## DUCT 1 ACRE OUT IN COTTON QUARTER SECTION

Lynn county's cotton allotment for 1958 is 153,444 acres. Deane J. Brown, manager of the Tahoka ASC said. This is a reduction of 1,000 acres from the 1957 allotment of 154,444 acres. Notices of allotment for individual farms were mailed last week. The reduction is about one acre for each quarter section.

Lynn county's cotton crop allotment is figured on a percentage basis of the total crop land where some counties are figured on a acreage basis. Wheat acreage allotments are deducted from the total crop land when figuring the cotton allotment. Tuesday in the marketing quota referendum, farmers asked the new allotment.

## Teach Fire Prevention

Junior Fire Marshals in the elementary schools of O'Donnell are teaching a fire safety campaign this month to prevent Christmas fires during the holiday season. The local effort, part of a coast-to-coast program in which nearly 4 million youngsters will take part, is a second phase of the year round Junior Fire Marshal program sponsored here by Elvin Moore of the Home Insurance Agency in cooperation with Supt. of Schools Weldon Skinner and Fire Chief F. M. Jones. The theme of the campaign, "A hidden rule for a happy yule," is symbolized by a fire prevention key tag. Designed as a ten inch wide and red card board ruler, the tag lists seven ways to protect the Christmas trees against fire. Tags will be tied to Christmas trees all over the community by boys and girls who qualify as Junior Fire Marshals.

## S. S. News Given

"Our latest local figures show that the great majority of fulltime workers retire because they are in ill health or because they have lost their jobs. Few people in the South Plains area are retiring from full-time work just to collect social security payments," John G. Hutton, manager of the Lubbock social security district office said today.

Under the Social Security Act, persons who continue working and earning over \$1200 per year are not eligible to receive their full social security benefits. Since in almost every case a person's income is sharply reduced when he retires, social security benefits were designed to partially replace this lost income. When the law was passed it was thought better to pay more adequate benefits to those whose working days were over than to spread the money thinner by also paying benefits to men over 65 or to women over 62, who were still working and who had suffered no substantial loss of income.

Mr. Hutton reminded those who intend to work part time after applying for old-age insurance benefits to get full information at their nearest social security office as to how their earnings might affect their benefits. Substantial earnings could mean the loss of some if not all their benefits. However, after one reaches age 72 there is no longer any restriction upon his earnings. This is particularly important to the self-employed, many of whom never retire and who otherwise might never receive any return on their contributions.

"The retirement test is part of the basic philosophy of social insurance," Mr. Hutton concluded. "as it not only prevents excessive drains on the old-age and survivors insurance trust fund but also serves to guarantee that those most likely to need some replacement of lost income receive it."

## Home Fires May Be Prevented

The curtains looked dingy, so she decided to clean them in a pan of gasoline in the bathtub. She forgot about the pilot light on the floor furnace just outside the bathroom door.

She was buried just a couple of weeks ago, this usually alert woman who was "accustomed" to doing her own dry cleaning. It happens to someone somewhere practically every day.

Many victims of home dry cleaning accidents, like the woman above, routinely used flammable liquids to clean curtains or clothes. Others were beginners, motivated by economy or convenience.

Most of them were ordinarily sensible, with full awareness of the peril of gasoline or naphtha or other dry cleaning preparations. One moment of carelessness to which we are all prone turning them from happy homemakers into sad statistics.

Explosions are only one of several risks run by the thoughtless do-it-yourself operators. Some cleaning agents are flammable; other give off injurious vapors; still others are harmful to human skin. All could be lethal if taken internally.

So inflammable is gasoline that to keep it stored at home is to open a court disaster. Gasoline emits vapors to form explosive mixtures in the air. A transient spark from a light switch or cigarette and the mixture may be ignited. Vapors may flow in an invisible stream for 200 feet from the point of use, flashing back and exploding the main container when touched off by flame or spark. Static electricity generated by synthetic or silk fabric being cleaned is fully capable of igniting the fumes of gasoline or naphtha.

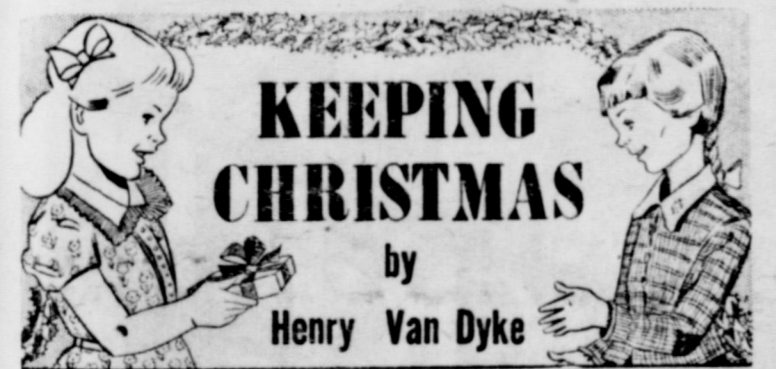

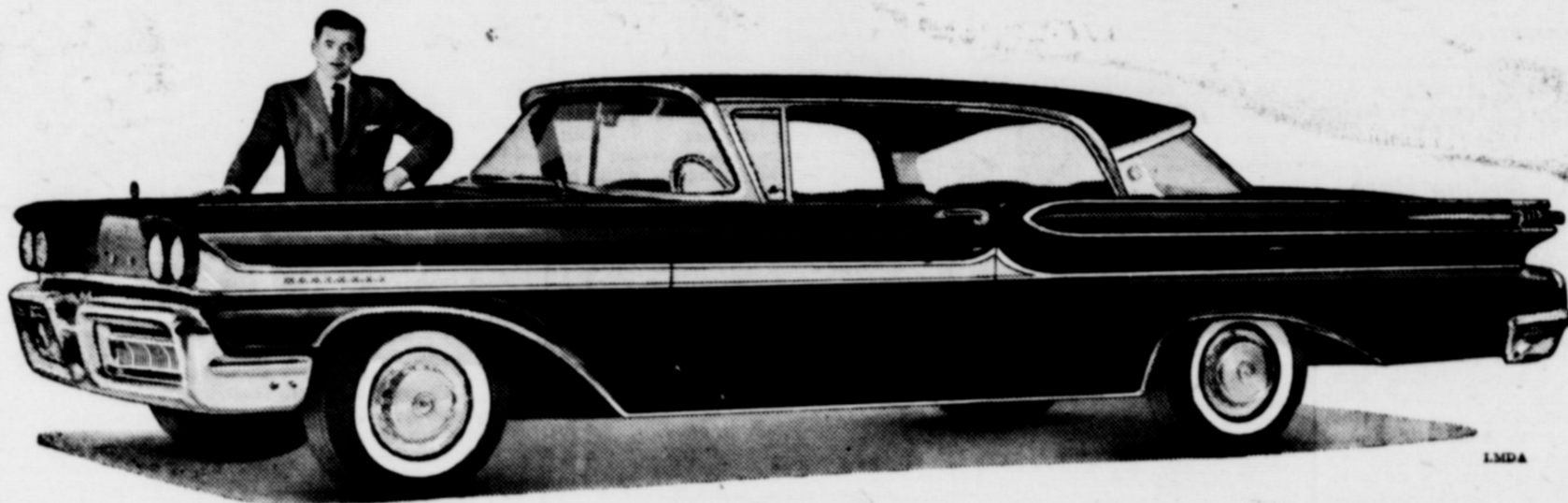

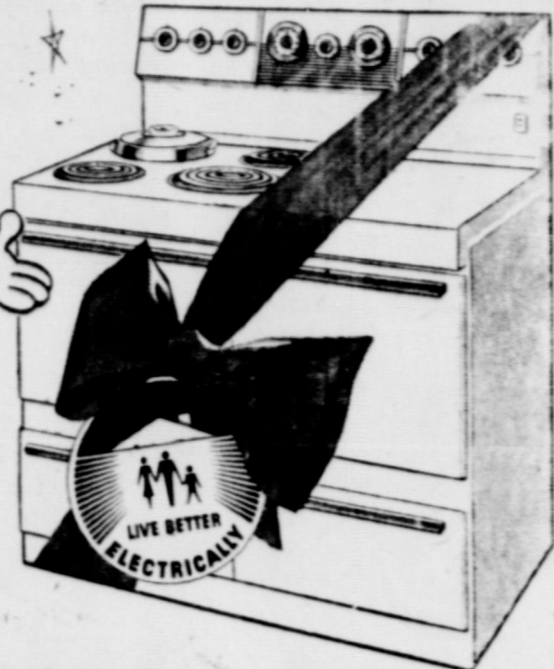

**To Prevent Trouble...**

A wise man once said, "Who would not give a trifle to prevent what he would give a thousand worlds to cure."

These words take on a great deal of meaning when viewed in the light of the many advances in medicine and public health made in the last 50 years in the United States and throughout the world.

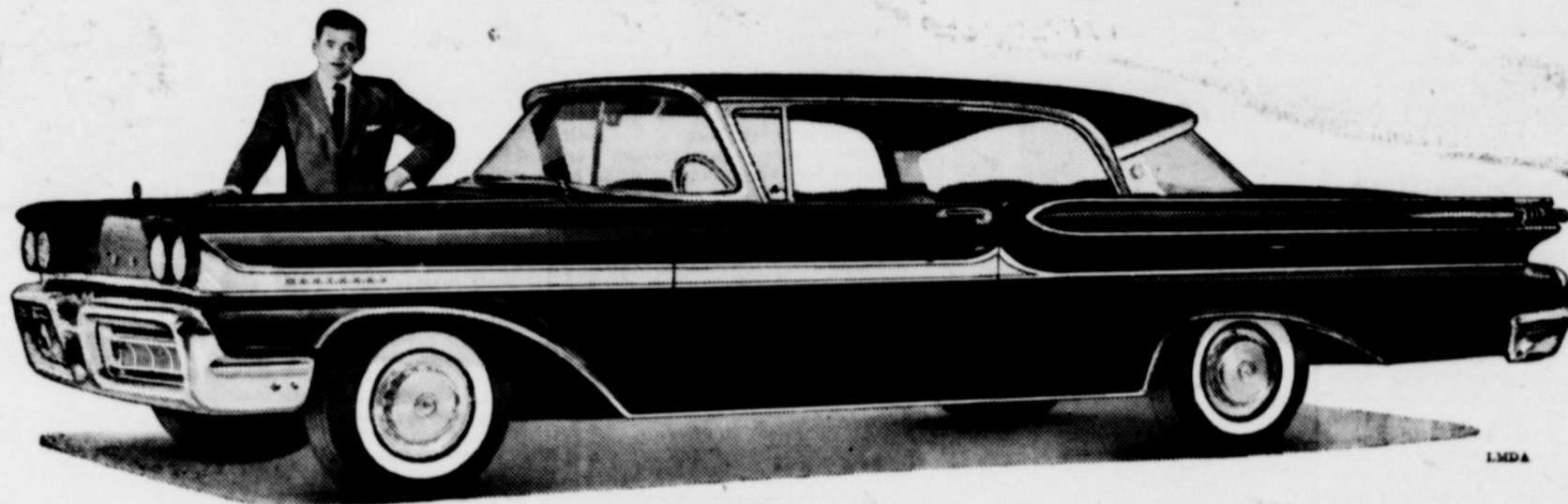

**To Prevent Trouble...**

A wise man once said, "Who would not give a trifle to prevent what he would give a thousand worlds to cure."

These words take on a great deal of meaning when viewed in the light of the many advances in medicine and public health made in the last 50 years in the United States and throughout the world.

Medical research has brought about many outstanding drugs and spectacular operations which save individual lives and relieve suffering, but more outstanding and spectacular are the advances in preventive medicine that have been made which stop suffering before it starts—the proverbial "stitch in time."

One example is retrolental fibroplasia, an eye condition marked by the formation of fibrous tissue behind the crystalline lens. It is seen in many prematurely born babies and causes partial or total blindness.

For years the disease was thought to be a result of premature births. However, a study supported by both federal and private financing, establishing the cause of the trouble as due to the faulty administration of oxygen, (used extensively in incubators for premature infants.)

This study cost approximately \$50,000. Today there are about 5,000 blind children in the U. S. who are victims of retrolental fibroplasia. Each child will cost an estimated \$100,000 each for education, training and support from birth to death—or a grand total of \$500 million.

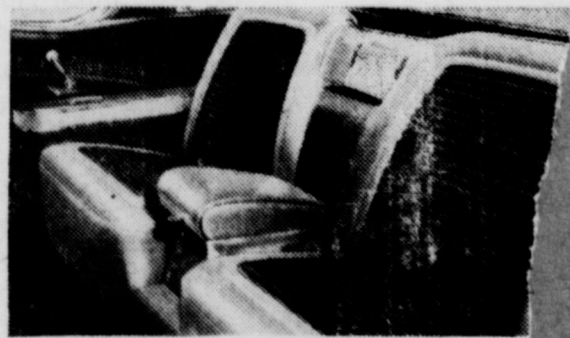

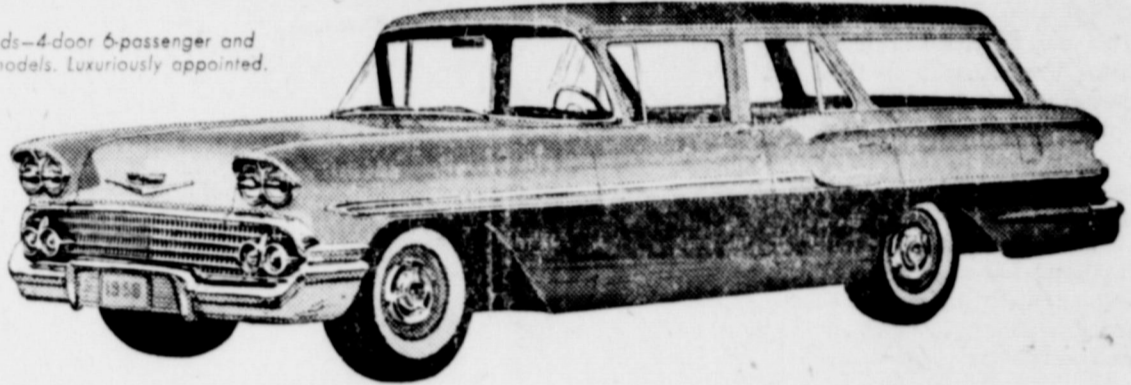

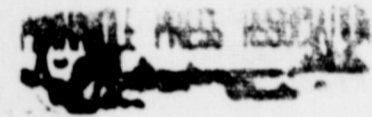

**S S News Given**

John G. Hutton, District manager of the Social Security Office declared today that if a long-disabled worker is now over age 50, it is important that he file his application for disability payments as soon as possible, and before January 1, 1958, so that he will not lose any monthly benefit payments. When an application is filed before January 1, 1958, payments can begin with the month of July, 1957. Disabled workers who apply in January, 1958, or later, will not be paid benefits for months before the date of their applications. In no case is the worker entitled to disability payments until he has been disabled for at least 6 months, and in all cases he must fulfill the work requirement of 5 years out of the immediate 10 years before he became disabled and a year and half out of the last three years before he became disabled.

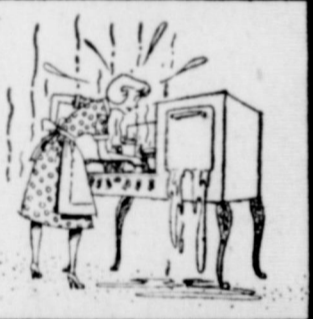
By recent Congressional action, the long-disabled worker now has another 6 months until June 30, 1958, to file an application and still have his social security earnings record protected by freeze as of the date he actually became disabled.

This "freeze" protects a worker's social security earnings record, when he is unable to work because of a severe and long-lasting disability but does not pay benefits until age 50.

Hutton pointed out that the law now permits a veteran to receive compensation from the Veterans Administration for service connected disability without any reduction in the amount of his dis-
