The fine words and idealistic plans will have more force if the permanent committee of the assembly on peace and security. which Secretary of State Mar-shall proposed, is created. It will be in session all the time. Its voice, unmuffled by the overuse of the stultifying veto, will be heard continuously; not merely when the assembly itself is in session.

### Words Contain Great Significance

Words still are making trouble, as they always have. It isn't what we say so much as what people think we mean. For instance, there was a long discussion of the word "impinge," on the second day of the assembly meeting. This was just the English meaning, discussed among English-speaking reporters. Secretary Marshall had said this new permanent committee of the assembly would not "impinge" on the security council. The great argument about the committee has been that it was intended to by-pass the security council itself, and thus duck the

If the English-speaking reporters weren't quite sure how far you go, or don't go, when you "impinge," it's no wonder there was confusion when it was translated into half a dozen other languages.

It was the translation of one word which nearly caused a revolution in Korea and made the work of the American commission there infi-nitely more difficult. It also has affected the whole course of action by the assembly on Korea. It was the word "trusteeship."

### Conserve Food: Truman: U.N. Adopts Agenda

FOOD PLANS:

Conservation

It wasn't hard for President Truman to figure out: Europe is in desperate need of food from the U.S., but the U. S. will leave itself wide open for even greater price spiralling if it boosts its exports much

The answer, he told a special press conference, is food conservation by all Americans. It is not a matter of eating any less, he said, but of wasting less.

In line with that, he announced the setting up of a citizens food committee to develop a food conservation program in the nation. Charles Luckman of Cambridge, Mass., president of Lever Brothers, was named president.

Regarding Europe, Mr. Truman said the food and fuel situation there is too critical to allow time for detailed study. Thus, apparently in an emergency frame of mind, the President called together congressional leaders to discuss possible steps that could be taken immediately to aid the starving continent.

If possible, he said, he would not

call a special session of congress if stop-gap aid for Europe could be pushed through without resort-

ing to that step.

Americans could start preparing for a heavy barrage of food conservation propaganda.

### TOUGH AGENDA:

No Dodging

United Nations general assembly proved at least one thing in the first week of its current session-it isn't going to dodge any issues.

After riotous preliminary sessions in which they heard the U.S. and Russia flay each other verbally and U. N. Secretary General Trygve Lie call for an end to feuding, the delegates voted doggedly to take on the entire list of tough, almost insoluble problems standing as a barrier to world accord.

Among the items admitted to the agenda were the partition of Palestine, peace in the Balkans, independence of Korea and Marshall's proposal to reorganize U. N. machinery to hold a tighter rein on the turbulent peace.

Soviet delegate Andrei Vishinsky's resolution calling on member nations to take criminal action against warmongering propagandists was whole-heartedly admitted to debate. probably because it will provide a chance to mull over the concept of freedom of the press.

I T MAY sound hard to believe, but the huge shortage of this year's corn crop could be largely offset if the American people were able to eliminate one factor in their economy-rats.

Most people don't realize it, but one healthy rat eats or spoils around 100 pounds of grain per year. While it's impossible to count the rat population, interior departs and applied to the state of th lation, interior department experts estimate that rats are almost double the human population-probably totaling 250 million in the U.S.

Entirely aside from the disease which rats spread from privy to pantry and the havoc they wreak upon the waterfronts of American seaports, their effect upon the food supply of the United States is almost beyond realization. Between the time a farmer stores his corn in the fall and cleans out his cornerib in the sammer, rats may have eaten the difference between profit and loss for the year. In addition, they spoil as much corn as they eat.

If the food destroyed by rats could be shipped overseas, this alone would about save Europe from its current danger of starvation. At present one government agency, the fish and wildlife service of the interior department, is working on rat eradication. Handicapped by lack of funds, government rat eradicators are able to do little beyond circulating anti-rat propaganda

Jesus and the Bible

I think of a story of a junior boy, recently accused of stealing. The boy was the victim of a wicked man who sought to turn circumstantial evidence upon him to cover his own sin. The boy told me that he was innocent. I went with him to the juvenile court. The judge asked him if he was guilty. He looked straight into the eyes of the judge and said:

"Sir, I have not sinned. Who convicteth me of this charge?" The man dropped his head, and said:

"Your bonor, I ask for the privilege of withdrawing the charge."

His Laws in Our Hearts

"I WILL put my laws on their hearts, and upon their minds also will I write them," Hebrews 10:16. Jesus declares, "I do always the things that please him," and he enables us, by his grace, to do the father's will by his indwelling in our hearts. Thus, his will becomes the law of our lives, through the grace of Jesus Christ.

It is impossible for us to keep the law perfectly, but Christ, the better Christ, becomes our righteousness, and then his law is kept by his grace. In the olden times, men claimed to keep the letter of the law, without the spirit, as in the case of Moses. Now, through the offering of Christ, we are enabled to satisfy the spirit of the law.

The Sufficient Christ

THIS lesson should enhearten ev-I ery trusting child of God, since it makes clear that, "He is able to save unto the uttermost them that draw near unto God through him," Hebrews 7:25.

He is not only able, but yearns to save unto the uttermost. He wills to save everyone. God has done everything he can do to save every sentient soul on this earth. Those who go to hell do so because they decide to go to hell. It is not the pleasure of God that any should perish, but that all should rependand be saved.
