lab technicians, has been comparatively mild. This very fact has caused many people to ask why so much noise is being made about it. There are several good answers.

First, even mild flu can be disabling for four or five days followed by a period of lassitude and weakness.

Second, flu is always unpredictable. Cases are frequently complicated by bacterial infections. And, even when uncomplicated, the illness has a particularly dangerous impact on persons suffering from heart ailments or chronic diseases.

(Ed. note — to date O'Donnell has not had an unusually high number of flu cases. The most common ailment seems to be head colds with a deep cough as the result. However, the school band did not play at Post game due to colds or flu. Absences at school Monday were only normal.

**Time To Retire ?**
