One case of typhoid, with the willing flies to carry the death-dealing germs, would likely prove an epidemic that would be costly in lives and money to stamp out.

Sheriff Marshall Simpson died at a Lubbock sanitarium at 1 o'clock Wednesday morning, following an operation for gall stones which he underwent on Tuesday of last week, the gall bladder having burst previous to the operation. The death of Mr. Simpson came as a surprise to his many friends here as it was not known that he was in bad health.

Marshall Simpson was forty-eight years of age at the time of his death, nine years of which he had lived in Lynn county. He was chosen sheriff of this county at the last election and was filling the office to the satisfaction of everyone. Previous to his election as sheriff, he had served six years as deputy sheriff. Of his immediate relatives, he is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Simpson, with whom he resided, three brothers, Wesley Simpson, Willis Simpson of Winters, and V. I. Simpson of St. Louis, and four sisters. Mrs. Lula Simons of Yuma, Ariz., Mrs. Myrtle Harkins and Mrs. Viola Poe of Winters, and Mrs. Brazoria Cliff of Corpus Christi.

Burial took place at the City Cemetery in Tahoka Thursday afternoon.

Flies, the carrier of typhoid germ, and the mosquito, carrier of the dengue fever and other disease germs. Lets clean up the city. All it takes is the willingness, some pep and elbow grease. Make it your business fellow citizen.

Ford Motor Company Sets New Record For Production

The Ford Motor Company set a new record for production Tuesday, May 19th, when its assembly plants turned out 7,858 Ford cars and trucks in the eight-hour working day. This record is for the United States plants alone and does not include foreign plants and associated companies or the Ford Motor Company of Canada, Ltd.

An interesting thing in connection with this remarkable production is that the company is exceeding its most careful estimates for May. Current Ford billboards, which were prepared sixty days ago, carry the message "7,000 More Since Yesterday." But in actual output the company exceeded this by 850.

Production of the company has been steadily increased during the last few weeks due to the growing spring business and new output records have been frequent, but none approaching within 100 of the remarkable figure of Tuesday.

On April 28 the domestic plants beat a record of 7,482 established a year ago by assembling 7,594 cars and trucks. This record stood until May 12 when production went to 7,752.
