

All Indians of both sexes are inveterate gamblers. They have been known to gamble away everything they owned, including their wives and their lives, which is raising the white man's ante to a considerable degree. As a that are marked. These markings are of a thousand and one different designs and colors. The dice are cast either from the hand, a cup, bowl or basket. Many of the dice are thrown on stones, either held in the hand on the ground. The object of this is to make the dice bound over and over, thus insuring a fair cast. The Indian, even as does the white and the African enthusiast, speaks endearingly to his gaming implements, beseeching the Great Twin Brethren, the Spider Woman or whoever happens to be the deity presiding over that particular game of chance to cause "Lady Luck" to hover in his or her vicinity. Some of the younger generation living on the Mesa Grande reservation coin their own phrases, decidedly modern and the lder men and women chanting gaming songs so old that even the most ancient of the tribe had forgotten the meaning of the words.

Roach, Pantry Pest, Is Native of India

Sir Francis Drake, buccaneer of three hundred years ago, once took as a prize a Spanish ship loaded with spices from India. It is recorded that on that ship was a strange "black bugge" which the Spanish called cu-creache, which strictly speaking, meant tood louse." This cucarache became the modern cockroach.

was a native of India, never until that time seen in Europe. These cock-roaches, however, were sturdy fellows. given to living in dark and narrow places, and therefore happy in the holds of ships that plied the sens. Thus these argosles of commerce have served as a means of broadcasting the cockroach, and it is found in abundance wherever man dwells. 

farm cannot properly be called he world, and yet in no other industry is the business end so neglected. an investment of fifteen to twenty

thousand dollars, yet does he keep books? Perhaps he may jot down a note now and then of an important deal, but this is of no value in an nalysis of his business as a whole. o other industry, however small, is rried on without books of some

Farming is a business and to b businesslike way. The business man's anind should have indelibly printed upon it two questions: What profit is ss making? How can that profit be increased? To know the latter, one must find out the former; and to find out about profits requires the keeping of books.

It is not necessary for a farmer to have a course in bookkeeping. Almost every agricultural college in the country has issued a simplified farm accounting book which it sells at cost. and only a few minutes are required each day to jot down the day's happenings.

Accounts Increase Profits Instances number a thousandfold where farmers have profited by knowing their business. Accounts kept by nineteen farmers in Illinois led them to improve the organization and operation of their farms in ways that add-ed approximately \$650 to their average net income in 1922, the seventh

year they had kept accounts. An Iowa farmer found at the end of he first year he kept books that crops fed to livestock brought more money shan when sold outright. His figures showed that his cows were poor; compared with other farms in the state, he found the number of acres cultivated per man on his farm, as well as the number of acres per horse, were below average. He rented morand and replanned his fields, so that the crop areas per man and horse were increased. He sold some of his secrobs and bought good cows. The second year his income from the farm, after paying all expenses and interest on the money invested, had been increased over \$350.
