## \$75,000 City Bond Election Set For Saturday

### Advantages Are Cited

Qualified voters of the City of O'Donnell with their names on the city's tax roll are eligible to vote Saturday at the City's tax office on the \$75,000 revenue bond issue. The ballot will have two options. One option calls for \$30,000 in City Water Bonds and the other calls for \$45,000 in Sewer Revenue bonds.

For the last two weeks an official notice has been carried but for fear some do not understand the legal terminology, the Index will comment briefly.

Either one of the options may be defeated without affecting the other option if it carries. Neither bond issue is a levy against the taxable city property. The bonds are simply a levy against the Water System and the Sewer System (if purchased).

The \$30,000 water bond issue will be used to pay for several car loads of water pipe purchased in the past and now covered by a warrant. It will also be used to extend water mains to the Gates cottages and Clawson and Holcomb gin west of town as well as to the Farmers Co. op; many new fire plugs, to extend water to the eastern and northern limits of city expansion and to buy a chlorine machine for the main water storage system. Only that part of the bond issue which is needed will be sold.

The next is the \$45,000 Sewer bond issue. This will be used — about \$30,000 — to buy the privately owned sewer system and the remainder will be used in the extension of present sewer mains. If the City does not trade for the sewer system the bonds will not be used.

The above are the facts gained from talking with several of the City dads. YOU voted for these men and this bond issue is their advice. The Index urges the careful consideration of the voters. We will as an individual vote favorably to the twin issues; we feel that the continued expansion of the town warrants the issue.

# United States' Oldest Executive Department Began Duties 1789

This is the first of a series of six articles on the department of state of the United States and its personnel as written by Walter A. Shead, Western Newspaper Union's Washington correspondent.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The department of state of the United States of America is the official channel through which the American people conduct their relations with the other peoples and governments of the world. It is the oldest of the executive departments of government and went into action in 1789 with Thomas Jefferson as the first secretary of state.

Because of the fact that this nation was traditionally self-sufficient and isolated and aloof from the rest of the world until the advances of technology conquered time and distance, the people of this nation probably know less about the state department than any other branch of government.

However, since World War I the state department has been growing, not only in its dealings with the rest of the world, but in the impact of its actions and its policy upon the everyday life of every individual American citizen.

What the American people are concerned with now is just this: What about the department of state today? Who are the men and women who comprise its personnel roster of some 22,000 employees? Where do they come from? How are they chosen for the tasks assigned them?

And above all, what is the foreign policy of this nation and how is this policy formed? This series of articles, of which this is the first, will attempt to deal objectively with this subject and answer some of these questions.

THERE ARE TWO main premises upon which to spotlight the state department. First, the department proper has about 8,000 employees, most of whom are stationed in Washington. These comprise the general management and functional and operational segments of the department. Then second, there are about 14,000 persons in the foreign service who staff the more than 280 embassies, legations, diplomatic missions and consular

# Well Made Plans of Men Go Wrong - Without Murder

If you've nothing better to do for the next three minutes, let's play a game called "Answer Yes or No." Question: If a doctor were accused of allowing a mean old man to die who had only a week to live anyhow, and you were on the jury, would you find him guilty of murder?

A doozy question, you say, because it leaves you no choice? Well, let me brief you on the events leading up to the crime and then put the question to you again . . .

The mean old man—let's call him Andrew Horton—was a millionaire of the almost extinct rough-em-up Jay Gould school, and among the people he delighted in pushing around was his son, Andrew, Jr. To round out the picture, it must be admitted that the youngster pretty much rated this treatment: He was a weak-chinned and weak-willed society kid who in his teens had developed a cordial dislike for two things—(a) work, and (b) his father who insisted on it.

A few months after the boy's 21st birthday, the old man came down with a heart attack that all but did him in, and the specialist who was called in informed the son that his pop didn't figure to live more than a week or so.

offices maintained by the United States in some 75 countries.

The next main subject to remember is that the conduct of the foreign affairs of a world power like the United States with a population of more than 150 million people requires a highly specialized organization, specially trained about political, social, cultural and economic aspects of the world.

These are further broken down into specialized subjects such as finance, aviation, human rights, labor, agriculture, commerce, tariffs, reconstruction, standards of living and other technical fields so that the department not only represents the people of this nation in other countries, but it acts as foreign representative of all other departments of government.

And since World War II and the organization of the United Nations, duties of the department have tripled. For instance, during 1949 representatives of our state department took part in 6,000 international meetings and received 340,000 reports from its representatives throughout the world, all of which had to be analyzed and evaluated as a basis for policy decisions and correlated in each case with those of other interested government agencies.

Today, headed by Dean Acheson, the department of state occupies more than 20 separate buildings in Washington scattered about the city, with the beautiful new building at 320 21st Street N. W. as the hub of its activities. Immediately under him is the Under-Secretary of State James E. Webb of North Carolina; Ambassador-at-Large Philip C. Jessup of New York; Deputy Under Secretary of State for Administration John E. Peurifoy of South Carolina; and Deputy Under-Secretary Elbert G. Mathews.

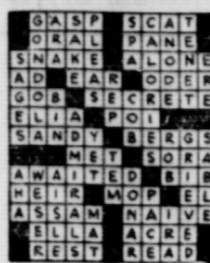

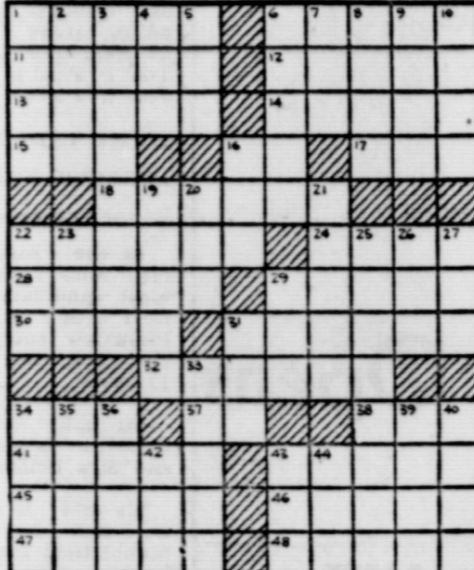

Senior Jacinto choked with rage. "It is you who will go. I was here first. I built up the fish business here. You will have to go!"

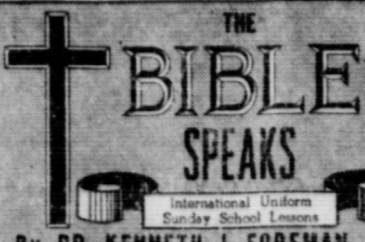

"Only," said Tommy, "if your father should change his mind about consenting to our marriage."

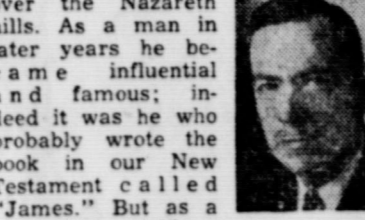

## Brother to Jesus

Lesson for September 17, 1950

THEY WENT fishing together, no doubt; very likely they worked together in the shop; perhaps little James was the nuisance that small brothers sometimes are, but like all small brothers he would tag along when Jesus went walking over the Nazareth hills. As a man in later years he became influential and famous; indeed it was he who probably wrote the book in our New Testament called "James." But as a boy, his neighbors saw nothing remarkable in him. So completely commonplace was he, that as Mark 6 shows us, the natives of Nazareth couldn't believe that one of James' brothers could amount to anything.



Unbeliever  
FOR years and years James grew up with Jesus, boy with boy. They lived under the same roof, ate from the same dish. James may even have worn his big brother's outgrown tunics. All his childhood days he knew the care and love of the same mother Mary that Jesus had. Through all those "silent" years when Jesus lived and worked in Nazareth, James lived and worked beside him.

And yet, the strange thing is that when Jesus left the carpenter shop and went about "doing good" as Peter said, James did not agree with him. It seems clear from the story in Mark 3 that both Mary and the brothers (not James only) had the idea that Jesus was out of his mind. They came to get him and would have stopped his ministry at that point, if they could. John also mentions the fact that Jesus' own brothers did not believe in him.

It seems strange, yet the reason may not be hard to find. Perhaps it was a case of the old proverb, "Familiarity breeds contempt." Perhaps James had a sort of inferiority complex about himself, maybe he agreed with the villagers' low opinion about him, so that he could not believe that his brother could be the Christ. In any case it is plain that if miracles could ever have compelled belief, Jesus' miracles would have convinced James . . . but he was an unbeliever right through the day of Calvary.

BELIEVER  
PRECISELY what changed him was never known. Some anonymous writer in early times wrote a "Gospel of James"—a piece of fiction never accepted by the church as genuine. What we do know is what Paul tells us; that after his resurrection, Jesus "appeared to James." It may well be that James was convinced by the risen Christ as he had never been by the Carpenter of Nazareth.

Be that as it may, as time went on and Christians began to multiply in Jerusalem, James appeared as the leader of the Christians' Home Church. At the important conference held in Jerusalem to decide the church's first great controversy, it was James whose speech was the "last word" before the decisive vote.

Quality of Leadership  
JAMES was not an accepted leader merely because he was a brother of Jesus. There were other brothers who remained quite obscure. James was a recognized leader because of his personal qualities. The reader is invited to study these out for himself. But there is one interesting and unusual combination of qualities in this man, strictness with himself, together with flexible generosity in dealing with others.

In Acts 21:17-26 it is clear that James kept all the laws of Moses himself and expected other Jews to do the same. To the end of his life he was personally a rigid conservative. But when it came to other people, he was far more tolerant.

When the question arose, How much of Jewish law shall we expect Gentle Christians to observe? James agreed to the startlingly small nucleus of laws that the Jerusalem conference set forth as the absolute minimum for all. James did not wish his own conscience to bind every one else. He did not expect every one to be bound by his own pattern. He had high standards and he lived by them. But he did not use his own standards as a club with which to beat others over the head.

Can an older brother lead a younger astray?

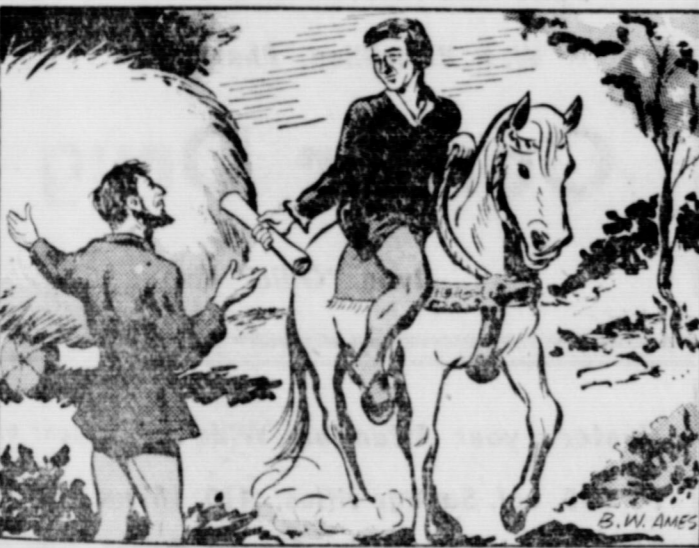

## KEEPING HEALTHY

### Treatment of Hereditary Headache

By Dr. James W. Barton

WHILE HEADACHE is considered the commonest symptom known to mankind, there are many varieties and, of course, many causes.

Cephalalgia is another name for headache, just as neuralgia is an ache in the nerves. It is known that headaches, sometimes a particular type of headache, seems to run in some families. This is called hereditary cephalalgia.

In Postgraduate Medicine, Dr. Cecil M. Charles, St. Louis, Mo., states that individuals giving a family history of paroxysmal (coming suddenly, very severe for a time, and leaving suddenly) headache and having such headaches themselves, may be grouped together under the term hereditary cephalalgia, without attempting to sort them out into different varieties or subdivisions.

He made a study of 35 patients who have regularly occurring severe headaches and who give positive family histories of paroxysmal cephalalgia. Many of these have had electroencephalographic tracings

made (tracings of brain movements, just as heart movements are traced by the electrocardiograph).

For years the specific drug used for migraine (one-sided headache) has been ergotamine tartrate (gynergen). In the treatment of these 35 patients ergotamine tartrate alone or in combination with caffeine (cafergone), was used.

As with migraine, ergotamine tartrate was by far the most effective drug in treating these hereditary headaches, excellent results being obtained in 80 per cent of the patients and good results in the remaining 20 per cent. Some of the other preparations gave good results and were used where gynergen caused various side effects or symptoms.

Because of the electroencephalographic findings (brain movements) in many patients with hereditary cephalalgia, which findings are present in epilepsy or convulsions, the drug Mesantoin to counteract convulsions was given to several of these patients with excellent results. Further tests will be made.

## HEALTH NOTES

The patient with high blood pressure should limit his intake of fluids to three or four cups of fruit juice each day.

## PEACE:

There Is Still Hope

The belief that there is still hope for peace, perhaps for only a short time, but still respite from world-wide war, is growing in many quarters. The hope is not one for permanent peace, but one of time, based on the belief in high diplomatic circles that the Russians are not ready for all-out war at the moment.

Diplomatic circles call it the "calculated risk" of war or peace. It is based on three major assumptions:

- (1) Russia fears the effects of American atom bomb attacks.
- (2) Russia does not possess an adequate stock pile of atomic bombs.
- (3) Russia's industrial potential is still too weak in comparison with that of the western allies to risk a major conflict.

The first two of the assumptions are, of course, mere guess work. But there are statistics to back up the third.

For instance, America's steel production for 1950 is expected to exceed 71 million tons. Great Britain will produce around 16 million tons and the rest of western Europe approximately 24 million tons. Thus, the allies will produce a total of 111 million tons, compared with Russia's 22 million.

Russia also lags in the production of oil, another of the top essentials for war.

On these assumptions western Europe is planning a three-year rearming program. If the program is successful peace may be prolonged, but the world will be divided into two great armed camps.

## RAILROADS: Strikes Close Steel

The brotherhood of railroad trainmen and order of railway conductors went on strike against three terminal railroads, disrupting several of the country's steel arteries in the midst of the Korean war.

However, with the steel industry pressed to capacity to meet the needs of the stepped-up munitions program and the booming civilian economy, many sources predicted that President Truman would seize the lines.

The unions singled out key terminals in Louisville, St. Paul and Chicago and Republic Steel's switching terminal at Cleveland for the first display of pressure. About 1,000 men walked out for five days. Approximately 30,000 workers, including steelworkers, were made idle.

Negotiations between management and union representatives, with presidential assistant John R. Steelman taking part, produced no progress in the first 24 hours.

Observers believed the government would take drastic action before the situation deteriorated and crippled the nation's vital steel production.

## INTELLIGENCE: Headed by Smith

Lt. Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, former ambassador to Moscow, was named by President Truman as director of central intelligence. He will succeed Rear Adm. Roscoe H. Hillenkoetter around the end of September.

The agency's job is to gather and analyze reports from diplomatic, military and all other sources. Some members of congress were not surprised by Smith's appointment.

There had been demands in congress for a shake-up of the agency since the Korean war. Some legislators contended the United States was caught flat-footed by the invasion of South Korea by Communist troops.

General Smith, now 54, has had a long military career, which includes service as chief of staff to Gen. Dwight Eisenhower in World War II. Later he became ambassador to Moscow.

## POLITICS: Election Crossfire

The American political picture cleared somewhat with one definite trend in the spotlight: the voter faces a furious election year partisan crossfire. The issue will be U.S. foreign policy.

The bipartisanship in foreign policy as existed before the Korean war is a thing of the past. From now on voters will hear charges and counter-charges on U. S. foreign policy by congressional candidates.

## Household Hints

If you have some cold cuts and would rather have hot cuts, wrap the slices of meat in two soaking wet dish towels, put them in a pan and put the pan in a hot oven for fifteen minutes. The meat, which needs no cooking, will be warmed by steam without destroying the flavor.

You can use bay leaves to flavor a roast or soup without having to fish the leaves out later, if you crush them up in a metal tea ball and drop the ball into the pot while the roast or soup is cooking. Pull it out by its chain when it's done, and the flavor will be where you want it.

To remove the odor from your hands after peeling onions, rub your hands with raw celery or parsley before trying to wash them. Or, wet the hands with clear water and rub them thoroughly with salt.

Ordinary, prosaic fruit cup can be livened up considerably by serving it with a scoop of fruit-flavored sherbet on top.

To avoid yellow stains on your hands when peeling carrots, peel them under water.

## PEACE:

There Is Still Hope

The belief that there is still hope for peace, perhaps for only a short time, but still respite from world-wide war, is growing in many quarters. The hope is not one for permanent peace, but one of time, based on the belief in high diplomatic circles that the Russians are not ready for all-out war at the moment.

Diplomatic circles call it the "calculated risk" of war or peace. It is based on three major assumptions:

(1) Russia fears the effects of American atom bomb attacks.  
(2) Russia does not possess an adequate stock pile of atomic bombs.  
(3) Russia's industrial potential is still too weak in comparison with that of the western allies to risk a major conflict.

The first two of the assumptions are, of course, mere guess work. But there are statistics to back up the third.

For instance, America's steel production for 1950 is expected to exceed 71 million tons. Great Britain will produce around 16 million tons and the rest of western Europe approximately 24 million tons. Thus, the allies will produce a total of 111 million tons, compared with Russia's 22 million.

Russia also lags in the production of oil, another of the top essentials for war.

On these assumptions western Europe is planning a three-year rearming program. If the program is successful peace may be prolonged, but the world will be divided into two great armed camps.

## RAILROADS: Strikes Close Steel

The brotherhood of railroad trainmen and order of railway conductors went on strike against three terminal railroads, disrupting several of the country's steel arteries in the midst of the Korean war.

However, with the steel industry pressed to capacity to meet the needs of the stepped-up munitions program and the booming civilian economy, many sources predicted that President Truman would seize the lines.

The unions singled out key terminals in Louisville, St. Paul and Chicago and Republic Steel's switching terminal at Cleveland for the first display of pressure. About 1,000 men walked out for five days. Approximately 30,000 workers, including steelworkers, were made idle.

Negotiations between management and union representatives, with presidential assistant John R. Steelman taking part, produced no progress in the first 24 hours.

Observers believed the government would take drastic action before the situation deteriorated and crippled the nation's vital steel production.

## INTELLIGENCE: Headed by Smith

Lt. Gen. Walter Bedell Smith, former ambassador to Moscow, was named by President Truman as director of central intelligence. He will succeed Rear Adm. Roscoe H. Hillenkoetter around the end of September.

The agency's job is to gather and analyze reports from diplomatic, military and all other sources. Some members of congress were not surprised by Smith's appointment.

There had been demands in congress for a shake-up of the agency since the Korean war. Some legislators contended the United States was caught flat-footed by the invasion of South Korea by Communist troops.

General Smith, now 54, has had a long military career, which includes service as chief of staff to Gen. Dwight Eisenhower in World War II. Later he became ambassador at Moscow.

## POLITICS: Election Crossfire

The American political picture cleared somewhat with one definite trend in the spotlight: the voter faces a furious election year partisan crossfire. The issue will be U.S. foreign policy.

The bipartisanship in foreign policy as existed before the Korean war is a thing of the past. From now on voters will hear charges and counter-charges on U. S. foreign policy by congressional candidates.

## Household Hints

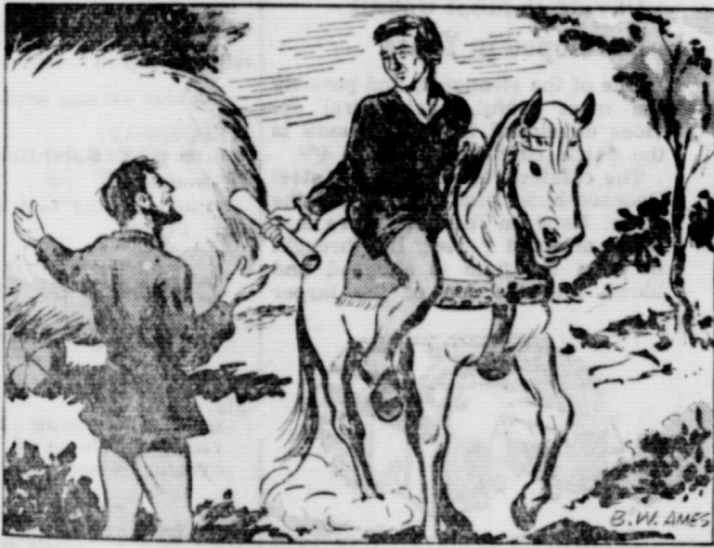

## KEEPING HEALTHY

### Treatment of Hereditary Headache

By Dr. James W. Barton

WHILE HEADACHE is considered the commonest symptom known to mankind, there are many varieties and, of course, many causes.

Cephalalgia is another name for headache, just as neuralgia is an ache in the nerves. It is known that headaches, sometimes a particular type of headache, seems to run in some families. This is called hereditary cephalalgia.

In Postgraduate Medicine, Dr. Cecil M. Charles, St. Louis, Mo., states that individuals giving a family history of paroxysmal (coming suddenly, very severe for a time, and leaving suddenly) headache and having such headaches themselves, may be grouped together under the term hereditary cephalalgia, without attempting to sort them out into different varieties or subdivisions.

He made a study of 35 patients who have regularly occurring severe headaches and who give positive family histories of paroxysmal cephalalgia. Many of these have had electroencephalographic tracings

made (tracings of brain movements, just as heart movements are traced by the electrocardiograph).

For years the specific drug used for migraine (one-sided headache) has been ergotamine tartrate (gynergen). In the treatment of these 35 patients ergotamine tartrate alone or in combination with caffeine (cafergone), was used.

As with migraine, ergotamine tartrate was by far the most effective drug in treating these hereditary headaches, excellent results being obtained in 80 per cent of the patients and good results in the remaining 20 per cent. Some of the other preparations gave good results and were used where gynergen caused various side effects or symptoms.

Because of the electroencephalographic findings (brain movements) in many patients with hereditary cephalalgia, which findings are present in epilepsy or convulsions, the drug Mesantoin to counteract convulsions was given to several of these patients with excellent results. Further tests will be made.

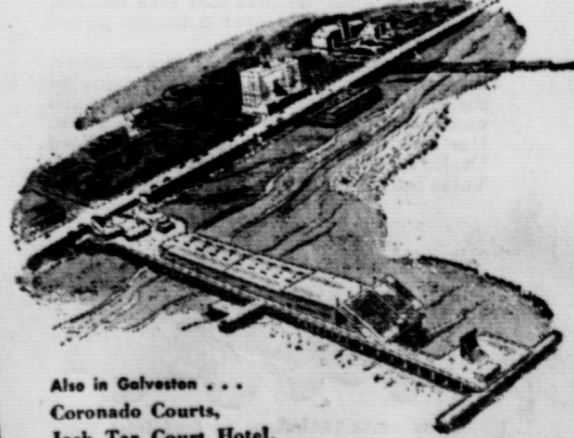

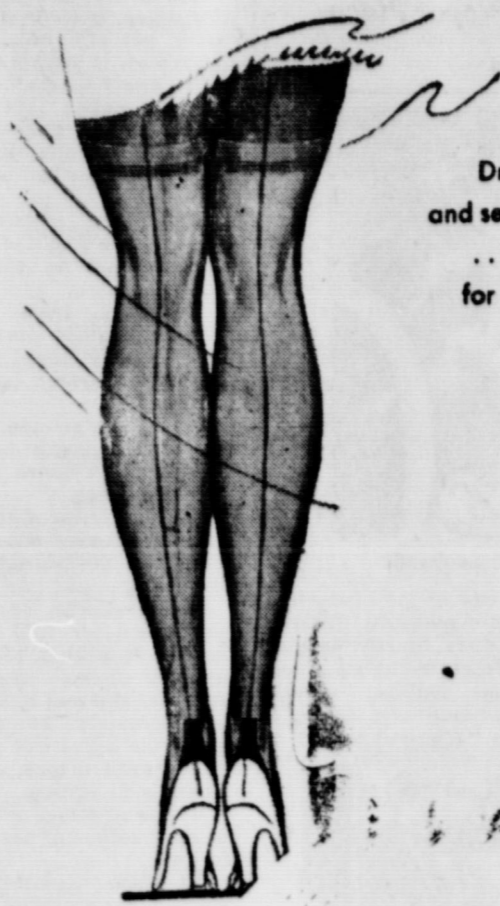

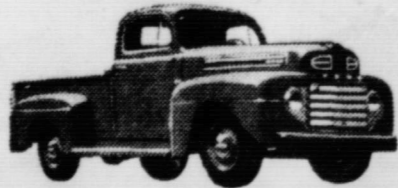

### Self Serving Barn Great Labor Saver

Device Is Most Useful Developed in Years

One of the strangest, and possibly the most useful, agricultural devices developed in recent years is the cattle cafeteria. The cafeteria is actually two steel Quonset huts, one built inside the other. Between the two, there is a space of about 1' feet. Hay brought in from the field is chopped and blown into the top of the larger

structure. It falls down on the other, settling between the two. When the space is filled, the cafeteria is ready for operation.

A series of gates, hinged at the top, may be raised to feed cattle inside or outside the barn. The slats are spaced just wide enough to admit a steer's nose and are also hinged at the top. As the cattle make pockets in the hay they push against the slats. The constant swinging dislodges more hay from the storage area above and it falls down.

The outside gates provide shelter for feeding animals in cold weather. According to reports from a farm where the "cafeteria" has been used, 44 beef steers have been fed through an entire winter with a total of four man-hours of labor. Once the storage area was filled, the farmer walked off, his job done for months.

The idea seems especially good for the northwest where winter feeding of relatively small herds is a constant, laborious chore.

### Dimethyl Thallate Is Good Chigger Repellent

If you are bothered with chiggers—and most people have been this summer—extension entomologists suggest repellents containing dimethyl thallate as the most effective.

This solution should be applied around the tops of the stockings, or in a band around the ankles. They caution against indiscriminate use because the chemical stains some fabrics.

Once the chigger's got you, treating the affected portions of the skin with 5 to 10 percent solution of benzocaine in alcohol is recommended by T. H. Parks of Ohio State University.

There is no positive method yet devised for treating yards and lawns to eliminate chiggers, but many people have found dusting the lawn with powdered sulphur helps.

Parks suggests using the cheap, 1st grade of sulphur available, and applying it generously to the lawn with a dust gun.

### War to Have Strong Influence on Markets

First, the all-important corn is made largely during July and August. Yield depends mainly on rainfall and borer damage.

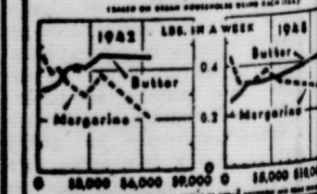
Second, military operations may have a strong influence on market activities.

**STATE BUREAU GETS GIFT OF FLEAS**

You wouldn't ordinarily consider a boxful of dead fleas as very much of a gift. But entomological workers and specialists who study insects and spread disease at the Texas State Department of Health, recently were thrilled by a gift of Northwest fleas from Dr. C. Anderson Hubbard, formerly of the Pacific Northwest Department of Health, University in Oregon. He had made similar gifts, collected during a lifetime of studying disease spreaders, to 20 of the world's outstanding institutions in biological sciences.

The State Health Department feels that it is something of a compliment to be classed as a leader in biological studies.

The Texas Health Department was the only health agency in the nation to benefit from the present collection. It's disease vector collection is reputedly one of the finest in the world. Dr. Cox says the entire assortment, including ticks and mites as well as fleas, is open to study by graduate and advanced undergraduate students in Texas colleges and universities.

Departmental entomological studies are a determination of the specific types of insects of medical importance in the state, their distribution, seasonal abundance, and how they can be controlled.

Department entomologists conducted a two year investigation of typhus fever in Lavaca Co. in 1944 to '46. Step by step, they traced out the process by which rodent fleas spread typhus from rat to human beings. In 1949 they finished a study which showed bubonic plague, the Black Death of the Middle Ages, was infecting wild rodents in four South Plains counties in West Texas.



**U. S. Milk Industry Vastly Transformed**

**Cost of Product Rises Less Than Other Foods**

Since the turn of the century the milk industry has undergone a transformation rivaling that of the airplane, according to dairy scientist and historian Dr. J. Lloyd Henderson.

Dr. Henderson, co-author of "The Market Milk Industry," a standard textbook whose latest edition will be released this spring said "Our research since the war's end points up the fact that although labor and equipment costs have kept pace with rising scales in other industries, the cost of milk and its products has risen less than that of any other food. In fact, milk, from a nutritive point of view, is far and away the housewife's best food buy."

Cost-saving scientific advances in milk processing and startling economies due to improved distribution practices have been responsible for this, Henderson points out.

The industry shed no tears as it buried the familiar 10-gallon milk

can and converted to huge insulated tank trucks for bringing milk from the larger farms to the processing plant. Savings in handling due to this change have only been matched by the improvement in sanitation and quality of the product, Henderson said. Every-other-day delivery, now practically standard practice in major cities, plus the use of retail trucks of almost double capacity, also helped keep the housewife's milk budget in line.

The flash pasteurized, once outlawed by health authorities, has been so improved that today every milk company of any size uses it to save expensive man-hours and production space.

**Grasshopper Control  
 Methods Discussed**

**Poisoned Bait Erratic,  
 New Experiments Reveal**

Poisoned bait, used for many years, has often given erratic control of grasshoppers, the Oklahoma agricultural experiment station reports in a recent bulletin.

During the past few years, many new chemicals have been developed some of which are very poisonous to grasshoppers. Of these, benzene

hexachloride is especially useful when temperatures are high and most grasshoppers have reached the adult age.

Insecticides which give most effective control are sprays are chlordane, 1.0 to 1.5 pounds per acre; toxaphene, 1.5 to 2.0 pounds per acre; and parathion, 0.2 to 0.3 pound per acre of the actual insecticidal material. Most effect is obtained by spraying these on succulent plants when the nymphs have nearly all hatched and are feeding. As the season progresses, costs increase and control decreases.

The bulletin warned care should be taken to prevent livestock from feeding on plants that have been tested with any of these chemicals. The operator applying them should avoid contact with them to as great an extent as possible. The use of masks and gloves is cheap insurance.

**Buying Feeder Pigs May  
 Prove More Profitable**

Hog raisers in the future may find it easier and more profitable to sell their sows and buy feeder pigs already weaned, wormed, castrated, deloused, vaccinated, and started on feed.

This is the long-range program of a Wisconsin farmer whose "pig hatchery" output cannot meet the demand of a long list of customers.

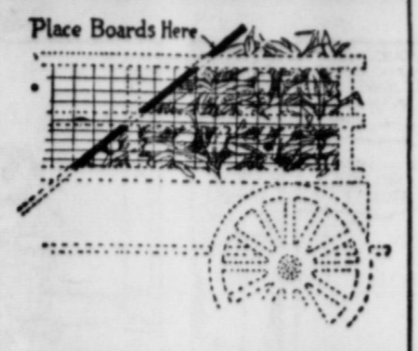
The Weix farm in Dane County, Wisconsin, produces a special kind of healthy, well-started weaning pig. According to hog farmers and livestock authorities at the Chicago market, this system has many advantages—among them saving of time in search of good boars and sows and their year-around maintenance. This eliminates time, work and risk in raising pigs from farrowing to weaning. It means cutting down on expensive housing and the elimination of guesswork about the kind of pigs that will result in the use of each new boar.

About three-fourths of all lockers were rented to farmers; there was little difficulty in renting lockers; plants in operation had 95 percent of available space rented; and two-thirds of them were rented to capacity, a survey showed.

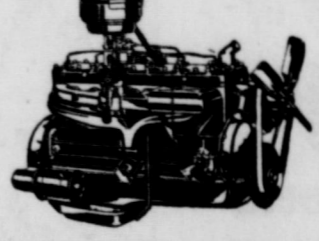

## Hearty Soups Make Good Companions For Lunch, Supper

**WITH THE FIRST** crispness of autumn, hot and hearty soups establish themselves solidly into our menus. They're a good beginning for dinner and they're substantial enough dish for a hearty luncheon or supper.

When soups are the mainstay of the meal, you need little else because they're full of much nourishment. A sandwich or crisp vegetable salad, a fruit cobbler or pudding served along with soup is usually enough to satisfy a pretty good appetite.

A flair for combining flavors and unusual seasonings in the soup kettle pays dividends in compliments from family and guests alike. Everyone likes a really good soup, and many a smart cook can make herself a reputation in concocting delicious soups.

**ECONOMICAL** potatoes have long been a main ingredient of many soups. When combined with milk and a variety of seasonings, they can make some of the most satisfying and appetizing soups you've ever had the pleasure of tasting.

**\*Appledorf Soup**  
 4 cups diced, raw potatoes  
 1 cup diced celery  
 3 tablespoons butter  
 1/2 cup diced onion  
 2 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon pepper  
 1 quart milk  
 2 tablespoons minced parsley

Cook potatoes and celery in boiling water until tender. Drain and puree vegetables, saving vegetable juice. Cook minced onion in butter over low heat until tender, about five minutes. Add seasonings, milk, 2/3 cup of the leftover vegetable juice, pureed vegetables and minced parsley. Heat thoroughly, stir in catsup, garnishing with a swirl on top of each bowl.

**\*Parsley Soup (Serves 6)**  
 3 tablespoons butter  
 1/2 cup diced onion  
 3 tablespoons flour  
 3 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon celery salt  
 1/2 teaspoon pepper  
 4 cups milk, scalded  
 1 1/2 cups finely diced, cooked potatoes  
 3/4 cup chopped parsley or 1 bunch fresh watercress  
 Paprika

Melt butter, add onions and cook over low heat, while stirring, until tender, about five minutes. Add flour, seasonings and blend. Gradually stir in hot milk and cook until smooth and thickened, stirring constantly. Add cooked potatoes and parsley or watercress. Heat thoroughly and serve in bowls with a sprig of parsley and a few sprinklings of paprika.

**\*Tomato-Corn Chowder (Serves 6)**  
 2 slices bacon, diced  
 1/4 cup grated onion  
 2 cups cubed raw carrots  
 1 cup water  
 1 1/2 teaspoon salt  
 1/2 teaspoon pepper  
 1 cup drained, canned whole kernel corn  
 2 cups canned tomato juice  
 4 tablespoons flour  
 1/2 cup milk



Tomato-corn chowder is a hearty stick-to-the-ribs soup which you can make at any time the weather calls for a hearty soup because you're certain to have the main ingredients, canned tomato juice and whole kernel corn readily at hand.

### LYNN SAYS: Avoid These Common Errors in Cooking

If you omit cream of tartar or corn syrup from a boiled frosting, a dry, sugar crust will form on standing. These two ingredients aid in the prevention of crystal growth on standing.

When you brown flour for gravy, you'll have to use more of it than unbrowned flour or the gravy will be thin and watery. This happens because the starch in flour loses thickening power on browning.

Do not add all milk at once when

Cook bacon and onion together until bacon is crisp. Add potatoes, water and seasonings. Cover and simmer about 30 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Add corn, tomato juice and flour which have been mixed to a smooth paste with the milk. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thickened.

**\*Vegetable Soup (Makes 3 quarts)**  
 2 1/2 pounds soup bone  
 6 cups cold water  
 3 teaspoons salt  
 1 1/4 teaspoons pepper  
 2 cups potatoes, diced  
 2 cups canned tomatoes  
 1 cup diced celery  
 1/2 cup diced carrots  
 1 cup canned corn  
 2 medium-sized onions, diced

Place soup bone, vegetables, water and seasonings in large kettle. Bring soup to a boil; add rice. Turn heat down to low and let soup simmer for three to four hours, until meat falls from bone and rice is tender.

What could be more delicious than this combination chicken, ham and vegetables in a soup, deftly seasoned with Creole magic? Here is a delightful soup recipe which you'll be certain to make often once you've tasted it.

**\*Okra Gumbo, Creole (Serves 12 to 14)**  
 1 frying chicken, cut  
 2 thick slices ham, diced  
 1 onion  
 1 tablespoon parsley  
 6 tomatoes, fresh or canned  
 20 pods, okra  
 1 pod red pepper  
 1 sprig thyme or 1 bayleaf  
 6 whole cloves  
 3 tablespoons butter or substitute  
 2 tablespoons flour  
 Salt and pepper to taste  
 3 quarts boiling water  
 Rice, cooked

Chop onion and parsley. Skin tomatoes and chop, straining off juice. Slice okra thin. Remove seeds from red pepper. Place butter in soup kettle. When butter is hot, add chicken and ham. Cover closely and let simmer for about 10 minutes. Then add chopped onions, parsley, tomatoes and red pepper. When well browned, add juice of tomatoes. Add okra, and stir frequently to prevent okra from scorching. Add thyme or bayleaf and cloves, then pour in water. Let simmer very gently for about an hour, until flavors are well blended. Thicken just before serving with flour, mixed with 1/4 cup cold water to a smooth paste. Serve with boiled rice.

Meat cooked at high temperatures becomes tough and dry because heat causes protein in meat to toughen. Cook for a longer period but use low temperatures for juicy meat.

When equal amounts of cornstarch are substituted for flour in puddings and fillings, the product is too stiff because starch has twice the thickening power of flour. Use only one-half the amount of cornstarch.

Souffles over-baked at high temperatures shrink and collapse when removed from the oven because protein shrinks and forces air out. Set soufflé in pan of hot water and cook only until set. This insures low and even temperature and prevents over-cooking.

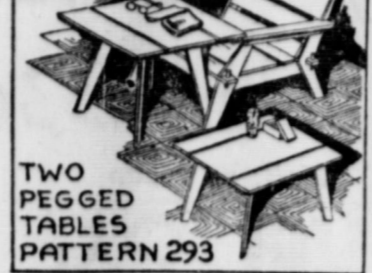
