PTA Meet \$75,000 City Bond Election Set For Saturday

Advantages Are Cited

Qualified voters of the City of O'Donnell with their names on the city's tax roll are eligible to vote Saturday at the City's tax office on the \$75,000 revenue bond issue. The ballot will have two options. One option calls for \$30,000 in City Water and the other calls for \$45,009 in Sewer Revenue bonds.

For the last two weeks an off icial notice has been carried bu for fear some do not understand the legal termology, the Index will comment briefly.

Either one of the options may be defeated without affecting the other option if it carries. Neither bond issue is a levy against the taxable city property. The bonds are simply a levy against the Water System and the Sewer Sys

tem (if purchased)
The \$30,000 water bond issue will be used to pay for several car loads of water pipe purchased in the past and now covered by a warrant. It will also be used to extend water mains to the Gates cottages and Clawson and Hol comb gin west of town as well as to the Farmers Co op: many new fire plugs, to extend water to the eastern and northern limits city expansion anh to buy chlorine machine for the water storage system. Only that part of the bond issue which is

needed will-be sold. The next is the \$45,000 Sewer bond issue. This will be used about \$30,000 - to buy the privately owned sewer system and the remainder will be used in the extension of present mains. If the City does not trade for the sewer system the bonds

will not be used. The above are the facts gained from talking with several of the City dads. YOU voted for these men and this bond issue is their advice. The Index urges the care ful consideration of the voters. We will as an individual favorable to the twin issues: We feel that the continued expansion of the town warrants the issue.

United States' Oldest Executive Department Began Duties 1789

By WALTER A. SHEAD

This is the first of a series of six articles on the department of state of the United States and its personnel as written by Walter A. Shead, Western Newspaper Union's Washington correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C .- The department of state of the United States of America is the official channel through which the American people conduct their relations with the other peoples and governments of the world. It is the oldest of the executive departments of government and went into action in 1789 with Thomas Jefferson as the first secretary of state.

Because of the fact that this na tion was traditionally self-sufficient and isolated and aloof from the rest of the world until the advances of technology conquered time and distance, the people of this nation probably know less about the state department than any other branch of government.

However, since World War I the state department has been growing, not only in its dealings with the rest of the world, but in the impact of its actions and its policy upon the everyday life of every individual American citizen.

What the American people are concerned with now is just this: What about the department of state today? Who are the men and women who comprise its personnel roster of some 22,000 employees? Where do they come from? How are they chosen for the tasks assigned them?

And above all, what is the foreign policy of this nation and how is this policy formed? This series of articles, of which this is the first, will attempt to deal objectively with this subject and answer some of these questions.

THERE ARE TWO main premises upon which to spotlight the state department. First, the department proper has about 8,000 employees, most of whom are stationed in Washington. These comprise the general management and functional and operational segments of the department. Then second, there are about 14,000 persons in the foreign service who staff the more than 280 embassies, legations,

offices maintained by the United States in some 75 countries.

The next main subject to remem ber is that the conduct of the foreign affairs of a world power like the United States with a population of more than 150 million people requires a highly specialized organization, specially trained about political, social, cultural and economic aspects of the world

These are further broken down into specialized subjects such as finance, aviation, human rights. labor, agriculture, commerce, tariffs, reconstruction, standards of living and other technical fields so that the department not only represents the people of this nation in other countries, but it acts as foreign representative of all other departments of government.

And since World War II and the organization of the United Nations, duties of the department have tripled. For instance, during 1949 representatives of our state department took part in 6.000 international meetings and received 340,000 reports from its representatives from throughout the world, all of which had to be analyzed and evaluated as a basis for policy decisions and correlated in each case with those of other interested government

Today, headed by Dean Acheson, the department of state occupies more than 20 separate buildings in Washington scattered about the city, with the beautiful new building at 320 21st Street N. W. as the hub of its activities. The old state building at 17th street and Pennsylvania avenue, adjacent to the White House, now houses only the library, and the rest of the building has been taken over by executive offices of the presidential staff and some

other agencies. As he does every department of in the executive branch, the President heads up the state department and is responsible for the foreign policy adopted. The secretary of state is a member of his cabinet and is the chief execu-

tive officer of the department. Immediately under him is the Under-Secretary of State James E. Webb of North Carolina; Ambassador-at-Large Philip C. Jessup of New York; Deputy Under Secretary of State for Administration John E. Peurifoy of South Carolina; and Deputy Under-Secretary Elbert G.



Brother to Jesus

Lesson for September 17, 1950

THEY WENT fishing together, no doubt; very likely they worked together in the shop; perhaps little James was the nuisance that small brothers sometimes are, but like all small brothers he would tag along when Jesus went walking

over the Nazareth hills. As a man in later years he became influential and famous; indeed it was he who probably wrote the book in our New Testament called "James." But as a

boy, his neighbors Dr. Foreman saw nothing remarkable in him. So completely commonplace was he, that as Mark 6 shows us, the natives of Nazareth couldn't believe that one of James' brothers could amount to anything.

Unbeliever

FOR years and years James grew up with Jesus, boy with boy. They lived under the same roof, ate from the same dish. James may even have worn his big brother's outgrown tunics. All his childhood days he knew the care and love of the same mother Mary that Jesus had. Through all those "silent" years when Jesus lived and worked in Nazareth, James lived and worked beside him.

And yet, the strange thing is that when Jesus left the carpenter shop and went about "doing good" as Peter said, James did not believe in him. It seems clear from the story in Mark 3 that both Mary and the brothers (not James only) had the idea that Jesus was out of his mind. They came to get him and would have stopped his ministry at that point, if they could. John also mentions the fact that Jesus' own brothers did not believe in him.

It seems strange, yet the reason may not be hard to find. Perhaps was a case of the old proverb, 'Familiarity breeds contempt. Perhaps James had a sort of inferiority complex about himself, maybe he agreed with the villagers' low opinion about him, so that he could not believe that his brother could be the Christ. In any case it is plain that if miracles could ever have compelled belief, Jesus' mirwould have convinced James , but he was an unbeliever right through the day of Calvary.

Believer

PRECISELY what changed him was never known. Some anonymous writer in early times wrote a 'Gospel of James' -- a piece of fiction never accepted by the church as genuine. What we do know is what Paul tells us; that after his resurrection, Jesus "appeared to James." It may well be that James was convinced by the risen Christ as he had never been by the Carpenter of Nazareth.

Be that as it may, as time went on and Christians began to multiply in Jerusalem. James appeared as the leader of the Christians' Home Church. At the important conference held in Jerusalem to decide the church's first great controversy. it was James whose speech was the "last word" before the decisive vote.

Quality of Leadership

TAMES was not an accepted leader merely because he was a brother of Jesus. There were other brothers who remained quite obscure. James was a recognized leader because of his personal qualities. The reader is invited to study these out for himself. But there is one interesting and unusual combination of qualities in this man, strictness with himself, together with flexible generosity in dealing with others. In Acts 21:17-26 it is clear

that James kept all the laws of Moses himself and expected other Jews to do the same. To the end of his life he was personally a rigid conservative. But when it came to other people, he was far more tolerant.

When the question arose, How much of Jewish law shall we expect Gentile Christians to observe? James agreed to the startlingly nucleus of laws that the Jerusalem conference set forth as the absolute minimum for all. James did not wish his own conscience to bind every one else. He did not expect every one to be bound by his own pattern. He had high standards and he lived by them. But he did not use his own standards as a club with which to beat others over the head.

PEACE: There Is Still Hope

The belief that there is still hope for peace, perhaps for only a short time, but still respite from worl iwide war, is growing in many quarters. The hope is not one for permanent peace, but one of time, based on the belief in high diplomatic circles that the Russians are not ready for all-out war at the moment.

Diplomatic circles call it the "calculated risk" of war or peace. It is based on three major assumptions:

(1) Russia fears the effects of American atom bomb attacks.

(2) Russia does not possess an adequate stock pile of atomic bombs. (3) Russia's industrial potential

is still too weak in comparison with that of the western allies to risk a major conflict. The first two of the assumptions are, of course, mere guess work But there are statistics to back up

the third. For instance, America's steel production for 1950 is expected to exceed 71 million tons. Great Britain will produce around 16 million tons and the rest of western Europe approximately 24 million tons. Thus, the allies will produce a total of 111 million tons, compared with

Russia's 22 million. Russia also lags in the production or oil, another of the top essentials

for war. On these assumptions western Europe is planning a three-year rearming program. If the program is successful peace may be prolonged, but the world will be divided into two great armed camps.

RAILROADS: Strikes Close Steel

The brotherhood of railroad trainmen and order of railway conductors went on strike against three terminal railroads, disrupting several of the country's steel arteries

in the midst of the Korean war. However, with the steel industry pressed to capacity to meet the needs of the stepped-up munitions program and the booming civilian economy, many sources predicted that President Truman would seize

the lines. The unions singled out key terminals in Louisville, St. Paul and Chi-cago and Republic Steel's switching terminal at Cleveland for the first display of pressure. About 1,000 men walked out for five days. Approximately 30,000 workers, including steelworkers, were made idle.

Negotiations between management and union representatives, with presidential assistant John R. Steelman taking part, produced no progress in the first 24 hours.

Observers believed the government would take drastic action be fore the situation deteriorated and crippled the nation's vital steel pro-

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

Great Britain will produce around 16 million tons and the rest of western Europe approximately 24 million tons. Thus, the allies will produce a total of 111 million tons, compared with Russia's 22 million.

Russia also lags in the production or oil, another of the top essentials for war.

On these assumptions western Europe is planning a three-year rearming program. If the program is successful peace may be prolonged, but the world will be divided into two great armed camps.

RAILROADS:

Strikes Close Steel

The brotherhood of railroad trainmen and order of railway conductors went on strike against three terminal railroads, disrupting several of the country's steel arteries in the midst of the Korean war.

However, with the steel industry pressed to capacity to meet the needs of the stepped-up munitions program and the booming civilian economy, many sources predicted that President Truman would seize the lines.

The unions singled out key terminals in Louisville, St. Paul and Chicago and Republic Steel's switching terminal at Cleveland for the first display of pressure. About 1,000 men walked out for five days. Approximately 30,000 workers, including steelworkers, were made idle.

Negotiations between management and union representatives, with presidential assistant John R. Steelman taking part, produced no progress in the first 24 hours.

Observers believed the government would take drastic action before the situation deteriorated and crippled the nation's vital steel pro-

INTELLIGENCE: Headed by Smith

Lt. Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, former ambassador to Moscow, was named by President Truman as director of central intelligence. He will succeed Rear Adm. Roscoe H. Hillenkoetter around the end of September.

The agency's job is to gather and analyze reports from diplomatic, military and all other sources. Some members of congress were not surprised by Smith's appoint-

There had been demands in congress for a shake-up of the agency since the Korean war. Some legislators contended the United States was caught flat-footed by the invasion of South Korea by Communist troops.

General Smith, now 54, has had a long military carer, which includes service as chief of staff to Gen. Dwight Eisenhower in World War II. Later he became ambas-sador at Moscow.

Election Crossfire

The American political picture cleared somewhat with one definite trend in the spotlight: the voter faces a furious election year partisan crossfire. The issue will be U.S. foreign policy.

The bipartisanship in foreign poli-cy as existed before the Korean war is a thing of the past. From now on voters will hear charges and counter-charges on U. S. foregin policy by congressional candidates.

This solution should be applied around the tops of the stockings, or in a band around the ankles. They caution against indiscriminate use because the chemical stains come fabrics.

Once the chigger's got you, treeting the affected portions of the skin with 5 to 10 percent solution of beazocaine in alcohol is recommended by T. H. Parks of Ohlo: State University

There is no positive method yet devised for treating yards and lawns to eliminate chiggers, but many people have found dusting the lawn with powdered sulphur helps.

Parks suggests using the chest at grade of sulphur available, and applying it generously to the lawn with





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Grasshopper Control Methods Discussed Poisoned Bait Erratic, **New Experiments Reveal**

Poisoned bait, used for many years, has often given erratic con-trol of grasshoppers, the Oklahoma agricultural experiment station reports in a recent bulletin.

During the past few years, many new chemicals have been developed some of which are very poisonous to grasshoppers. Of these, benzene



Adult grasshoppers complicate control since many acres may become infested and adults are not so easily killed as

hexachloride is especially useful when temperatures are high and most grasshoppers have reached the adult age.

Insecticides which give most effective control as sprays are chlordane, 1.0 to 1.5 pounds per acre; toxaphene, 1.5 to 2.0 pounds per acre; and parathion, 0.2 to 0.3 pound per acre of the actual insecticidal material. Most effect is obtained by spraying these on succulent plants when the nymphs have nearly all hatched and are feeding. As the season progresses, costs increase and control decreases.

The bulletin warned care should be taken to prevent livestock from feeding on plants that have been tested with any of these chemicals. The operator applying them should avoid contact with them to as great an extent as possible. The use of masks and gloves is cheap insur-

Buying Feeder Pigs May Prove More Profitable

Hog raisers in the future may find it easier and more profitable to sell their sows and buy feeder pigs al-ready weaned, wormed, castrated, deloused, vaccinated, and started

This is the long-range program of a Wisconsin farmer whose "pig hatchery" output cannot meet the demand of a long list of customers.

The Weix farm in Dane County, Wisconsin, produces a special kind of healthy, well-started weaning pig. According to hog farmers and livestock authorities at the Chicago market, this system has many advantages-among them saving of time in search of good boars and sows and their year-around maintenance. This eliminates time, work and risk in raising pigs from farrowing to weaning. It means cutting down on expensive housing and the elimination of guesswork about the kind of pigs that will result in the use of each new boar.

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





Hearty Soups Make Good Companions For Lunch, Supper

WITH THE FIRST crispness of autumn, hot and hearty soups establish themselves solidly into our menus. They're a good begin-ning for dinner and they're substantial enough dish for a hearty luncheon or supper. When soups are the mainstay of

the meal, you need little else because they're full of much nourishment. A sandwich

or crisp vegetable salad, a fruit cob-bler or pudding served along with soup is usually - enough to satisfy a pretty good appetite.

A flair for combining flavors and unusual seasonings in the soup kettle pays dividends in compliments from family and guests alike. Everyone likes a really good soup, and many a smart cook can make herself a reputation in concocting delicious soups.

ECONOMICAL potatoes have long been a main ingredient of many soups. When combined with milk and a variety of seasonings, they can make some of the most satisfying and appetizing soups you've






