**Trustees Call Vote For Integration Decision**

The Trustees of the O'Donnell School called for an election concerning the integration of our public schools, Supt. John Criner said Monday.

The problems facing the school which prompted this action are the same that all schools throout the state and nation have been facing.

First the Federal law has called for integration of the public schools based on the Supreme Court's decision. This has eliminated any legal basis for maintaining segregation.

Second, we are faced with accreditation standards of the Texas Education Agency, which say that a school is rated by its weakest unit and that one unit not meeting the standards will cause the total school system to lose its accreditation. In order to meet these standards the school district would have to build a new school system equal to our present system. The cost of this would be considerable plus the fact that this would not insure continued segregation.

Your Board of Trustees has called for this vote for it is a problem which concerns the public and in which YOU must react.

However the fine victory was not without its disappointments. In the mile relays prelims Friday the Eagles set a record time of 3:28 only to finish third in the same event Saturday. Jerry Utecht, a star track man, tied the high jump record of 6-2 to finish first. The classy Eagle sprint relay team tied its own record of 53.9 to take first.

Wendell White took 6th in high jump, and 5th in discus and Bill Amaro took 3rd in 100 yd. dash and 4th in 220 yd. dash. The winning sprint team is composed of Dennis Jordan, Charles Burleson, Fernando Lopez and Amaro. Utecht almost had the high hurdles victory when he fell.

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**TOOTH DECAY VIRTUALLY INCURABLE CHRONIC DISEASE**

The teeth of Americans contain at least one billion cavities, each a potential source of toothache, dental authorities now estimate. They say tooth decay is so widespread that it inolves 95 of every 100 persons and is still increasing. A virtually incurable chronic disease which must be prevented if it is to be conquered at all, tooth decay is a particular nemesis of elementary school-age youngsters although all ages are vulnerable to its ravaging pain. Children are said to develop cav-

ities at about the same ratio as do adults—approximately one per child per year. But scholarly survey shows that whereas one-third of the adult need for fillings is being met, only one-fifth of the cavities in children's teeth are being repaired.

The reason, Texas Health Department dental officials speculate, is that so many parents still cling to the totally false notion that so-called "baby teeth" are unimportant because they are temporary. The frequent result is that good dental health for children is still a relatively scarce commodity.

In an attempt to reverse the trend toward almost universally poor dental health among youngsters—particularly in underprivileged homes—the dental division of the Texas State Department of Health gives financial and educational support to dental clinics in selected local health departments the State.

The addition of fluoride in carefully controlled amounts of public water supplies is known by dental researchers to be an efficient deterrent to dental decay. The State Board of Health at a recent meeting reaffirmed its belief that fluoridation is safe and effective, and recommended that local communities consider the practice wherever applicable and practicable.

There is one positive step all parents can take to avoid the fate of toothlessness among their children, dental scientists agree. It's a simple step, requiring only that youngsters be taken to a dentist for tooth and gum inspection before being enrolled in school each fall.

Before the visit is over, the dentist will have tutored the youngster in good dental hygiene at home, hoping the habits will take hold and last into adulthood.

When enough children have received such instructions, and made a part of their daily lives, the blight of tooth decay may slowly fade from the American scene.

**MEDICAL DEDUCTIONS FOR THOSE 65 OR OVER**

Printed for the first time last year—there's a new federal tax schedule to aid taxpayers in computing the more liberal medical expense deductions they are entitled to if they, their wives, or their dependent parents are 65 or over. It's form 2498, available at Internal Revenue Service, postoffices and many banks.

According to John J. Sloan, Administrative Officer, IRS, Lubbock, Texas, the law upon which the year old form is based, provides that the deduction for medical expenses incurred for a dependent parent 65 or over will not be reduced by 3 per cent of adjusted income. However, if either the taxpayer or his wife has reached 65 before the close of the tax year, the medical expenses of both can be deducted without being subject to reduction by 3 per cent of adjusted income.

The IRS representative added: "Most taxpayers are not affected by these special provisions and may continue to figure their medical expenses deduction on the regular Form 1040 as they've always done."

Many taxpayer questions are being answered by telephoning the Internal Revenue Service office or by calling in person.

**RABBIT FEVER INCREASING**

Tularemia, alias "rabbit fever" increased in Texas last year compared to 1960. The actual number of cases, 13 during 1961 as against 9 for 1960, is not startling, but is of concern to victims and to people engaged in communicable disease control.

The figures are tallied each week by the Texas State Department of Health from reports throughout the State. In all probability there were actually more cases than were reported.

Tularemia is caused by an oval-shaped organism called Pasteurella tularensis in dubious honor of Tulare County, California, where it was first discovered as an infection of wild rabbits and squirrels.

The disease is transmitted to humans by the bite of an infected fly or tick, or when the germ is accidentally introduced into the body during the process of dressing wild game. It can also be acquired by eating insufficiently cooked meat from an infected game bird or animal. The death rate of untreated cases is usually about five percent.

The infection has been and is still known all over Texas, but it is reported most often from the eastern section of the State. Outdoorsmen are more susceptible than the general population because of a greater chance for exposure.

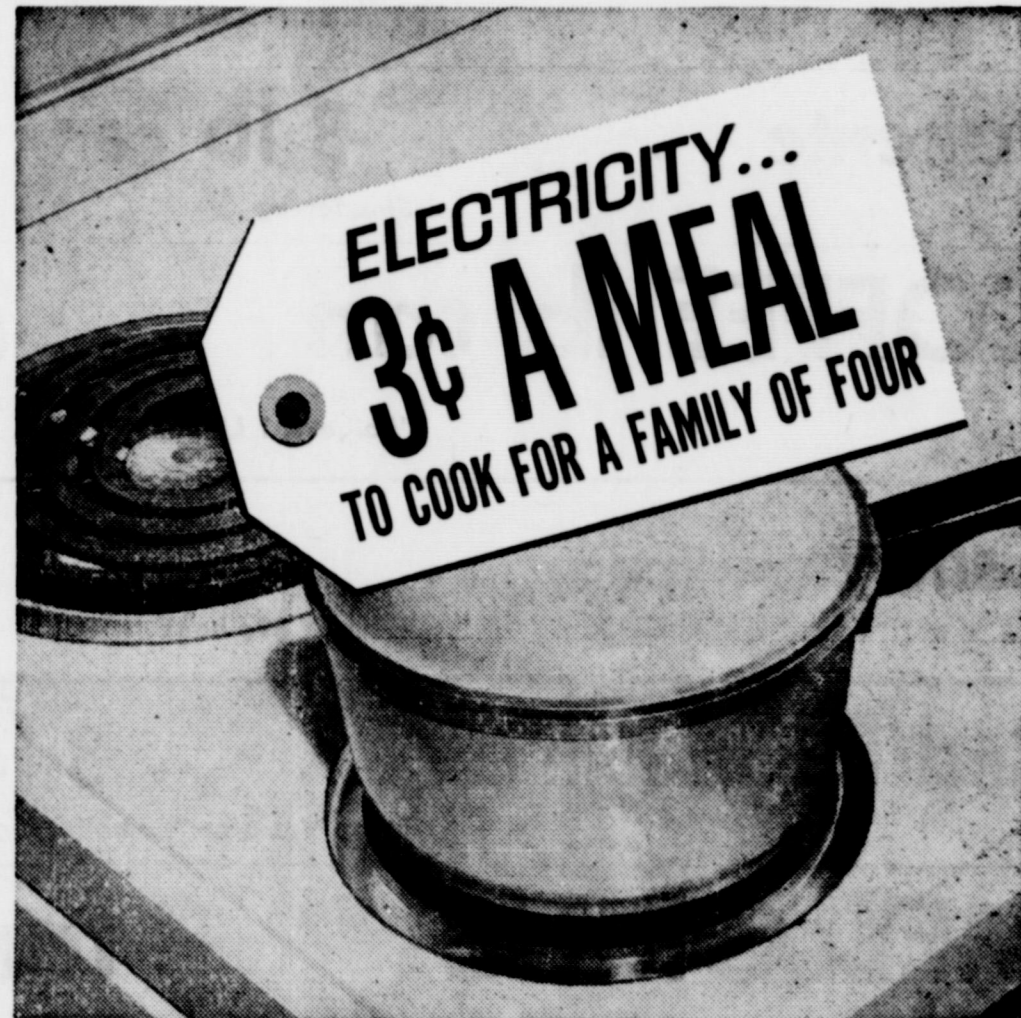

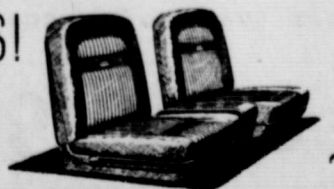
